

Entrepreneurship Is Selling Point at Annual Event

ike Kritzell, a senior at North Canton Hoover High School, was playing around in his basement on his computer last year when he discovered thermochromic pigment on a website. After the ingredient used in sprayable paint dries, the surface will instantly and magically have the ability to change colors when heat is applied, typically through touch. With the help of some friends, Kritzell took this concept and developed a product for the iPhone: a color-changing phone case. Thus, a business was born, logically christened with the name Chameleon Inc.



The case is captivating as it changes from purple to pink, or orange to yellow, black to white or green to blue. Several other color combinations are available, most accessibly from the company website, chameleonja.com. The target demographic is that of his peers, high school and college students, with a price point starting at \$5.

"It's activated by a heat threshold of 86 degrees," Kritzell explains from his post for the day in front of a booth at the annual EntrovationCLE, a celebration of entrepreneurship + innovation (= entrovation) inside Beachwood High School, April 30, 11 am - 6 pm. This represents a change in time and venue, with last year's event held at the Beachwood Community Center on a Friday. It was also formerly branded as the Green Dream.

The event reached maximum capacity with 180 exhibitors, thousands of attendees, a host of food and other truck-based businesses, all assembled for this showcase of products and services that demonstrated entrepreneurialism. Under the direction of Greg Perry, who teaches marketing at BHS through ExcelTECC, a vocational education consortium of eight schools, his 43 senior-level students helped plan the day from inception to completion.

The addition of "CLE" to the event's title reflects a new approach to branding, says Perry, and demonstrates the students' pride in Cleveland. He also noticed a growing entrepreneurial spirit among the show's student participants.

"Their tech savviness allows them to compete in a global market from anywhere with limited expenses and overhead," he reports.

Beachwood Junior Achievement (which operates as a business and EntrovationCLE serves as its company) is advised by the city's community services director Karen Carmen. The group contributed to the day's events by discussing the \$40,000 budget. Some of the money was used to train students in leadership development and to attend a professional marketing conference in Orlando. Also, a donation of \$3,500 was made to Youth Outdoors, a program offered for inner-city children through the **Cleveland Metroparks. Some** remaining money was allocated as seed funding for next year's undertaking. The net result of Junior Achievement's efforts was having EntrovationCLE named Company of the Year, which merited a trophy and a \$1,000 prize.

"The more students see what can be done, the more it serves as an inspiration for others to try," says Carmen. "Sales skills are invaluable in all walks of life."

New this year was the Young Entrepreneurial Market, which featured 50 Northeast Ohio middle school, high school and college participants from 27 schools who came stoked to sell their wares. The market was a partnership with University School's Young Entrepreneur Institute and sponsored by the Burton D. Morgan Foundation.

Booths Offer Full Range of Random Products

A stroll through BHS's halls leads to the discovery of many random startups, such as PuppyMatch LLC (PuppyMatchLLC.com), whose 21-year-old owner, Anthony Gasparro, will coach you on dog breed selection, then locate, pick up and deliver an appropriate puppy for a fee not exceeding what a breeder might charge, he reports.



"I'm a dog trainer, too, so that's part of the value in using my services,"

Gasparro says. "This is a responsible way to choose a puppy."

If one were to contract with his business, then one would likely be in need of proper resting quarters for the new family member, and Gillian McNamara, a 14-year-old Solon student, has the solution. Her Hug-A-Bed creations draw from repurposed sweaters as source material, which she crafts into snug beds for either dogs or cats. So far, she has sold about 50 beds, most priced at \$18. She can be reached at Gillian.m@att.net.

Alongside McNamara's booth was one manned by Shaker Heights High School student Joseph Attias, who was selling a seductive product: Jojo's Addictive Pickles. They're marinated in a trippy, tasty liquid that's sweet and spicy. He started the business as a way to raise money to fund his participation in a band trip to Spain, and he has stuck with it. His mom helped him create the secret recipe, and he's been selling the pickles at





a brisk pace for nearly two years, particularly at his youth group events. Each container is priced at \$6, or three for \$15, and he can be found on the Jojo's Addictive Pickles Facebook page.



If singing is your jam, then Brandyn Armstrong, 24 and from East Cleveland, has a piece of technology to meet your recording needs. He created the Studio Stick, dubbed as "the first portable recording studio for smart phones and tablets" that mimics what a real studio could offer. His excellent website offers a product demonstration at studiostick.net.

For those like University School senior Marc Frankel, who like to fidget and has taken apart and broken many pens in the process, he has the ultimate solution. It's the Fidget Widgets he creates with the help of schoolmate Nick Orlando, which serve active fingers' needs without sacrificing necessary stuff. The students produce their widgets with a 3D printer, purchased for \$700 and drawn from the \$1,000 prize money won in a school

business competition. The widgets are professionally packaged and sold for \$12, with new designs coming out monthly. The plastic is environmentally safe, according to Frankel, and made from PLA, a cornstarch derivative. To optimize your fingers' free time, go to fidgetwidgets.net.

If sports tickle your fancy, there's a cohort of local sports enthusiasts whose fingers essentially do the talking when they post to the Cleveland Sports Talk website (clesportstalk.com, @CLEsportsTalk). The page is packed with content relating to all of Cleveland's teams, featured in videos, slide shows and lots of posts with news and analyses.

"We get 25,000 hits per month, and we have 119,000 Twitter followers,"

according to Zach Shafron, the CST founder and CEO, Solon High School graduate, Class of '15, and Kent State University

sophomore. He's aided by Cam Carmen, director of marketing and communications, and student contributors David Kalk, Peter Zeid, Christian Hinton and Max Alter.

"It's a site by fans for fans," Shafron notes.

Taking their business to the kitchen are BHS Class of '15 graduates Adam Pearl and Taylor Nash, who own Three Kings Bakery (threekingsbakery.org). They make pastries and breads, and their selection includes banana nut, crusted cinnamon, carrot apple and pumpkin glazed.

"Some of the recipes come from my great grandparents who owned Parkview Bakery in Cleveland," reports Pearl. They sell the fruits of their labor mostly online.

Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs Warns Residents of Growing iTunes Gift Card Scam

The Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs warns county residents of all ages to hang up on impostor scams that seek payment in iTunes gift cards.

Consumers across the country have been frightened into sending thousands of dollars' worth of iTunes gift cards to scammers who pose as police, attorneys, debt collectors or IRS agents.

Scammers who previously targeted grandparents have expanded their target groups to include younger consumers, including those who owe money on student loans.

In a typical call, a consumer is told to purchase iTunes gift cards to:

- Avoid arrest for an unpaid student loan or other debt.
- Pay bail or court fees for a relative who has been jailed.

• Avoid being jailed or fined for unpaid taxes.

No legitimate government agency or debt collector accepts payment in ITunes or other gift cards.

"Scammers' game plans are to get you so upset that you overlook holes in their story," said Sheryl Harris, director of the Department of Consumer Affairs. "They push you to pay fast, while you're still in a panic, so you won't check out what they're saying with someone else, be that a relative, police, the IRS or your lender."

Protect yourself:

- Hang up on any caller who makes threats or asks you to pay fines, debts, fees or bail with an iTunes card.
- Never read off the numbers or codes from a gift card to someone who calls you demanding

payment – that's all a scammer needs to steal the card's value.

- Know that, by law, debt collectors are not allowed to threaten you with jail or scare you into making payments.
- No government office accepts iTunes payments.
- Don't tell scammers how you spotted them – it helps them perfect their game. Just hang up. Report scam calls to the Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs at 216.443.7035 or www.consumeraffairs.cuyahogacounty.us.

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Beat the Heat This Summer

Summer is finally here! The living is easy and everyone wants to be outside enjoying the fresh air and sunshine. Long, warm days offer the perfect setting for picnics, camping, swimming and family barbeques. However, just as cold weather can pose certain threats to our health, so can the hot and humid conditions of an Ohio summer.

"It is important to keep in mind that intense heat is most dangerous for the very young, elderly, obese and chronically ill; therefore, extra precautions should be taken by individuals who fit into those categories." says Elma Baron, MD, Director of Lasers and Photomedicine in University Hospitals Department of Dermatology.

For most of us, Dr. Baron recommends following these simple tips which can help us to enjoy a safe and happy summer.

- Wear lightweight, light colored clothing
- Wear a wide-brimmed hat, sunglasses, protective clothing and sunscreen when in the sun
- Drink plenty of fluids, avoiding alcohol and caffeinated beverages. Dehydration can be a serious and potentially life-threatening problem so keep those water bottles handy
- Avoid outdoor exertion and sun exposure between 11 am and 3 pm, the hottest time of the day with the highest UV rays. A simple way to remember is: Short Shadow = Seek Shade
- Whenever possible, seek out air conditioned surroundings when the temperature really soars

"Perhaps the most important safety tip for summer is to protect yourself against the cancer-causing and skin-aging effects of the sun." states Baron. "Your first line of protection is clothing so backlight your hat and clothing to test for sunlight "leakage" and look for clothing lines that come with built-in sun protection. Pick a sunscreen with UVA and UVB protection and an SPF of 30 or more and use it liberally and often."

Sunburn, which has been termed a "precancerous glow," can be a serious condition, sometimes leading to severe pain, redness and even blistering. In such cases, you should always seek medical attention. For milder cases, aloe vera gel, ice packs, nonprescription pain relievers and hydrocortisone cream may provide relief. However, prevention is always the better choice.

Remember, a tan is just another word for damaged skin that leads to sagging, splotching, wrinkles and premature aging. And, cumulative exposure to the sun can lead to skin cancer. Artificial tanning beds and lamps are just as dangerous as natural sunlight. In fact, their prolonged use can double your risk of skin cancer. Check your skin regularly and, if you discover new spots or raised marks, see your doctor or dermatologist immediately.

Sessions include group discussion and education focused on individual strengths and weaknesses, different types of diets, medication use, and lifestyle changes including healthy diet and exercise. "We encourage participants to continue in the SMA as long as they are making progress on their weight loss journey," says Dr. Varghai. "It could take up to a year, maybe more, for some to reach and maintain their target weight."

Health insurance typically covers the SMA cost; however, patients should verify coverage with their insurance provider before starting the program.

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



Beachwood Place Expansion

n the sustainability of shopping malls in the region (indoor and strip malls), Beachwood Place, developed by Rouse Company in 1978, has maintained and endured its own valuable presence in Beachwood with class, sophistication, and upscale stores to serve the community of Beachwood, and notably the landscape of Northeast Ohio.

The original anchor stores were Higbee's (which became Dillard's) and Saks Fifth Avenue. Nordstrom was added in 1997. Residents are attracted and gravitate to the ambiance and the community of Beachwood, and truly appreciate both Beachwood Place and La Place to meet their shopping needs for every season of the year.

In 2004 General Growth Properties acquired Beachwood Place and it is currently home to more than 100 retailers and restaurants, according to Neisha Vitello, senior general manager of General Growth Properties. "Beachwood Place has provided our community with an immense tax base that helps us provide top-of-the-line amenities and services to our residents," said Mayor Merle S. Gorden. "We are proud to be home to one of the region's premier shopping destinations, and we appreciate General Growth Properties' efforts in working closely with the city as they plan for the future and improve their property. We have a great working relationship with the management team of Beachwood Place."

When asked about bringing a coffee place back to the Peets/ Caribou location in La Place, Vitello said they've had some interest in the location from a couple of local and regional coffee shops and are currently trying to determine the best fit for that location.

Although Vitello could not share specific information, she is focused on successes to date, saying, "Within the past year, we have brought Tommy Bahama MAC Cosmetics, Pink and White Barn Candle Company, and we now look forward to the opening of Zara. We hope to bring in

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The Conversation on Brain Health is Global

Recent brain health research has found that the way we live our lives is more important than genetics, when it comes to mental wellness and brain health. The modern pillars of brain health focus on mental, emotional, spiritual, physical, social, nutritional and psychological lifestyle factors and determinants of health for all adults. Retaining brain health and cognitive fitness as we age are two topics that have recently been gaining national and global attention from researchers, providers and healthcare professionals.

Last fall, the Administration on Community Living launched its \$4.1 million campaign, which defines brain health as an individual's ability to remember, learn, plan, problem-solve, concentrate and maintain a clear, active mind. Simply stated, brain health is about staying sharp and making the most of individuals' brains as they age.

For the past two years, AARP has conducted nationwide studies examining these brain-healthy lifestyle factors: attitudes and behaviors toward healthy living, attitudes and behaviors toward brain health, self-perceptions of brain health, primary resources used by consumers for brain health information, desirable brain health information, awareness of brain training and identification of brain health activities that consumers engage in or are willing to try.


AARP found that most adults think maintaining a healthy lifestyle is important, and respondents ranked brain health as the second most important lifestyle factor following heart health. Luckily, research has shown a strong connection between heart health and brain health. According to AARP, three-quarters of adults, ages 40 and older, reported concerns about their brains' health declining in the future. This study also found that adults think it is important to maintain or improve their brain health.

But what is brain health? Although normative cognitive changes occur in the brain with aging, it is important for people to consider their brain health from a life-course perspective. Research offers suggestions for modifiable lifestyle factors or exercises that can help our brains stay sharp. Individuals have the ability to change their daily routines to help strengthen their minds and challenge their memories through a variety of tasks and intellectual pursuits.

Such lifestyle changes are important to support brain health, and it is never too late to

begin a new brain-healthy habit. However, reliable information and evidence-based programs or recommendations for brain health exercises are not streamlined for older adults, which has led to the formation of recent brain health initiatives at the global and national levels.





Saltzman has been the driving force behind Treasures for the past 24 years, selling jewelry, Judaica and crafts from Israel. An entirely volunteer-led shop, Treasures has raised more than \$250,000 for the JCC and formerly "Friends of the Aaron Garber Library" at Siegal College.

As Treasures raises funds for Cleveland organizations, it also helps support Israeli artists. Saltzman brings original Israeli art and Judaica to Cleveland to sell at Treasures, creating and restoring connections with Israel for many community members. She has been able to bring Israel to the people of Cleveland, without their ever leaving home.

"Treasures Gift Shop has been my connection to the Jewish community," Saltzman said. "I see it not only as a fundraiser in support of Israel, but as a way for people to connect to Israel in a positive way."

In addition to the presentation of the Irene Zehman Award,



the Women's Spring Luncheon featured keynote speaker and former Jewish Clevelander, Jessica Fechtor, author of the national bestseller, Stir: My Broken Brain and the Meals that Brought Me Home. Luncheon attendees donated non-perishable foods and essential toiletries to benefit our community food pantries.



Mandel JDS Students Act as Muesum Docents at Cleveland Museum of Art

The Cleveland Museum of Art recently had an additional 13 docents. On April 17, the eighth-grade class of Mandel JDS was tasked with presenting the work of a master painter to an audience filled with parents, siblings, and community members.

The presentation is the culmination of a year-long art history study in which each student learns about the life of their selected painter, and ultimately emulates the style of their painting through a work of their own. Finally, the students pack up their paintings and head to the museum, where they give a five-to-tenminute presentation about the life of that painter, directly in front of their work.

Artists spanned from Renaissance to contemporary, from Henri Matisse to Rene Magritte, Sandro Boticelli, Vincent Van Gogh, and Claude Monet. Five

students studied living artists, one of whom, Jake Moses of Solon, communicated back and forth with his artist, Carol Schiff, of Florida.

"This is something we have been doing for 23 years," said Barbara Weiss, veteran Mandel JDS art teacher. "One thing we always notice is that, as we go through the museum, acting as docents, we pick up random museum visitors along the way who are drawn to our students as sources of intriguing, factual information. What a special opportunity for the students to get to share their knowledge."

Zika Virus Information

The Cuyahoga County Board of Health continues to work closely with the Ohio Department of Health and conducts surveillance to monitor for mosquitoes that may transmit disease, including the Zika virus. Although local transmission of Zika virus through the bite of a mosquito has not been identified in the continental United States, the U.S. mainland does have two species of mosquitoes that can become infected with and spread Zika virus. The primary vector for transmitting Zika, the Aedes aegypti mosquito, is not established in Ohio and is found in the Southeastern States. A possible second vector, the Aedes albopictus mosquito, also known as the Asian Tiger mosquito, is rarely found in Northeast Ohio.

These species of mosquitoes do not breed in storm water control basins or woodland pools. They prefer to breed in water that collects in artificial containers (tires, buckets, garbage cans, flower pots, children's toys, etc.). Residents can help reduce the local mosquito population by removing any type of container that can hold enough water for a week or more.

U.S. travelers who visit a country where Zika is found could become infected if bitten by a mosquito. Any spread of the Zika virus in the U.S. would have to start with the introduction of infected persons, who would need to be once again bitten (within a week of becoming ill) by the specific mosquito species mentioned previously. These infected mosquitoes could then transmit the virus when they bite and feed on others.

Although there is very limited potential for local transmission to occur in the U.S., it is extremely unlikely that we will see any widespread local transmission of Zika here, in Northeast Ohio.

Please keep in mind that nearly every year we continue to have local human cases of West Nile virus and/or LaCrosse encephalitis. We need to be aware that these mosquito-borne diseases are still here and that we must take necessary precautions to help prevent mosquito bites, especially in mid-to-late summer and early fall.

We ask the public to help prevent mosquito breeding in your neighborhood by:

- 1. Disposing of containers that collect water (tires, buckets, cans, flower pots, etc.)
- 2. Eliminating areas of stagnant water
- 3. Repairing leaky outdoor faucets that leave puddles
- 4. Emptying and refilling bird baths at least once a week
- 5. Cleaning, draining and covering pools or hot tubs if not in use
- 6. Covering rain barrels and unclogging all gutters so they drain properly
- 7. Filling tree holes with tar or cement
- 8. Tightly screening all openings of your home
- 9. Keeping children indoors during times of peak mosquito activity (1 hour before and 1 hour after sunset)

The Cuyahoga County Board of Health also asks the public to help prevent personal exposure to mosquitoes by using insect repellents containing DEET, picaridin, or lemon eucalyptus oil and following label directions.



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


