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Alife well lived for Mrs. Beachwood

ust call Ileen Kelner "Mrs. Beachwood." This moniker is not something Kelner invented for herself. The half-century Beachwood resident earned the nickname through decades of involvement in the community she adores.

A spirited and energetic 79-year-old, Kelner has immersed herself in Beachwood, whether it's through her tireless volunteering with a wide range of organizations or kibitzing with neighbors on Maidstone Lane while taking her dog for his twice-daily hour's walk.

Kelner was not born in Beachwood but may as well have been. A native of Cleveland's Glenville neighborhood, she moved to the suburb from Richmond Heights with husband Marvin when she was pregnant with her third child.

So began an unstinting devotion to the community that continues to this day. Having three boys attending Beachwood schools, the local parent-teacher association was Kelner's first foray into activism. She became president of the Fairmount Elementary School PTA, moving on to a co-presidency of the high-school association during the '70s.

Among other initiatives she helped organize, Kelner ushered in Beachwood High School's first college fair. "I wanted to play a part in shaping my kids' education," Kelner says. "I enjoyed being in the middle of what was happening with the schools."

During this time she also returned to work, using her past experience as an administrative assistant for the Jewish Community Federation of Cleveland and other organizations to become secretary of the high school's

guidance office. She still has an attachment to the schools, substitutes in various buildings and also gets together with retirees from time to time.

Having a full-time job didn't stop Kelner from chasing additional volunteer opportunities. One of them was the Beachwood Arts Council, a nonprofit that has supported the arts in Northeast Ohio since 1964.

While not an artist herself, Kelner has always appreciated the pursuit, whether hung on a wall or acted onstage. As president of the arts council for nine years, she was part of coordinating a juried art show for high-school students and setting up a scholarship fund for area high-school seniors in the name of organization co-founder, the late Si Wachsberger. She took classes offered by the council, learning about glass blowing and art installation.

"Growing up I took dancing lessons and played piano," says Kelner. "With the council I got a real education in art."

Kelner feels the future of the organization is bright, saying, "The Beachwood Arts Council is moving forward in a positive way by enlisting the help of younger board members. A sponsorship program is also being created to increase funds for the Si Wachsberger Scholarship fund and to expand and enhance program-



Religion has been another major aspect of her life in Beachwood. Kelner and her family joined Anshe Chesed Fairmount Temple, where she became active with the reform synagogue's women's group. She has had two stints as president, heading such philanthropic projects as making lap robes for nursing homes, dolls for abused children and alphabet/number books for visually impaired preschool children at the Cleveland Sight Center.

"The Women of Fairmount Temple are working hard to provide additional programming to accommodate women's changing roles by adding a monthly study group to learn about 'Women of the Bible'. We are also coordinating two programs with our religious school to benefit the students. We have a great year coming up." Kelner told us.

Kelner's leadership tenure saw her become a bat mitzvah, which still stands as one of the proudest accomplishments of her adulthood. She studied Hebrew for nine months with a group of like-minded individuals, finally stepping to the bima (pulpit) to culminate the experience.

"It was a heart-warming moment," says Kelner.

The lively Beachwood resident tries to make each day one of fulfillment, volunteerism and activity. Kelner usually starts with 20 minutes of stretching or push-ups, sometimes heading to the gym for a morning water-aerobics class. Next is a long walk through the neighborhood with her 5-year-old beagle, Amos, who she rescued from the the Animal Protective League when he was two months old after not having a dog for 10 years. After her walk, which provides opportunities to make friends with several Beachwood neighbors, her day truly begins.

Kelner can be found in more meetings than your typical corporate executive, be it helping to coordinate programming for her synagogue's religious school or finding sponsors for an upcoming arts council event. During the evenings, she may attend another meeting or enjoy a poolside concert at the **Beachwood Family Aquatic Center** with one of the many friends she's

made over the years.

Two of those friends are Phyllis and Joe Kalk, who became close with Kelner as members of the Beachwood Arts Council. The Kalks don't know where their longtime pal gets her boundless energy, but even after knowing her for decades, they are still impressed by her work ethic and dedication.

"She's a human dynamo," says Joe. "It takes three of us (at the council) to do the work Ileen does in one day."

When the council struggled after a number of founding members died, it was Kelner who attracted new members and generally kept the operation going. "She was the glue that held the whole thing together," says Phyllis. "When she takes on a job, she's totally devoted."

Kelner loves being active, especially when it involves being in the company of others. Companionship was particularly important after her husband died in 2011, and now Kelner is hardly ever home, unless it's to meet with her sons and five grandchildren or bake cakes and cookies for organizational events. She says, "My continued involvement in all the areas makes me feel good and keeps me in touch with many friends I have and continue to make during this journey."

As for the title of "Mrs. Beachwood," Kelner can live with a nickname that encompasses all of what the community means to her.

"Why not?" she asks. "It's kept me in touch with all the great people I've met."

Sometimes Kelner will field questions from folks who wonder where she gets her energy. Her answer is actually fairly simple:

"They ask me how I do it, but I tell them that's just me," Kelner explains. "I enjoy life and try to make the most if it."



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arry Zilbert has always had a love for cars, especially the classics. In a way, his affinity for automobiles is what helped him launch a jewelry business that's still revving after 26 years.

It began when Zilbert sold his well-loved, white-and-red 1974 Corvette Roadster to buy inventory and open Cleveland Jewelry Exchange inside Carl's supermarket in Bedford. The supermarket eventually closed and Zilbert moved his business across the street.

Zilbert is still buying, designing and selling fine jewelry, a vocation that has allowed him to fulfill his lifelong devotion to the collection and restoration of classic cars.

"Lifelong" is not an exaggeration, at least according to the Beachwood-born businessman. "There are pictures of me as an infant at car shows," he says, since his father also collected classic cars.

After being in business for two years, Zilbert found another 1974 Corvette Roadster to replace the one he sold. He then bought

a red-and-black 1928 Buick Roadster - a true beauty - from a family friend.

Zilbert drives his vehicles daily, weather permitting, and is a member of local car clubs. He can also be spotted with his wife, Lise, and daughter, Zoe, tooting his ahhooga horn as he cruises around Beachwood.

The hippie-looking shop owner, buys his vehicles in restorable condition, taking between two to three years to refurbish them with help from his mechanically-inclined friends. You may have seen him in one of his many television commercials and may recognize his tagline, "Don't Mail It Away, I'll Pay You Today!"

Zilbert always has his eyes open to add to his collection. "I look for style, beauty and uniqueness," he said. "A good-old fashioned muscle car with some spine-vibrating horsepower has



its merits as well."

"I'm old school," he adds. "It's great when you turn the key and the car starts to shake."

Transforming a four-wheeled find into a road-ready racer is a joy in and of itself, Zilbert maintains. "You're taking something from nothing, and recasting it into something beautiful," he says, "It's like taking broken scrap gold and loose diamonds to create an amazing masterpiece."

He showed us his latest love. his 1928 Buick Model 115 rumble-seat Roadster, one of approximately 4,500 built. It was an upper-middle class car that sold new for \$1,180, and there are probably less than 200 remaining. "I'm the third owner of this vehicle, which was intended to be a summer-only car," Zilbert said. "There is no



heater and are no roll-up windows. Instead, it has side-curtains. It also has a golf-club door with original wood-shafted clubs, a feature on most 'better' Roadsters. The car was for top-down fun only and was the sports car of the day."

"This is restored back to original, although I picked the color,"



Zilbert told us. "It's the original engine drive train, and has been painted and restored back to new. It was a complete car with an amateur restoration when I got it. I didn't have to chase parts, which made the restoration easy."

The chance to create something unique and lovely is part of what got Zilbert into the iewelry business. The Beachwood native's first gig was in 1981 as an assistant manager at Zale's Richmond Mall store. Soon thereafter, he moved to Florida to become a wholesale jewelry representative, working from Vero Beach to South Miami. After four years, he returned to Northeast Ohio, this time for good, since it felt like home.

Cleveland Jewelry Exchange, located in Meadowbrook Market Square on the corner of Rockside and Northfield roads, has a complete line of custom jewelry, including wedding and engagement rings, pendants and bracelets. Zilbert prides himself on his excellent jewelry repairs and the custom designs he creates for a steady base of clients.

He can't do all of this alone, and credits his manager, Karen Agin Feingold, for being his right-hand gal by selling, controlling inventory and being excellent with the customers.

"I've been working with Larry since 1993 and love it here," Feingold told us. "It's a fun place to work. Customers feel like family when they come in to see us." Feingold is a Beachwood High School graduate, class of 1979.

Zilbert isn't the first in his family to sell jewelry. His grandfather owned a jewelry store in Toledo, and today, his Uncle Henry helps with the casting and designing. Zilbert likes creating and selling equally. "I liked the idea of selling something that lasts, has value and can become an heirloom," he says. "It's so rewarding to see a smile on the face of satisfied customers. When customers are happy, they refer their friends and family.

To help separate Cleveland Jewelry Exchange from the competition, Zilbert buys gold to melt and recast into custom jewelry. Not only does the creation process cut out the middle man and save the customer money, it gives him a thrill topped only by taking a newly-restored car out for its first spin.

"Both of them can be works of art," Zilbert says.

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Bee Buzz from a Beachwood Beekeeper

ccording to Greenpeace* The honeybee, responsible for 80 percent of pollination worldwide, is disappearing globally. If we lose bees, our way of life and our food system will be endangered. From this awareness, as well as from a deep amazement and gratitude for the honeybees, HoneyBeeLocal and HoneyBeeJewish have sprung.

Founded by Beachwood resident Amalia Haas, these two companies were developed to help sustain our community's natural environment and help the hive to thrive through honeybee advocacy and education.

"Starting HoneyBeeLocal and HoneyBeeJewish is definitely the result of a personal and professional journey for me. My training is in music and Jewish education with a strong emphasis on nature," Haas told us. "After working as Hillel director for about a decade, I expanded into general and Jewish environmental programs, and was very active in the Jewish gardening movement when it was first starting nationally."

When asked what motivated her to become a beekeeper, Haas mused, "When you become passionate about health and organic gardening, you cannot help but notice the forgotten pollinators. Hardly a plant on earth would bear fruit were it not visited by a bee."

"The devotion of the honeybees to their calling and the complexity of the hive inspire humility and amazement. Those girls are always hustling," she says. "I have six children of my own, including a set of twins, but my bees are always working harder. They don't stop!"

Honeybee Facts:

- Bees collect nectar and process it into honey.
- Hives produce honey, pollen, propolis, beeswax, royal jelly and bee venom. (Haas views the hive as a "flying pharmacy" packed with health-inducing

and maintaining possibilities.

- Bees use honey for insulation against extreme temperatures as well as for food.
- Honeybees don't hibernate. By vibrating in a cluster around their queen, they keep their hive a warm 80 dearees. They raise the hive temperature to 90 degrees in January to start raising young

bees for March flowers.

- A colony has 1 queen, 95% workers (females with stingers) and 5% drones (males, without stingers).
- Bee stings are life-threatening to 1% of humans, but may be beneficial to the rest of us. Bee-venom therapy is practiced widely abroad and in the U.S. for treatment of Arthritis, MS, colitis and auto-immune diseases.
- Much like a cell in our bodies, a single bee cannot survive. A colony of bees is a super-organism, a highly organized social community continuously responding to

a multitude of "data" from inside and outside the hive.

With a proven talent for creating fun programs, Haas is often hired to entertain at birthday parties. "I dress up as Buzzy the bee, and bring props to teach the kids about different jobs in a beehive."

"We generally don't realize all the gifts the bees give us, including a majority of the food we eat every dav." Haas said.

Bees are endangered because of their forage, or the food that's available to them. When land is developed, habitats available to honevbees are diminished, and they fall prey to disease and malnutrition.

"One of the best things we can do is plant a variety of flowers," Haas said. "The more perennial plants we have on our property, the better. As a community, organic maintenance is the way to go since pesticides can easily kill off an entire hive in a day."

Haas practices what she preaches by being a treatment-free beekeeper to help keep bees healthy and produce the purest honey available.

Haas is packaging and selling varietal, locust, apple, bamboo and blueberry honey for the Jewish holidays. She also sells gift baskets and

beeswax products.

Additionally, her companies provide hive-removal and swarm-collection services. She encourages individuals to call her office instead of spraying the bees.

Through education, Haas hopes to inspire a movement to plant native plants that are supportive of the pollinators in Beachwood. "I would love to develop a 'beestravaganza,' or festival where people can learn about bees and do fun arts and crafts

projects right here in Beachwood."

Previously, Haas has been a mover in the Jewish organic-farming movement and co-founder of a kosher, pastured poultry company called The Green Taam. She is currently working towards her Master Organic Beekeeper certification. 
Beachwood Elementary PTO Presents:

Ask PBC: Your Mental Health Q&A

Q: I would like my children to respect me more. What am I doing wrong?

Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor Peggy Sue Smith, M.Ed., LPCC, responds:

The most frequent concerns I have heard from parents for the past 12 years are usually related to children being respectful. Here are some examples:

"If I raised my voice to my parents the way that my child talks to me, I would be in trouble."

"I took all privileges away and he just doesn't care! What can I do???"

"Spankings and punishments worked for me and I turned out okay."

"What's the matter with kids today??" (That was a song from the '50s.)

It's a different world for children today than it was for their parents. Our neighbors' doors were open and most children felt safe on the street. Crises described in the newspaper or on TV were happening elsewhere.

Today, children are aware of serious crime (often in their own neighborhoods). Rather than communicating and playing with friends on the playground or on the block, a technical device is preferred by many kids (and parents) to connect. Social media is taking over for real face-to-face talking - and these are only a few aspects of our lives that create challenges for parents.

Consider this notion: Maybe we are having trouble really understanding them (our kids, that is) and need more "quality" listening time. Many parents today are working, taking care of the home, taking care of aging parents, driving kids to activities and trying to find time for social, personal and familial activities. The estimated average time most parents spend with their children daily is about 10 minutes (I am referring to quality time, simply being with your child and doing something that the child wants to do).

When parents begin to double that statistic (20 minutes daily, 40 minutes three times a week or if possible two hours on the weekend) negative behaviors/feelings (which may be seen as disrespectfulness) typically diminish and the relationship is strengthened. Some parents triple or quadruple that quality time and see faster results.

Parents who deeply love their children may be frustrated with the way kids express their feelings and thoughts. Often parents are perplexed. "What's wrong with my child?" is a question I hear often.

Many kids who are really in trouble are the ones who do not express what they are really feeling. The best question to ask is: "Are my kids able to really tell me what's on their minds?" Don't beat yourself up as a parent if you feel as though you are in a state of fear, frustration, anger - perhaps your kids are too! Open communication is the very best tool.

Ask yourself: "What would Love do here?"

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







Jennifer Weiner Featured at National Council of Jewish Women's Opening Program

BHS Class of '74 Remembers Classmates Struck by Lightening

n September 8, 1970, 65 Beachwood boys went out on the field for football practice. Shortly after they began their drills the rain began. It was the first day of school for these 9th graders and the day was anything but ordinary. Thunder clapped, and six boys along with the freshman football coach were down on the ground. Two boys didn't get up. Arny Finkle and Robert Jacobs were both struck by lightening and pronounced dead at 5:15 p.m.

Since that day, the class of '74 never forgot the two boys and still cringe when there is a thunderstorm. Today, a rock holding a plague in memory of Finkle and Jacobs sits on the football field in their memory.

On Friday, August 1, following a tour of the renovated high school, Rabbi Rosie Barron Haim of The Temple-Tifereth Israel led a plaque-rededication ceremony in the boys' memory. Rabbi Haim is the wife of Marshall Barron, BHS class of '74, who was on the field on that tragic day.

In attendance at this ceremony, along with classmates, were Jacobs' parents Sol and Carol Jacobs, and his older sister, Sherry Kovacs. Also present were Finkle's older sisters, Maureen Kapasi and Barbara DiScenna, and his nephew, Brandon Finkle.

VOTERS TO DECIDE ON NOPEC

Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council Natural Gas Program

Beachwood City Council recently voted to place an issue on the City's November ballot to enroll our city residents in a natural gas program offered by the Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council (NOPEC).

NOPEC is an energy "aggregator" that uses bulk buying practices to buy gas at attractive rates. NOPEC then passes those rates on to their customers.

There are 174 communities in 10 Northeast Ohio counties that are served by NOPEC.

Beachwood has been enrolled in NOPEC's electricity program for years and has experienced no problems. NOPEC officials estimate that NOPEC saves Beachwood electric customers as much as \$250,000 annually citywide by offering discounted electricity.



Beachwood's voters must approve this measure before it can be enacted. If voters defeat the measure, residents will continue to buy natural gas as they do now and NOPEC will not be an option. The decision will be determined by the voters.

If it is approved by voters in November, all residents will have the option to "opt out" of NOPEC – meaning they would still be free to contract with natural gas providers other than NOPEC.

If the NOPEC measure is approved by the voters of Beachwood, there will be two public hearings conducted to further discuss this issue. These hearings would likely be held in December. The first delivery of NOPEC gas would arrive as early as March 2015.




When Beachwood resident Richard Barson watched the devastation of 9/11, he felt that Beachwood should have a memorial. His persistence paid off. In

- Call 911 and ask for an officer to confirm the issue.



Threatening Telemarketing Calls Targeting Local Consumers and Businesses

alls to BBB indicate that phony IRS agents and bogus utility bill collectors are at it again in our area.

It's NOT the IRS - Do not panic if you get a call or find a message on your voicemail from the IRS threatening to arrest you for tax fraud and tax evasion. The call is part of a telemarketing scam aimed at getting you to send payment in the form of a wire transfer or preloaded debit card.

A local consumer told BBB his voicemail was from "Melvin," who said he was calling from the Tax Audit Department of the IRS. Melvin claimed he had received notification concerning tax evasion and tax fraud and that petitions were about to be filed at the courthouse. The message also stated an arrest warrant was being issued and to call 202.864.1329. BBB called the number, and was answered by someone with a heavy accent who claimed to be at IRS headquarters in Washington DC. Other voices could be heard in the background. Eerily, the consumer's sister received a similar call on the same day. Her person referenced tax audits done on specific years and advised her to get an attorney. They did not ask for any sort of payment during the call, but instructed her to call another number. Rather, she phoned her accountant, who assured her the call was a scam.

The IRS will always send taxpayers a written notification of any tax due via the U.S. mail. The IRS never asks for credit card, debit card or prepaid card information over the telephone.

Report such calls to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 1.800.366.4484.

Phony Utility Shutoff Calls - Another telemarketing scam targeting businesses has reappeared in recent days. Local businesses have reported receiving calls from individuals claiming to be from the electric company threatening shutoff if an unpaid balance is not resolved immediately.

A Westlake business recently received a call from "Kenny Johnson" who said he was calling from Ohio Edison about an unpaid bill. The call came from 866.978.7856. The Westlake business owner reported he was targeted by the same scam last year. The 866 number is mentioned online by others who have received similar calls, across the

If you receive a call claiming to be from your utility company and feel pressured for immediate payment or personal information, hang up the phone and call the customer service number on your utility bill.







"A New Leaf" - A Free, Healthy-Eating Program

University Hospitals Ahuja Medical Center and City of Warrensville Heights' free healthy-eating program, "A New Leaf," begins third school year

he "A New Leaf" healthy-eating program at Warrensville Heights Middle School, collaboration between University Hospitals (UH) Ahuja Medical Center and the City of Warrensville Heights, begins its third school year in September.

The program was initiated in early 2013 by UH Ahuja Medical Center President Susan V. Juris and Warrensville Heights Mayor Bradley D. Sellers to establish good eating habits in younger children. It offers students nutrition education and a fresh salad bar for lunch on Wednesdays and Thursdays throughout the school year.

The salad bar is free for all students and includes a mix of romaine lettuce and fresh vegetables. John Selick IV, CEC, executive chef, UH Ahuja Medical Center (pictured), regularly introduces unusual items like quinoa or watermelon

radishes to expand students' awareness and palate.

"This year, I want to show them vegetables they know but that grow in different colors, like yellow and white beets or purple, yellow and red carrots," says Chef Selick. "The cafeteria should be an educational environment that offers vegetables, fruits, whole grains and nutrition information to encourage kids to think about what they're eating."

2013-14 was the first full school year A New Leaf was available to Warrensville Heights Middle School's fifth-, sixth- and seventh-graders. The number of students who each week supplemented their lunch or made their whole meal from the salad bar grew compared to the program's initial year. Nearly 6,500 bowls were used, which was almost 2,100 more than the previous year.



"A New Leaf has given our staff a vital tool to educate our students about nutrition," says Jackie Thompson, food service supervisor, Warrensville Heights City School District. "UH Ahuja Medical Center is providing healthy food varieties and learning to a prime age group - kids who are old enough to be aware of healthy choices and young enough to more easily

break unhealthy eating habits."

A New Leaf is part of UH Ahuja Medical Center's annual Mayor's Initiative for Health and Wellness, a collaboration between the hospital and the surrounding communities. Music Therapy: Why It Works

hroughout the ages, music has remained an essential aspect of day-to-day life for the majority of mankind in just about every culture. From its beginnings in early man's ancient 40,000-year-old bone flutes to modern-day mp3 players, music has truly stood the test of time. But why has this universal language been so tightly woven into humanity and how is it used as a form of therapy?

Plato recognized the effects of music on the human soul, advocating the positive effects of harmony on character and health. Fast forwarding to modern day, scientist have mapped brain activity using FMRI (functional magnetic resonance imaging)

during musical play. Results show that music is diffusely activated throughout the brain regardless of pathology. This allows music to access memories and emotions, bypassing neural pathways and creating a "bridge" to these "lost" brain sections.

In the face of pathology and deterioration, music therapy has developed to address and treat individuals by strengthening both physiological and psycho-social aspects of the whole person. This use of music as medicine has grown and been employed throughout the modern healthcare field, becoming recognized as an effective modality of holistic treatment.

lammarino's right hand man.



Cimoroni is CEO and president of an advertising firm and co-founder of the Wrestlers in





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


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
