Hochheiser's civic involvement includes: Member of the Beachwood Arts Council, Beachwood 100 and Fairmount Temple Sisterhood; past member of Beachwood Boosters, Friends of the Beachwood Library and multiple Beachwood Schools' committees, including Beachwood Boosters (track, cheerleading, volleyball, Drama Club, Beachwood Elementary, Middle School and High School PTOs, Bryden Publishing Center, school levy support and After Proms.

Hochheiser was also chair of the following committees: Elementary PTO, Kids Care; multiple bake sales; Innisbrook

fundraiser; Community PTO, Membership committee; and Beachwood Schools Foundation Scholarship, 2009-2014.

She also served on the board at Fairmount Temple, as Community PTO president (2005-2009), and as trustee (2008-14) and president (2013-14) on the Beachwood Schools Foundation.

Hochheiser's favorite and most meaningful contribution to our community has been taking charge of the Beachwood Community PTO Garage Sale, which is by far the district's largest fundraiser, raising between \$15,000 and \$20,000 each year. She was part of the initial development committee in 1999 and chaired the sale from 2003-2010. Each year, the garage sale is a massive, community-wide effort that draws thousands of people to Beachwood.

"Chairing the event has been one of the most meaningful parts of my life – meeting and working with so many dedicated citizens and students and being able to present gifts to our schools that would not otherwise have been possible," Hochheiser said. "The garage sale also afforded me the opportunity to meet shoppers from outside of Beachwood. Seeing the same families from year to year, watching their children grow, and meeting the newest family members were particularly special to me. I also believe that the Garage Sale gave those from outside the area an opportunity to see Beachwood and its residents in a way that they never had before."

Hochheiser always pledged to give as much back to our community in an effort to express her appreciation. Furthermore, she cherished this time and felt that by involving her daughters every step of the way, her dedication to our community was passed along to the next generation of Hochheisers.

Hochheiser and her husband, Al, have two daughters, Lesli and Morgan, both Beachwood High School graduates. Lesli is now 32 and Morgan is 24.

LogicJunction Uses Video Game Technology to Generate Winning Software

he future is here and no, it's clearly not flying cars or teleportation. It's actually about the "gamification" of our world, where elements of video game technology are reaching into other corners of life, imbued in software that can educate or guide you. Some manifestations of these advances include the use of interactive 3D virtual characters (avatars) that offer instruction and indoor "wayfinding" applications for, quite literally, finding your way inside large buildings.

Helping to bring these types of advances forward into your technological universe – your smartphone or tablet or a kiosk when entering an institution – is LogicJunction, a cutting-edge, interactive software company located in Commerce Park and run by Beachwood resident Mark Jowell.

With 14 full-time employees and contractors hired as needed, the company resembles what is more often seen on the west coast, with its high-tech, innovative focus. The gaming technology developed out there keeps engineers here happy, using skills generally untapped in this market. And with the healthcare industry being one of the targets for its products, the Cleveland area is a great match.

"We are creating products that enhance patient experiences," explains Jowell, a South African native, with a law degree and MBA on his resume. In 2001, he arrived in Atlanta where he founded the company, then moved the business to Beachwood in 2006 to be closer to family, to have access to great schools for his children, age 8 and 11, and to enjoy minimal traffic.

Since information is easily imparted through human communication, the 3D character creations deliver well as personal docents or greeters displayed on kiosks in a hospital setting. Their application also extends to use in museums and trade shows, and the company is exploring expansion across other markets and verticals including amusement parks, college campuses and stadiums.

The primary niche now, however, is for their use in hospitals. As such, the character appears as a nurse who trains either staff or patients through an app used on a tablet or other mobile platform.

In the case of staff training, one software package features a nurse teaching how a new infusion pump functions. She explains how to program dosage levels, and she examines real life examples, where staff members can interact with the pump in three dimensions. Another software development involves a virtual stroke patient where emergency medical technicians and nurses can learn the standardized 11-step stroke assessment process.

For patients, one LogicJunction creation tasks a 3D nurse with disseminating discharge instruction. The virtual nurse uses photos and videos to convey information, and

the software allows patients to interactively immerse themselves in experiences through the use of in-app games and simulations.

The benefit to using this approach is a reduction in staff time spent training patients and consistency and comprehensiveness in the lessons imparted.

The other major product LogicJunction offers is wayfinding software, enabling "door to door" navigation in an unfamiliar setting. By downloading an app, the software taps GPS functionality to offer step-by-step guidance in 3D. Directions begin with driving to the hospital, identifying parking options and routing the patient through the hospital to reach the desired office for an appointment. The Cleveland Clinic is one client among several hospitals nationwide offering this technology.

Jowell admits, though, that fewer than 10% of hospitals in the U.S. offer this type of technology, so the company accepts the role of educating and expanding the market. Another one of his ambitions is to create products that enable greater transparency across the healthcare ecosystem. He reports that huge inefficiencies exist with access to patient health records, and he envisions a day when accessibility is possible across many platforms and mobile devices.

Beat the Heat This Summer

Summer is finally here! The living is easy and everyone wants to be outside enjoying the fresh air and sunshine. Long, warm days offer the perfect setting for picnics, camping, swimming and family barbeques. However, just as cold weather can pose certain threats to our health, so can the hot and humid conditions of an Ohio summer.

It is important to keep in mind that intense heat is most dangerous for the very young, elderly, obese and chronically ill; therefore, extra precautions should be taken by individuals within those categories. For most of us, however, the following simple tips can help us to enjoy a safe and happy summer.

Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing

• Wear a wide-brimmed hat, sunglasses, protective clothing and sunscreen when in the sun

• Drink plenty of fluids, avoiding alcohol and caffeinated beverages. Dehydration can be a serious and potentially life-threatening problem, so keep those water bottles handy

• Limit high-protein foods as these increase metabolic heat (try the refreshing fruit salad recipe included here for a tasty treat in the heat)

• Avoid outdoor exertion and sun exposure between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m., the hottest time of the day with the highest UV rays. A simple way to remember is: Short Shadow = Seek Shade

• Whenever possible, seek out air-conditioned surroundings when the temperature really soars Perhaps the most important safety tip for summer is to protect yourself against the cancer-causing and skin-aging effects of the sun. Your first line of protection is clothing so backlight your hat and clothing to test for sunlight "leakage" and look for clothing lines that come with built-in sun protection. Pick a sunscreen with UVA and UVB protection and an SPF of 30 or more and use it liberally and often.

Sunburn, which has been termed a "precancerous glow," can be a serious condition, sometimes leading to severe pain, redness and even blistering. In such cases, you should always seek medical attention. For milder cases, aloe vera gel, ice packs, nonprescription pain relievers and hydrocortisone cream may provide relief. However, prevention is always the better choice.

Remember, a tan is just another word for damaged skin that leads to sagging, splotching, wrinkles and premature aging. And, cumulative exposure to the sun can lead to skin cancer. Artificial tanning beds and lamps are just as dangerous as natural sunlight. In fact, their prolonged use can double your risk of skin cancer. Check your skin regularly and, if you discover new spots or raised marks, see your doctor or dermatologist immediately.

RAINBOW FRUIT SALAD

Good as a side dish, snack or dessert, this salad, made from fresh fruit, is naturally low in fat, saturated fat and sodium, and is cholesterol free.

Mix together in a large bowl:

- 1 large mango, peeled and diced
- 2 cups fresh blueberries
- 2 bananas, sliced
- 2 cups fresh strawberries, halved
- 2 cups seedless grapes
- 2 nectarines, peels and separated into sections
- 1 kiwi fruit, peeled and sliced

Combine the following in a small bowl:

- 1/3 cup unsweetened orange juice
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1-1/2 tablespoons honey
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- Dash of nutmeg

Pour over the fruit and toss to coat. Serve immediately.

Yield: 12 four-ounce servings with 96 calories per serving.

University Hospitals seeking participants for stress management study

Eligible participants are non-smokers, between ages 21 and 60, and not taking blood pressure medication

The Connor Integrative Medicine Network at University Hospitals (UH) is seeking participants for a clinical research study to test whether stress-management training can help lower blood pressure in people with pre-hypertension. A first-of-its-kind study, the Serenity Study is a collaboration between UH, Kent State University and the University of Pennsylvania.

Researchers are hoping to enroll 90 participants in the coming weeks. Eligible participants are non-smokers, between the ages of 21 and 60, and not taking blood pressure medication. The program involves an eight-week, groupbased, stress-management class, each weekly session lasting about 2.5 hours, and one full-day stress-management retreat.

David Fresco, PhD, professor of Psychological Sciences at Kent State University and adjunct associate professor of psychiatry at Case Western Reserve School of Medicine, is the principal investigator on the study. "We've long known of a simple straightforward way to manage one's blood pressure," Dr. Fresco says. "It involves following a regimen of diet and exercise. Trouble is, things that are simple are not always easy. Many of us struggle to follow a healthy lifestyle, and stress makes it so much harder. We believe that teaching individuals skills for stress management may help them deal with stress head-on and strengthen their resolve to make a healthy lifestyle a priority in their lives."

A thorough assessment of blood pressure will be conducted at the beginning and end of the eight-week program, and researchers will follow up with participants at six and 12 months for further blood pressure assessments. Because many assessments will be made at Connor Integrative Medicine Network's offices (25001 Emery Road, Warrensville Heights), it is suggested that study participants live within a reasonable driving distance.

The five-year study is funded through a \$500,000 grant to Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine. The funding is part of a \$3.7 million grant that includes the Connor Integrative Medicine Network, Dr. Fresco and Joel Hughes, PhD, at Kent State University, and Jeffrey Greeson, PhD, at University of Pennsylvania. 





BICYCLE SAFETY TIPS

Many bicycle-related crashes resulting in injury or death are associated with the bicyclist's behavior, including not wearing a helmet, riding into a street without stopping, turning left or swerving into traffic that is coming from behind, running a stop sign, and riding the wrong way in traffic. Follow the rules of the road.

- WEAR A PROPERLY FITTED BICYCLE HELMET
- ADJUST YOUR BICYCLE TO FIT



Stand over your bicycle. There should be 1 - 2 inches between you and the top tube (bar) if using a road bike and 3 - 4 inches if a mountain bicycle. The seat should be level front to back.

- CHECK YOUR EQUIPMENT Properly inflate tires and check that your brakes work.
- SEE AND BE SEEN

Always wear neon, fluorescent or other bright colors when riding day or night. Wear something that reflects light, such as reflective tape.

- **CONTROL YOUR BICYCLE** Always ride with at least one hand on the handlebars.
- WATCH FOR AND AVOID ROAD HAZARDS
- AVOID RIDING AT NIGHT Make sure you have reflectors and lights on the front and rear.





ATTENTION BICYCLISTS: SLOW DOWN IN PARKS, SHARE PATHS

Maximum bike speed is 10 mph and cyclists should pass on the left. Use verbal signals. Cyclists are encouraged to wear helmets. Individuals under the age of 16 are required to wear helmets.

Thinking Through Summer Fun

t's finally summer! Your children are signed up for camp or a variety of activities and lessons, and the weather is what we dreamed about all through our long, cold, dark winter. Grills are working, flowers are blooming, and kids think summer will last almost forever.

While we are enjoying all the pleasures of summer, let's give a little thought to how to make it beneficial as well as enjoyable for your children.

1. When the kids aren't in a scheduled activity, what are they doing?

With no homework in the evenings, it's easy to say sure, you can watch TV or play electronic games all evening. Easy, but not great for your child. Think about setting strict limits on time in front of a screen (whatever the size!) in favor of more social, participatory, and creative activities. Sending kids outside (especially if there are others on your street) without a planned activity is a great way to get them to be creative, develop social skills, and learn to solve problems without resorting to calling in an adult referee. Just set some geographic and safety boundaries, and see what happens!

2. Plan some rainy day activities

Cook together, play a board game, do an art project, read together, write a book about your child with your child, with illustrations, of course. There is no way to overstate the benefits of spending quality time and creating lasting memories for both of you. But when it has to be child only, how about asking your child to do some creative on his/her own. Whether they are budding cooks, artists, writers, actors, architects or engineers, have some materials around that appeal to their interests and age level and give them an opportunity to create something. An older child may be able to cook a healthy dinner for the family with minimal supervision. A child who likes to build may create something no one has ever seen before. Likewise, a budding actor may gather friends and or siblings and create a play for a family audience. Consider giving your young artist a section of wall in a playroom or bedroom and free rein to paint it. It's really not that hard to paint over it later.

3. Don't ignore the academics altogether

"Summer slide" is very real! Children lose about three months' worth of learning if they don't engage in academic learning over the summer. And, they lose more in math than they do in reading. If your child is still mastering basic math facts, try adding 5-10 minutes a day with a computer game aimed at practicing those facts. Typing "math facts games" into your web browser will bring up a long list of game sites. If your child already knows his/her facts, but has learned them fairly recently, playing the games, three or four a week for a few minutes, will prevent the facts from slipping away over the summer.

This information was provided by The Tutoring Center. If math, reading or writing were struggles last year, or if next year's classes looks daunting, consider a summer program. BHS Auditorium Renovation Update

Dear Beachwood Community:

Last October, the School District retained the architectural firm Westlake Reed Leskosky to redesign the Beachwood High School auditorium. At that time, the project was scheduled to be completed by the fall of 2015. Since then, WRL met with various stakeholders and developed a custom design for our auditorium that features new staging and seating configurations, as well as state-of-the-art lighting and sound along with other enhancements. We are confident in the direction of our design and that the auditorium will be the premiere performing arts venue that our community expects and deserves.

Concurrent with the design process, the District retained the construction firm The Albert M. Higley Co. to act as the construction manager using a method known as "Construction Manager at Risk." The CMAR process, among other things, requires the construction manager to set a "Guaranteed Maximum Price" that is intended to avoid disputes with subcontractors and unforeseen costs. Following this delivery method over the past several months has not produced these anticipated benefits. Therefore, after conferring with our owner's representative and legal counsel, the Administration has determined that continuing with this project under the CMAR method is not in the best interest of the district.

Accordingly, the Beachwood City School District has terminated its agreement with The Albert M. Higley Co. and will be entering into a new agreement under a "Construction Manager as Advisor" method. By making this change, <u>the Board</u> and Administration of the Beachwood City School District anticipate saving several hundred thousand taxpayer dollars. Any fees paid to the CMAR as the result of terminating the contract are nominal. Information yielded to date from the CMAR process has value in moving forward with this new method.

By state law, the District must advertise for the new construction manager, with whom we are prepared to move forward immediately utilizing the design developed by WRL. However, due to the change in the construction delivery method, we will no longer meet the anticipated opening date this fall. The Board and Administration strive to finish all projects on time and within budget. We are cognizant that the lack of an auditorium is an inconvenience. However, we refuse to compromise taxpayer dollars just to say that we finished on time. We remain committed to providing our community with the quality project it deserves.

As always, we thank you for your understanding and support. We promise to keep you informed as we continue with the auditorium project.

Following Your Passion, At Any Age

Lizabeth Fink has always had a passion for travel. She has always traveled as much as possible and is very thankful to her parents, who shared their love of travel with her and her two sisters. To date, Fink has been to areas in approximately 42 countries, including Iceland, Costa Rica, Portugal, Greece, Spain, Czech Republic, Russia, Argentina, Belize, Guatemala, Ireland and England, and continues to grow the list.

"I have always been fascinated by other cultures and love meeting people from all over the world," she told us. "I am most interested in history, art, archaeology, architecture, music and cuisine."

Some of Fink's youngest travel experiences take her back to overnight camp in Maine and family trips to Cape Cod and the Caribbean. She recalls her experience in Mexico, between her junior and senior high school years, where she studied Spanish at the Instituto Tecnologico y de Estudios Superiores de Monterrey or ITESM (in English: Monterrey Institute of Technology and Higher Education). That, along with former years of studying Spanish, enables Fink to speak the language while traveling and while with Spanish-speaking friends.

She also completed an Ulpan (program designed to teach adult immigrants to Israel the basic language skills of conversation, writing and comprehension) at Kibbutz Ma'agan Michael in Israel, and participated in an archaeological dig at Gamla, in the Golan. Although she admits that her Hebrew knowledge is basic, Fink recognizes that it starts to come back when she is exposed to it for a while.

Following a seven-month stint in Israel, Fink toured Europe with a Eurail Pass and has returned to Europe to ride the rails several times since then.

"I consider myself a global citizen and love to share my travel interests with others, hoping to inspire them to travel themselves," Fink told us. "My great passion is creating off-thebeaten-track itineraries in addition to seeing great cities and the usual places of interest."

Fink always finds that by venturing out to places off the radar of most tourists, you find yourself among locals or nationals where you can learn more about the culture.

"It always heightens the excitement and makes things more interesting," she says. "Plus, it often takes me out of my comfort zone by forcing me to use some foreign-language phrases or words to help get by."

"Just knowing a few words of a country's language goes a long way when speaking with locals," she added. "It shows that you are open, friendly and curious."

Fink also uses public transportation where available, saying she loves the sense of exploration and navigation, and is proud of the fact that she never uses a GPS and doesn't plan to in the near future.

"I like to discover places the oldschool way by downloading maps and directions to my devices, or by using Google Earth to 'drive' a route, so I am familiar with potential obstacles," she says.

In addition to occasionally staying in some major hotels, Fink usually

opts for boutique venues, bed and breakfasts, and more recently, condominiums or flats booked through VRBO (Vacation Rentals by Owner), HomeAway and airbnb, saying that it's always a great joy to shop and live, for however briefly, in a neighborhood.

Fink has a B.A. in History with a focus on International Studies and Western European culture from Cleveland State University, and a Master of Library and Information Science from Kent State University. She worked for many years in libraries and academia, and now focuses her time on travel, a career she had been thinking about since the mid-80s.

To follow her passion for travel, Fink's current endeavor is to serve as a tour host for a guided trip to South Africa and Victoria Falls in Zimbabwe in January 2016, with stops in Cape Town, Eastern Cape, Kruger National Park and Johannesburg. She is also promoting guided trips to Israel, the Mediterranean region or virtually anywhere in the world where there is an interest. She is working with Heavenly International Tours, owned by Elisha Ben Yitzhak, whom she first met 33 years ago prior to going to Israel.

"I am very excited about this next phase of my life," Fink told us. "I recognize how little time we have on our planet and understand that we need to make the most of it."

Fink is also passionate about antiquities and ancient monuments, and is saddened to know that some are being destroyed by the current world crises. On this note, she would like to be involved in some sort of effort to



help preserve precious cultural sites for future generations. "That would be a dream come true," she said.

When asked about secret closeto-home places, Fink mentioned Serpentine Mound, Hopewell Culture National Historical Park, Great Seal State Park and Fallingwater.

In closing, Fink says, "When traveling, don't be afraid. Learn a little bit of the language if you can and go outside your comfort zone to see things you may not normally want to see. It expands your mind."

People have always said that Fink should be a travel agent, and now she's doing it. "It's never too late to start something new. Travel opens our eyes and hearts to the world around us," she said.



Milestones 13th Annual Autism Spectrum Disorder Conference

These educational workshops will increase the knowledge and skills that medical professionals use to provide services to patients with autism. The Medical Track was planned in accordance with the accreditation requirements and policies of the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) through the joint providership of Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine and Milestones.

"When planning this year's conference, Milestones solicited suggestions from self-advocates not only about how to make the information shared at the conference relevant to persons with autism but also to ensure that the environment is as welcoming as possible. The goal of this conference is to help individuals with autism reach their unique potential and fully participate in our community – the best way to do that is by listening to self-advocates," explained Hoffer Skoff.

Letters from Gelvan

n the 1970s, when Geraldine Adelman Powers' father was living with her, she found a green tallit bag filled with letters that were written in Yiddish. When she asked about them, her father, Morris Adelman was reluctant to share their history.

He promised he would, but it never happened. He told her that these 21 letters were written by his father, David Peretz Andiman, from his shtetl in Gelvan, Lithuania.

Powers was eager to have the letters translated. She wanted to know more about her family history and knew there were answers that had been tenderly preserved in these letters, which were written between 1909 and 1925.

In 1973, one month after her father passed away, Powers had the letters translated into English and found that they revealed a family history about life in Gelvan, a history of poverty, pain, devotion and those left behind. "Once the letters had been translated, I realized why my dad would not, could not, emotionally share them with me," Powers told us.

"The contents of the letters revealed a secret and hidden family history," Powers added. "When the secret was revealed, our family's outlook on the past changed."

The letters graphically express many hardships, and especially the lack of food. People were starving to death. The letters emphasize keeping the Shabbos and getting married. And they end with a shocking murder.

Early on, Powers shared the letters with Leatrice Rabinsky, who often used them for teaching purposes, and who repeatedly told Powers, "This is a book, Gerry. It's a book."

Powers recently published the book with Windjammer Adventure Publishing under the title "Letters from Gelvan." The book can be purchased on Amazon.com or by calling Aurora, Inc. at 330.995.3228.

The original Yiddish letters are archived as MS.4828, at Western Reserve Historical Society.

"My dad asked me to bury the letters with him, but I did not honor his request," Powers said.

"I had to tell the story, so I wrote the book and I am at peace now."

Parkinson's Pals Continues to Raise Funds for a Cure

arkinson's Pals fifth annual fundraiser is slated for July 17, with the goal of raising more funds to help find a cure for and create awareness about Parkinson's Disease. This year's event, "Party in CLE for Parkinson's," will be held at The Arcade, a Cleveland landmark at the Hyatt Regency Cleveland. Since its inception in 2010, Parkinson's Pals has raised more than \$250,000 toward this goal and, along with other Parkinson's community leaders, has helped bring national attention to Cleveland as being in the forefront of combatting this disease and providing services for people who live with Parkinson's.

When Sharon Meckler Roth's father died of Parkinson's in 2000, most people she encountered had a limited understanding of the disease, and she struggled to find a Parkinson's organization for donations in his memory. When Jamie Askari's husband Arman was diagnosed with early-onset Parkinson's, the young family's life changed, with Arman ultimately retiring from his thriving cardiology practice. Askari, Roth, and a group of others similarly affected by Parkinson's Disease, worked together to form Parkinson's Pals. Until Michael J. Fox shared the news that he had young-onset Parkinson's in 1998 (seven years after his 1991 diagnosis), public understanding for the disease was minimal, and it is still common for Parkinson's patients to feel very alone, hide their illness and even become housebound.

Parkinson's Pals has donated \$185,000 to the Michael J. Fox Foundation for Parkinson's Research (where Parkinson's Pals was recognized at a Fox Foundation MVP event); funded Dr. Cameron McIntyre's Neuromodulation Center at Case Western Reserve University, that focuses on Deep Brain Stimulation (DBS) and explores what is necessary to combat the effects of PD; funded Dr. Hubert Fernandez at the Cleveland Clinic Center for Neurological Restoration for clinical research projects, to help Parkinson's patients who are suffering from non-motor problems of this devastating disease; and donated to InMotion, a community-based, nonprofit support center in Warrensville Heights, that focuses on the programs and services that integrate the physical, medical, and emotional dimensions of wellness for persons with Parkinson's Disease and other movement disorders, which opened in March 2015.

"We are thrilled with the response from our community to help raise funds for Parkinson's, and we feel incredibly grateful that Cleveland has emerged as such a strong leader in the fight to cure this disease and help people who have it," Roth said. "Parkinson's Pals is committed to supporting research at the Fox Foundation and locally, and we're very excited to be a part of funding In-Motion, which is already making a huge difference in the lives of Parkinson's patients in our community." Parkinson's disease is a neurodegenerative disorder of unknown cause that affects nearly 5 million individuals worldwide, with approximately 35,000 in Northeast Ohio.

Along with fellow board-member Sheila Margolis, Roth and Askari are chairpersons for the July 17 fundraiser, and not only were all three raised and educated in Beachwood, but also many of the committee are Beachwood alumna, including Amy Berns, Sherri Blaushild, Andi Fenton, Marci Garson, Kerry Glueck, Karen Hess, Leslie Goodman and Lori Sonkin. Committee members Jodi Tucker and Laura Halpert are current Beachwood residents.

n Wednesday, May 6, a busload of Clevelanders left Beachwood Place at 8 a.m. to head to the Statehouse lawn in Columbus, Ohio, to participate in the NCJW/Cleveland's Lobby Day, in partnership with Planned Parenthood and other similarly-minded groups.

At the event, 2,000 pairs of empty shoes were on the Ohio Statehouse lawn, representing the many who could not be there.

NCJW and Planned Parenthood women told legislators "Don't Step on Our Rights," and protested two bills in the Ohio Statehouse which are carefully designed to strip a woman's right to have an abortion, as well as prevent low-income women from accessing preventive and prenatal medical care.

Representative Teresa Fedor, who had an abortion while in the military, spoke to the group that had signs and made their voices heard by meeting with their representatives.

The event, sponsored by the National Council of Jewish Women/Cleveland, was chaired by Roberta Herman and Cyndy Fellenbaum to bring awareness of the anti-choice legislation being presented by Ohio's legislators.

Beachwood Library presents Jim Grant and The Gradall Excavator, First Manufactured in Beachwood Village in 1944

The Gradall excavator was first manufactured in Beachwood by brothers, Ray and Koop Ferwerda. Since that time, the product has grown to be a globally-recognized telescopic boom machine used in road maintenance, construction, mining and the maintenance of steel mill furnaces and ladles.

With the celebration of Beachwood's Centennial, Jim Grant, retired executive of Gradall Industries, Inc., will share the history of the Gradall at the Beachwood Library, on Thursday, July 9 at 7 p.m.

He will explain why this machine was invented, where it was built and how it was first used in construction and road maintenance, with the use of digital vintage photographs and colored 16-mm movies.

In 1943, the Gradall had a rural-pioneer beginning in a garage that was located on the northeast corner of Enterprise Parkway and Chagrin Boulevard, in what was then the Swetland Building, where P.F. Chang's is currently located.

Learn about the Ferwerda brothers and what prompted them to rent a garage in Beachwood to make construction equipment and invent the Gradall, a machine with unmatched versatility due to its five movements that match the human arm.

Grant will also talk about economic times, how the company was affected by the war, its business dealings with Warner & Swasey Company, and how it became a successful business in the U.S. construction industry.

Today, the Gradall continues its industry legacy from the Gradall Industries' production facilities in New Philadelphia. The Gradall name likewise continues as the iconic description for the telescopic boom excavator. Like the names Kleenex[®] and Clorox[®], which are synonymous with tissues and bleach, the name Gradall[®] has become synonymous with the unique and versatile hydraulic excavator and industrial maintenance machine with a triangular telescopic boom.

Be sure to visit the library for Grant's presentation and learn more about the Gradall and Beachwood as a village. Southeastern Equipment, the Ohio Gradall distributor, will have a new Gradall Excavator machine on display at the library for this presentation.

Since his retirement from Gradall Industries in 2005, Grant has published two books, The Gradall, A Story of American Ingenuity, published in 2010, and LOAD HANDLER – The Gradall LOED Materials Handler, published in 2012.
