eo Buscaglia was an American author, motivational speaker and professor who worked in the Department of Special Education at ■the University of Southern California. He was known as "Dr. Love" because of a class he created in 1969, titled, Love 1A. Buscaglia had researched the education system, recognizing that it was strong in the areas of reading, writing, math and spelling, but was failing in teaching individuals how to be human beings.

Love 1A, a non-credit class that Buscaglia prided himself on facilitating - not teaching - provided a forum for his students to share their struggles about life, living, sex, growth, responsibility, death, hope and the future. Popularity of the class grew each time it was offered and today, although Buscaglia died in 1998, Love 1A lives on through other educators. His book, Love: What Life Is All About, is based on the course and reminds us, "Love is open arms. If you close your arms about love you will find that you are left holding only yourself."

Buscaglia's outlook on life was positive, as documented in his books and lectures. One quote that stands out is: "Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around."

We don't often know what's going on inside someone's head, and kindness is always the best route to take when communicating. By following Buscaglia's message about kindness, we can each spread more happiness in the world around us.

"The only person we should try to be better than is the person we were yesterday" is an adaptation from a quote from an anonymous author. In the spirit of being the best we can be, I share the following from motivational speaker Jon Gordon.

He targets graduates with his message, but I feel it has meaning to everyone. It also mirrors Buscaglia's message about growth, responsibility, hope and the future. He writes:

I want to encourage you to not let failure, obstacles or fear keep you from pursuing your dream and living your purpose. If you are a graduate or someone pursing a dream remember:

- 1. Where you are now is not where you are going to be.
- 2. You don't have to be perfect to start. Just start.
- 3. Don't be afraid to fail.
- 4. Sometimes you have to lose a goal to find your destiny.
- 5. You are here for a reason. You have a purpose and you are meant to live and share it.
- 6. You don't have to be great. You just have to have a great desire to be your best and bring out the best in others.
- 7. Ignore the critics. Just show up each day and do the work.
- 8. Stay positive.
- 9. If you believe your best days are ahead of you, they are. The best is yet to come.



June is National Safety Month and in its recognition, Beachwood Buzz reached out to Beachwood's safety director/Mayor Merle S. Gorden, Fire Chief Patrick Kearns and Police Chief Gary Haba, all of whom provided information to raise awareness about safety. We often take for granted that everything is going to be all right - until it isn't - and if we're caught off guard, we panic and ask ourselves how we could have been better prepared.

The Beachwood safety forces have provided some information about what's going on in our community and how to prepare ourselves for an emergency.

Fire Station 2

Beachwood is positioning its safety services for a strong future with a new fire station. The \$9.7 million construction project will begin soon and the facility is expected to open in late 2018. The new Fire Station 2, to be built at the northeast corner of Richmond Road and Park East Drive, will serve as four facilities in one – a dispatch center, emergency operations center, police- and fire-training center and fire station, as described below:

Dispatch Center

With an enlarged dispatch center, Beachwood will be capable of handling dispatch responsibilities from other cities, which would generate revenue. "We already have an arrangement with Pepper Pike to provide dispatching services," said Chief Kearns. "As cities look toward regionalization as a way of collaborating and cutting expenses, this new fire station will mean that Beachwood is well-positioned for the future."

Emergency Operations Center

The emergency operations center will provide a central location for county, federal and state agencies to work cohesively to obtain a rapid resolution in the case of a catastrophic event.

Police and Fire Training Center

The room used for the emergency operations center will double as a police- and fire-training room, providing in-house space for continuing education. The center will include a three-story tower that can be filled with smoke or water to simulate conditions that may be found in real-life situations. The space will also be used for rappelling exercises.



Fire Station

This state-of-the-art fire station is a pioneer in Ohio for using cutting-edge technology with a hot-zone design to better protect fire fighters from hazardous materials and carcinogens. It will also be a unisex station, designed for both male and female firefighters, with room for expansion.

"The facility will serve both residents and businesses, with growth in mind," said Fire Chief Kearns. "Businesses generate an estimated 90% of Beachwood's tax revenues and have a tremendous impact on our community."

"Beachwood is home to more than 2,500 businesses and nearly 12,000 residents, with an estimated 100,000 people who pass through Beachwood daily," Mayor Gorden added. "Our safety forces have to be ready to react to a wide array of possible calls. This new fire station will help ensure Beachwood is prepared to continue its excellent safety services."

Although this new facility and Beachwood's safety forces are here to protect us, we are each our own first line of defense and the best defense is preparedness. Here are some steps we can take to "harden the target," or reduce our risk of becoming a victim:

Be Proactive and Prepared

Have an Escape Plan

Don't get trapped. Statistics show that most people exit and enter their homes the same way. We should be aware of all exits in our homes, with two ways out from each room. When emergencies arise, panic strikes and the lack of a cohesive plan could be deadly. Create a family plan and practice it every three months. Include a meeting place, outside of your home, so you'll know where to go if your home must be evacuated or if communications are down.

Create a Disaster Preparedness Kit

Every home should have a disaster preparedness kit with enough supplies to sustain every member of your household for three days. It should include a NOAA weather radio, flashlight, batteries, nonperishable foods, bottled water and juices, manual can opener, first aid kit, prescription drugs, sleeping bags, important family documents, cash/ credit cards and important phone numbers.

Each car should have a fire extinguisher, tools, first aid kit, sleeping bags or blankets, bottled water, high-energy snacks, flashlight, batteries, battery-operated radio and cell phone.

Safety Director/ Mayor Merle S. Gorden

What can you share with the community about safety?

"Safety is one of the most important building blocks of our city. Safe surroundings allow businesses to attract customers, children to play freely, and neighbors and visitors to come and go without fear, adding vitality and life to Beachwood. When community members work alongside our safety forces, we build trust, and together, that makes us a safe Beachwood."

What do you enjoy most about working in/with the Beachwood community?

"Beachwood provides a diverse and varied workload that requires me to be very well-rounded as an officer. I also enjoy the cooperation and camaraderie among our city departments and the overwhelming support for our department from residents and businesses."

What is the favorite part about your job?

"Helping to keep people safe is rewarding work. I couldn't do that without a fantastic team. My coworkers are the backbone of our operation. They are my favorite thing here. I also like that every day presents a new challenge. It's never boring."

Security Surveys

The Beachwood Police Department is proud to offer security surveys for residents and businesses. Trained officers will assess homes for ways of deterring the criminal element. Most suggestions are simple to implement and cost effective. To schedule an appointment, call Lt. Wetzel at 216.464.2343.

Lock Your Car

Whether home or away, always lock your car. It protects you and your belongings. And, "harden the target" by keeping valuables out of sight.

Lock Your Home

Be aware of your surroundings and keep your home locked. Even if you're in the yard, keep your front door locked.

Safety for Children

We often depend on ourselves or others to protect our children. They, too, need to play an active role in their own safety. Work on your evacuation plan together and, if they are ever in an uncomfortable situation, teach them to disengage and run away.

Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors

All homes should be armed. Smoke detectors should be installed on each floor and in each bedroom. Carbon monoxide detectors should be installed on each floor. Batteries should be changed every year or sooner, if necessary; and detectors replaced every 10 years. Sleep with your bedroom door closed. In the case of a fire, it may save lives.

Be Attentive When on the Road

Put your cell phone away and avoid other distractions until you are safely parked.

Emergency Vehicles

When an emergency vehicle is approaching, pull over to the right and stop. When you near emergency vehicles on the side of the road or blocking a lane of traffic, slow down and move over.

Home Address Numbers

If we can't find you, we can't help you. Be sure your address numbers are readable from the road so emergency services can reach

you in a timely fashion. Numbers should be numerical, not script; measure between three-and-ahalf and eight inches in height and located more than five feet above the ground on the part of the structure nearest to the road and adjacent to the front entrance. Numbers must be clearly visible with no obstruction (including shrubbery or trees). Homes with mailboxes on the roadway, except for group boxes, shall have numbers on both sides of the box.

"Be aware and be proactive," Police Chief Haba said. "Residents are our eyes and ears in the community. If you see something suspicious, call us - quickly - and we will check it out."

When you are in your home

and calling for an emergency from a land line, 911 calls are dispatched to the Beachwood Police Department. When you call from your cell phone, they are dispatched elsewhere and once your location is identified, transferred to Beachwood, or wherever you are, which takes time. Chief Haba suggests you program the Beachwood Police Department phone number in your cell phone, 216.464.1234. This call will go directly to the Beachwood dispatch center, saving time, which is critical in an emergency.

Also, when you call, the dispatcher will want information. Please be ready to provide details to include a street address or closest landmark, and remain on the phone with the dispatcher. "The more information you provide, the better the situation can be assessed and the more appropriate the response will be," Chief Haba said.

Other Areas of Interest

ALICE

ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) Training provides preparation and a plan for individuals and organizations on how to proactively handle the threat of an aggressive intruder or active shooter. Whether it is an attack by an individual person or by a group of professionals, ALICE Training option-based tactics have become the accepted response, versus the traditional "lockdown only" approach. Circumstantial and operational concerns vary in every new situation, and ALICE Training provides options that address the unique challenges specific to police, schools, healthcare facilities, higher education, businesses and houses of worship. Beachwood's safety services offer ALICE training. For more information, call 216.464.2343.

Senior Police Academy

Each year, the Beachwood Police Department offers its Senior Police Academy, which is an informative and exciting way to learn about law enforcement, real-life crime prevention and topics pertaining to your cares and needs. Participants receive "hands on" experience with the help of instructors on techniques such as: self-defense, CPR, personal safety and how not to become a victim of fraud, identity theft, robbery and burglary. This year's Senior Police Academy takes place at

Beachwood City Hall, Wednesdays, July 19 – September 13, from 1-3 pm. It is free, but reservations are required before July 12. Participants must be at least 50 years of age and a resident and/or business owner in the City of Beachwood.

Safety Town

Safety Town, an educational program for children entering kindergarten, is designed to teach incoming kindergarten pupils safety habits related to bus, pedestrian and personal safety. Each nine-day session, from July 25 - August 4, takes place at Fairmount School. To register, call 216.292.1970.

Coffee with a Cop

This new, informal program provides opportunities for residents to chat with an officer in an informal setting. These casual meetings have been kicked off in our city's apartment buildings. If your group is interested in scheduling an event, please call 216.464.2343.

For Additional **Protection**

For additional protection, the City of Beachwood became integrated in the Eastern Departments Group Enforcement (EDGE) regional S.W.A.T. team. This regional team, with members from Beachwood, Euclid, Shaker Heights, South Euclid and University Heights, consists of specially trained and assembled police officers who can be requested for deployment to critical incidents.

The purpose and intent of EDGE S.W.A.T. is to serve as a specialized, flexible and mobile team, activated to assist member jurisdiction departments in addressing and resolving critical incidents outside of normal police operations.

"Beachwood is the first community to have paramedics on its SWAT team," said Fire Chief Kearns, "making us well prepared to handle emergencies."

Members are proactive and continually improve the way they deliver services to our residents and businesses. 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


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Beachwood Homes and Garden Tour

gardens located right here in Beachwood. Ten homes will be featured on this tour, which n June 25, from 1-4 pm, the community is invited to explore beautiful homes and secret is a collaboration between the Beachwood Historical Society and Beachwood Community Services. The fee is \$15 per person. Registration is required at www.beachwoodohio.com. All proceeds benefit the Beachwood Historical Society. The tour starts promptly at 1 pm at the Beachwood Community Center, where you will pick up your wristband and map. Feel free to drive your own car and go at your own pace, or hop on the bus for an additional fee. Dessert will be served along the way. Here's a behind-the-scenes peek at two of the spectacular homes:

Van Sweringen English Tudor 23305 Fernwood Drive

In 1929, the Van Sweringen brothers built an English Tudor cottage at 23305 Fernwood Drive in Beachwood as a part of their vision to build summer homes or cottages "in the country." Today, 88 years later, the home is in immaculate condition and owner June Louise keeps it staged with whimsy in every nook and cranny.

"The Fernwood home has been in our family for more than 47 years with its own spirit and charm," she said.

As we walked through the home, June pointed out areas that she has modernized while preserving styles original to the home. In the kitchen, Louise showed us modern appliances used with artifacts that suggest another time period.

The living room has an inglenook fireplace adorned with blue and white pottery, some authentic and some purchased at flea markets, all carefully placed to reflect June's vision. At the ceiling's perimeter, one finds the home's original moldings. Artwork, from impressionism to contemporary, fills the walls and halls; whimsical items, from McKenzie Childs to embellished umbrellas, adorn the kitchen and dressing room; quaint seating areas fill charming patios in the yard; and an angel is perfectly placed on the staircase to the second floor.

One of the bedrooms was converted to a dressing room, and another has a small nook at the far end, perfect for a child's playroom. The master bedroom has a window seat adorned with pillows, with a spectacular view of the yard. The roof to the garage has a storybook

feel and a small structure out back was converted to a "she shed," opposite of a man cave.

Although some rooms are small, they are often multipurposed. The room off the living room serves as a bar, office and library; and the living room seating space can be reconfigured to accommodate small, intimate get togethers or larger affairs.

There are herringbone rugs, adorned umbrellas, framed motivational sayings among the artwork, and a forged-iron McKenzie Childs gate leading into the garden, all elements that will make you smile.

"What speaks to me will end up






here if it works within the scheme of things. Whimsy is what I love, and this is a whimsical home with many different styles," June said with a smile.

"If people want to see charming, they'll enjoy what I've done to this home. I hope those who tour the property will share in the magic.

Lake House 26720 Hendon Road

Tucked behind Jordan Reiner's home at 26720 Hendon Road is an acre of water, part of the Shaker Lakes System, that brings nature right into the heart of Beachwood. The property was previously owned by Judy and Harlan Sherman, who purchased the land from George Gund. The Shermans designed and built a contemporary home where they used to raise peacocks and swans, and orchids in their expansive greenhouses. They also enjoyed entertaining and built the perfect house to do so.

Today, ducks, geese and blue herons are often spotted on the lake, and four generations of the Reiner family enjoy fishing and

gardening, as evidenced by the number of fishing poles that line the dock and plants in one of three original greenhouses. Bird feeders line the back of the home. making this a true nature haven. There is also a pool, currently being renovated, with an original charcoal grill that overlooks the lake; and an oft-used fire pit, still in its original shell, with stone added as an update.

As we walked through the home, Michelle Reiner explained that during their renovation, they chose to add some modern touches while preserving original elements and character of the home. A stained-glass peacock lamp, a reminder of the past, sits atop a table near the front door. An expansive aquarium replaced the front-closet, and the wood-sliding

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divider is still intact. The original terra-cotta brick and travertine floors, indoor grills, wood trim and original architectural features may be seen through the home. The brick fireplace in the hearth room has been updated with a white-wash finish, and the original laundry room, once adjacent to the kitchen, is now where the architectural drawing room was, with the remainder of the space used as a poker room.

The Shermans were avid art collectors, collecting art from around the world. Today, in keeping with the tradition, antique advertising signs and other memorabilia are strategically placed throughout the home.

The Reiners proudly carry on the tradition of Tashlich, a customary Jewish atonement ritual performed during the High Holy Days, per the Shermans' requests.

The walk-through makes one feel far removed from the convenience of our Beachwood location. The home is expansive with each detail carefully considered, with a feeling of peace and comfort, surrounded by nature.



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

If you think bird watching is, well, for the birds, think again. Paying attention to the behavior and beauty of Beachwood's natural bird population beats people watching anytime.

I had a bird's eye view of our neighborhood's avian community this spring when I put a squirrel-proof bird feeder just outside my kitchen window. Within hours of filling the feeder, a platoon of hungry birds began making their descent. Almost overnight my backyard was busier than a McDonalds drive-in window. Birds of all feathers, stripes and sizes were stopping by for a quick nosh or grazing on the seed that had fallen to the ground.

As I watched the birds jockeying for position at the feeder, it quickly became apparent where the term "pecking order" originates. The more aggressive birds zoom in and take over the top section of the bird feeder, boldly pecking at the seeds as they oust the shyest, more skittish birds. Not all bullies are human.

The names and species of the beautiful birds that visit my feeder may be found on a site provided by the City of Beachwood, http://www. beachwoodohio.com/DocumentCenter/View/36.

By referring to the site, you can identify the local birds you see regularly in your own backyard or while strolling or biking at the Beachwood City Park.

At this point I can recognize a fox sparrow, American cardinal, Mourning dove, blue bird and, of course, that "Old Red Red Robin who keeps on Bob, Bob Bobbin' Along" (thank you, Bing Crosby). I'm on the lookout for the yellow-bellied sapsucker and white-winged crossbill that I'm told are regular visitors to Northeast Ohio.

The rules for feeder maintenance are pretty simple: keep it full and clean.

I fill my feeder with runof-the-mill wild bird food the birds seem to enjoy, and planted three berry-rich holly bushes in my backyard for good measure. And, if you are looking to attract a particular kind of bird, what's on the bird feeder menu can make a difference.

Gillian's Island birder joke: The Captain: Audubon? The Professor: Yes, a German expressway for birdwatchers.

So, if you want to expand your horizons and boost your spirits, put down those electronic gadgets and get real. Buy yourself a bird feeder - just make sure the deer and squirrels can't get to it, and join me in appreciating our ar-

ea's bird population. If you get as big a kick as I do from your new hobby, let me know birds of a feather and all that.

- A. Prior to accepting this position three years ago, I was not familiar with how chambers operate. After I became acclimated, I began using surveys to poll chamber members to determine how to best meet their needs. As a result, five new programs have been rolled out or are still being considered. They include:

Beachwood Young Professionals

Beachwood Young Professionals meet monthly to focus efforts on networking opportunities, education experiences and community outreach for young professionals ranging from 21 to 39 years of age. Their first event is coming up in June.

Beachwood Women's Connection

Beachwood Women's Connection was established to create a forum for professional women to meet and empower each other. We offer monthly morning meetings when we build relationships and learn about topics related to business, community and issues of interest. The first event, May 19 at BuyRite, welcomed attorney and Beachwood City Councilwoman, Barbara Bellin Janovitz, Esq. The next event takes place June 16.

Lunch with a Lawyer

Lunch with a Lawyer is a one-hour program that provides an opportunity for members to have lunch with an attorney who provides information about various business topics. The next event takes place June 13.

- Q. Are other programs offered?
- A. Yes. Three larger, wellknown events include our Fitness Challenge, which provides a healthy opportunity for businesses to compete in the fitness arena; the Beachwood Business Expo, which will take place Thursday, September 14, at Embassy Suites Beachwood, to provide an opportunity for area businesses to interact with exhibitors from multiple industries in and around Beachwood. This year, the show has been revamped and I look forward to sharing more details in coming months. For those interested in exhibiting, please call me. My all-time favorite event, Taste of Beachwood, features samples of food from area restaurants and caterers. Stay tuned for more information!
- Q. Who organizes and staffs your events?
- A. Devorah and I are chamber employees and the rest of the work is done by member volunteers. We have a core group of volunteers that chair events and recruit committees to attend

to the details. The more active the members, the more they get from their membership. Each committee welcomes new members at any time. We encourage volunteerism to further build relationships!

- Q. Earlier, you mentioned benefits. Can you tell us more about them?
- **A.** Absolutely. In addition to networking benefits, which increase members' personal and business networks, we have business partners that offer cost-saving opportunities for hospitalization, payroll, credit-card processing, office supplies and furniture, shipping, and energy savings. I will gladly review specifics of what we offer with current and new members.
- **Q.** What's the next step for those who have an interest in joining the chamber or becoming more involved?
- **A.** Visit our website to see all that is going on. I invite those interested to attend an upcoming event. Our next Networking After 5 event takes place Tuesday, June 7, and our next luncheon is Wednesday, June 21. For complete information, visit beachwood.org or call me at 216.831.0003. Beachwood High School

Beachwood High School ranked #1 in Northeast Ohio, #3 in the state of Ohio, and #247 in the United States of America in the 2017 Washington Post's annual "America's Most Challenging High Schools" rankings.

This ranking is based upon the number of high school Advanced Placement (AP) courses students complete. AP courses are considered the equivalent of a first-year college course. Many Beachwood students take on the challenge of an AP curriculum and succeed. These classes have proven to be fantastic preparation for the rigors of college coursework. In addition, they are often used as a metric in school ranking calculations.

STEM IN ACTION...INAUGURAL NOISE EXPO DRAWS HUGE CROWD



On Saturday, April 22, 2017, over 5,000 kids and adults attended the first NOISE Expo at Beachwood High School. NOISE, for Northeast Ohio Innovative STEM Expo, featured STEM (Science Technology Engineering Mathematics) subjects in action demonstrated by more than 130 area businesses and school organizations. Highlighting NOISE was entertainer, Apollo Robbins of National Geographic's Brain Games.

Apollo gave two standing room only performances sponsored by Beachwood City Schools. Known as "The Gentlemen's Thief," Apollo focused his performances on the science of deception and sleight of hand. It has been said about Apollo that he could "...steal the wallet of a man who knew he was going to have his pocket picked." He did exactly that to scores of unwitting and absolutely amazed Beachwood fans.

Attendees dug into over forty hands-on demonstrations from companies like ASM, Eaton Corporation, Holden Arboretum, Cleveland Museum of Natural History, Little Medical Academy and Nordson. The first 1,000 students received lab coats, safety goggles, and STEM swag bags as they entered NOISE. The goal of NOISE was to excite students about STEM subjects and to see them in a variety of real world applications.

The ASM Materials Education Foundation hosted a Materials Mini-Camp within NOISE. Demonstrations included: Keeping Astronauts Cool, Nitinol: a Shape Memory Alloy, Can Steel Take the Heat?, Super Absorbent Polymers, Corrosion – Ball Bearing Experience, and Melting Metal with Microwaves.

Fifty middle school- to college-aged student entrepreneurs were featured in the Young Entrepreneur Market sponsored by the Burton D. Morgan Foundation. Andrew Curl, a Mayfield High School junior, put STEM in action as he debuted his virtual reality company, Eagle Eye Games. Beginning this fall, Andrew will also be in the Marketing Program at Beachwood High School that created NOISE.

NOISE was created and produced by the Marketing/Junior Achievement students at Beachwood High School. Forty-four seniors from nine area high schools attend the Marketing program through Excel TECC. These college bound seniors have raised over \$4.3 million dollars in college scholarships so far this year.

Karen Carmen, city recreation department director, and her staff have partnered with Mr. Greg Perry and his Marketing students for the past 10 years to help produce and execute these large-scale exhibitions.

Due to the overwhelming success of the first NOISE, a second one is already being planned for Saturday, April 13, 2019.



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


Temple Emanu El is pleased to announce that Beachwood resident Stanley Blum has been named a Life Trustee to the Temple Emanu El board of trustees.

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Holocaust Survivor Makes Deep Impact on Mandel JDS Students

Some say that to learn about the future, one must look toward the past. Mandel JDS students could see this firsthand on Monday, April 24, as Olga Goldstein, survivor of the Holocaust, spoke of her experiences as a young girl in concentration camps during World War II. The event coincided with Yom Hashoah, or Holocaust Remembrance Day.

Goldstein, a great-grandparent of three Mandel JDS students, was fourteen years old when she was taken from her home in Transylvania, Romania, sent to a ghetto, and eventually to Auschwitz, Bergen-Belsen, and a host of other infamous Nazi concentration camps. After years of confinement, miraculously, Goldstein and a few others were able to escape Theresienstadt concentration camp, arriving in Prague, and eventually reuniting with family members.

For more than fifty years, Gold-

stein remained silent about her Holocaust experiences. Only recently has she decided to share her story, recognizing the importance and universality of her message, while also looking to serve as a physical reminder that the Holocaust did in fact happen, despite those who continue to deny its occurrence.

"I'm sorry, but this is a little difficult for me," said Goldstein, as she became emotional during her speech. "As I relive these little moments, it's hard, but I know this is my duty to speak for those who never had a chance. My obligation is to show you that I am here, I have a family, and I am alive."

After she recounted her experiences of both confinement and liberation, students were given the opportunity to ask questions. In addition, students watched a brief video illustrating the Israeli Air Force flying over Auschwitz, sending the message that Hitler's plan

was unsuccessful, further emphasizing the notion of resilience in the face of adversity.

"As I relive these little moments, it's hard, but I know this is my duty to speak for those who never had a chance. My obligation is to show you that I am here, I have a family, and I am alive."

"When we learn about the Holocaust, we often focus on tragedy, which is of course a natural and understandable tendency," said Leah Spector, principal of Mandel JDS. "My goal, however, is to focus on the resilience of the Jewish people, and the ways in which, despite

Hitler's plans, we not only survived, but flourished as a people. We want the students to understand their responsibility as members of the Jewish community, and of the global community at-large."

Kitay Earns OSU Business School's Top Award, Counsels Students on Finances

The Ohio State University senior Andrew Kitay never ceases to be amazed by the many students who don't know the amount they've borrowed in educational loans, but he thinks he knows what underlies the apparent gap in their knowledge. They are afraid of thinking about debt. However, he says they also feel no sense of urgency surrounding their entire financial situation. Conversely, of those who are well funded by parents, he encourages them to learn more about personal finances by posing the question: "Do you ever want to be financially independent?"

Kitay clearly likes to engage in conversations about finances, particularly as they relate to how people envision their future lives.

"Students seem to marginalize both the importance of student debt and the effects it can have on short term and long term goals," says the BHS Class of 2014 graduate. While he understands that some may feel there's a stigma attached to the issue, he also recognizes the imperative for them to deal with thousands of dollars of debt.

Kitay acquired his financial knowledge through classes but also from his own experience with earning, saving and spending. He started working in high school at the Chick-Fil-A in Beachwood Place and rose to a managerial position during his senior year.

The sum total of his childhood, he says, was the development of a very strong work ethic, and it has already paid off with the annual Pace Setter Award he earned this spring from the Fisher College of Business at OSU, attended by approximately 5,500 students. The award winners demonstrated outstanding academic performance and leadership ability, with nominations and voting completed by faculty, staff and peers. Kitay was one of 15 students chosen from among the junior class. His determination and focus have been manifested by working hard, defined by dedicating many

weekends during high school to his job from 11 am - 10 pm. He says he always perceived this schedule in a positive way. That outlook, combined with his work ethic, has guided him through other trials, including his being a member of the BHS wrestling team while also juggling multiple Advanced Placement classes and performing well on the exams which earned 55 credits that he applied to college.

"I am beyond grateful for the opportunities provided by the Beachwood school system, and the incredible teachers that supported me along the way," he says. The drive to succeed, however, is all his own.

"I like finding opportunities to push myself and continually challenge my sense of what's possible," he states.

He will graduate on time with a combined B.S./B.A. and Master's degree in accounting with honors. Along the way, he has become an intrepid volunteer financial adviser through Scarlet and Gray Financial, operated through OSU's Office of Student Life. Its mission lies with helping college students set themselves on a course that will best allow them to achieve their occupational and financial goals.

In addition, Kitay developed an outreach program as an extension to OSU's Scarlet and Gray Financial to help underprivileged youth in

the Columbus area. His hourlong financial literacy workshops engage participants in real-lifebased discussions to establish the importance of healthy financial habits and decisions. His seminars cover banking, budgeting and the use of credit and loans, along with strategies to become employable. developing a work ethic and solid study habits.

"The idea is to bring everything around to being goal-driven," Kitay explains. He also frames the conversations by posing the question, "How much of your time and energy are you willing to invest in yourself?"

Over the past school year, he conducted five workshops, involving 135 youths, ages 13-18, with the help of other student-volunteer coaches and several professional financial planners. The venues included the Circleville Juvenile Correctional Facility, Van Buren Homeless Shelter, OSU Star House (a drop-in shelter) and OSU Main Campus. For the next school year, he is planning 16 workshops and a one-day leadership conference for selected high school students from disadvantaged

districts in Columbus.

He has also been hard at work molding his own career during summer internships. This year, he'll be interning at Ernst and Young's Chicago's office in its assurance program, something he secured through a competitive process. Last summer, he worked at Parker-Hannifin as an accounting and finance intern within the global sales department.

Kitay maintains a 3.99 GPA, and in service to his minor in Spanish, he's taking a trip to South America where he'll explore Columbia, Argentina and Peru two and a half weeks before he begins his summer internship.

"I know enough Spanish to get around, but I expect to improve by the end of the trip," he says. Any challenges he finds there will likely be where he feels his greatest traction, if his past foretells his future.

In the more distant future (five years from now, according to Kitay), he says he'd like to open his own financial planning and CPA firm in Cleveland. He hopes all his experiences add up to an independent career that allows him to help others.

Help Conquer a Killer Learn the symptoms of stroke

One American dies from stroke every four minutes.

That's a sobering statistic, but the good news is that stroke doesn't have to be fatal. Knowing the signs of stroke and getting emergency help for yourself or someone you are with who is experiencing symptoms can save lives.

Timing is Everything

University Hospitals neurologist Stefan Dupont, MD, PhD, specializes in treating people with stroke. "With stroke, getting the right treatment fast is critical to the outcome," he says.

"We do not have a cure for stroke once it has occurred. We do have emergency treatments that can reduce the damage to the brain caused by the stroke and protect the brain from damage and lack of oxygen, if the person gets treated in time."

Treatments include clot-busting medicines, neuroprotective medicines and special intravenous fluids to reduce or control brain swelling after stroke. "Treatment is most effective when started within three hours after a stroke," Dr. Dupont stresses. "That's why it's so important to recognize the symptoms of stroke and call 911 immediately."

Reducing Your Risk

Even better than treating stroke early is preventing stroke from occurring. Although anyone can have a stroke at any time, some people have a higher risk for stroke. Some risk factors for stroke can be prevented or medically managed. These include smoking, high blood pressure, obesity, diabetes, sleep apnea, heart disease and high cholesterol. Other risk factors cannot be changed, such as age (risk is higher in older people), gender (men are at higher risk than women), race (African Americans have a higher risk than other races), having a previous stroke and a family history of stroke.

Know the **Warning Signs** of Stroke

Stroke is an emergency. If you or someone you are with experiences any of the symptoms listed below, call 911.

- Walking Balance is off, person cannot stand up straight, is leaning or slumping to one side when walking, or otherwise is unable to walk normally.
- Talking Speech is slurred or garbled or person is having difficulty speaking, is not making sense. One side of the face or mouth may droop.
- Reaching One side of the body is weak or numb. The individual cannot hold both arms up or cannot easily hold a small object like a pen.
- Vision Changes in vision such as blurring, seeing double or a portion of the person's vision is blocked.
- Headache The worst headache the person has ever had. Sensitivity to light, sounds or loud noises.

What is a Stroke?

stroke is a brain injury that occurs when blood flow to the brain is blocked or interrupted. About 85 percent of strokes happen when a major blood vessel to the brain is blocked by a clot or a buildup of fatty deposit and cholesterol called plaque. This is an ischemic stroke. The remaining 15 percent of strokes occur when a blood vessel in the brain ruptures and blood flows into the brain tissue. This is a hemorrhagic stroke.

Private Equity Firms Offer Insight Into Funding Arena

Thile those who work in real estate live by the mantra, location, location, location, players in private equity who have a size at it. in private equity who buy or invest in businesses to eventually cash out, follow the maxim growth, growth, growth, according to a local expert. In this active funding arena, Beachwood can boast of being home to numerous venture capital firms, and members of several took some time to share an insider perspective on their investment processes.

Drummond Road Capital

The investment opportunities that most excite venture capitalist Morris Wheeler, principal at Drummond Road, are software platforms or, more specifically, "things that are enabling." This includes software off of which others could develop more products.

He cites as an example of this type of technology the programs that send text messages with security codes, a process handled by a behind-the-scenes company. In the industry, this is also known as SaaS, or Software as a Service, which involves software that's licensed and delivered on a subscription basis from a central or cloud-based host.

Before any minds spin out from too much tech talk, Wheeler mentions his other major source of investment interest within the technology sector relates to connected devices, such as the Fitbit, the health and fitness tracker, styled like a wristwatch.

In layman's terms, Wheeler says he likes "things that tie other things together." The Boston native arrived at this interest by way of being a computer programmer "a million years ago," after majoring in computer science and economics at the University of

Massachusetts. He also earned a law degree from Yale, then spent time on Wall Street, the sum total of which led him to starting an internet company in the 1990s, which he eventually sold.

With his sights now exclusively trained on investing, he has chosen to avoid the IPO (initial public offering) market which he says, "is more difficult to navigate." Instead, he has direct investments in more than 40 companies and indirectly in about 60 others. He says his strategy is to commit to a company for 8 to 10 years or more. A typical year sees him making 10 direct investments.

The most common route that leads him to his investment discoveries of the best early stage start-ups is through business incubators or accelerators. Among his favorites are Flashstarts in Cleveland, Techstars and Merge-Lane (designed to increase the number of female-led startups and activate female leaders) in Boulder, CO, The Brandery in Cincinnati, and both Y Incubator and 500 Startups in the Silicon Valley area. He also worked with Beachwood's incubator run by Tom Sudow, a former executive director of the Beachwood Chamber of Commerce. Additionally, Wheeler serves as a mentor for the compa-

nies and entrepreneurs involved with these accelerator programs.

The funding philosophy he espouses is simple: "I'm never simply buying a company; I'm making an investment." Additionally, he typically takes a non-controlling, minority stake. The fundamental criteria upon which he bases his investment choices relate to the quality of the team in place at a company and what their big idea is. He likes to ask the question: If you had \$100 million in revenue, what would your company look like?

enough for me. I like to look for \$100 million potential."

He offers the caveat that some companies will have zero revenue at the beginning. "This doesn't faze me," he says. "I want to know what they're going to do to get to the next level." One of the biggest challenges he sees facing startups is not the initial funding to get them going, but the second round of financing.

Not all people are well suited for investing in startups, admits Wheeler, but he says he's qualified. "I like the roller coaster," he states. "That's just how I'm wired."

Align Capital Partners

There's nothing easy about stepping in and growing an established business, says Chris Jones, a managing partner at Align Capital Partners. The primary challenge relates to making tough decisions surrounding how to generate that growth.

"We often need to focus on just

two to three top priorities, which may come at the expense of legitimate growth opportunities that we choose not to resource," he explains. "There's a lot of debate and decisions we make in partnership with a company's management team to arrive at the right outcome for the business."

He says the one-year-old firm's acquisition interests lie

with established, profitable companies, as opposed to those that are distressed, in the manufacturing and business services industries. "We're seeking businesses that generate \$2-\$10 million in annual earnings," he notes. On average, Jones says the goal is to hold a company for four to six years.

ACP has \$325 million in capital with which to make investments from its offices here and in Dallas. Its latest investment (as of press time) is the acquisition of an emissions-testing unit of Golden Specialty Inc., which was an add-on acquisition to its platform company Alliance Source Testing, Financial terms remain undisclosed.

ACP is the Cleveland area's newest private equity firm, launched with Steve Dyke and Rob Langley, who, along with Jones, were principals at Cleveland-based The Riverside Company.

Overall, Jones describes the acquisition market as "very competitive, with many investment firms looking to buy." That said, he remains bullish on the climate for continued merger and acquisition activity this year due to a generally healthy economy and continued low interest rates.

To best understand what quides ACP's investment strategy, Jones explains that it re-

volves around the answers to three primary questions: What advantages does the company have in its industry? How does it plan to grow? How will ACP's capital and experience impact the company's ability to grow? They also evaluate the company's margin profile and the management team as part of determining the amount of growth they believe is possible. At companies ACP acquires, Jones says they emphasize partnering with management teams to create opportunities and upward mobility for existing employees, along with adding new jobs for future hires.

Kirtland Capital Partners

Kirtland celebrates its 40th anniversary this year, and that kind of longevity in a tough industry really begs an explanation. Tom Littman, Kirtland president and managing partner, offers one.

"It's a function of our consistent strategy that focuses on relationships," he says. "We nurture them for decades, and we preserve the DNA and culture of the companies we work with." Reflecting on the firm's past, he also notes that it "didn't chase the internet in the 1990s" or the popular but risky restaurant husinesses

The firm found its niche with manufacturing and business services companies across the U.S. and Canada. Littman reports being attracted to businesses that are doing well and manifest growth potential. "We're not interested in turnarounds," he adds.

Kirtland does target small companies with \$10-\$75 million in revenue, and looks for new opportunities. "We close on one to three new deals annually," he reports. The firm often seeks "add-on companies" for its existing portfolio that might accelerate growth for those enterprises. Its hold period is about five to seven years, a span that largely depends on how long it takes to see growth, though he acknowledges that "add-on acquisitions take time to add value."

To determine investment potential, the criteria considered includes what makes the company special, what its challenges are, who the competition is and what opportunities lie ahead.

The firm has four investments now. Kirtland is different from most private equity firms because of its flexible investing approach. "We pursue control investments but are also comfortable making a minority investment of less than 50% ownership where we build a strong partnership with the business owner." Littman notes. He defines his company's role as primarily working alongside a management team to grow the business.

Most of his leads for opportunities come from a cadre of professionals such as wealth managers, estate planning lawyers, brokers, accountants and old school networking. "Many opportunities come to us based on our reputation." he adds.

The conversation that he generally holds with a business he's considering for investment potential covers the owner's goals, and growth

and succession plans. He also likes to know what makes the company special, its challenges, its competition and what opportunities lie ahead.

"We take a more holistic approach than 'tell us what your revenues are," he states.

Beachwood is the hub of a great a deal of commerce, and venture capital activity figures well among the players here. And with the firms' reach extending far beyond these borders, they are helping to raise Beachwood's profile nationwide as well.

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All in the Family, Keeping it in Beachwood

Then it comes to Michele Ryb's professional career, it's always been about business in Beachwood. Ryb, a Beachwood High School graduate, class of '85, started working in her father's business, Complete Office Supply, during summers and days off during the school year. That's where she learned the ins and outs of the office supplies business – and the importance of customer service, building relationships and supporting independent business owners. A year and a half after joining his team, Complete Office Supply closed and Ryb took her skill set across the street, on Mercantile Road, to open Buy Rite Office Products.

Since opening in 1990, the industry has changed and Ryb has stayed on the cutting edge to evolve with the times. "Back in the 90s, businesses were still dealing with independent dealers, but once the big-box stores moved in and online sales increased, a lot of dealers went away," Ryb told us. "We had to morph into a niche to help keep our market share."

To adapt with the times, Ryb created a partnership with Speedy Office Supply, another family-owned and -operated business, to help with warehousing and delivering of supplies. With their back-end support, Ryb continues to service her accounts, while growing her office furniture presence.

"We're the only east-side office furniture and showroom around," Ryb said. "There are showrooms on the west side and downtown, but for those who want to stop in a showroom without going downtown, we are the only one around."

Today, Ryb offers new, used and previously-owned furniture –

which differs from used because it looks brand new. She also takes in furniture on consignment, and opens her showroom regularly for networking meetings, bringing in dozens of people each week.

"About five years ago, I joined my first BNI group and when they needed to find a new meeting space, I opened our doors," Ryb told us "That was the beginning. Today, I host and participate in several networking meetings each week, including BNI, Northeast Ohio Business Connect, Beachwood Business Development Group, JNet (Jewish Networking), WIN (Women in Networking), and the Beachwood Chamber of Commerce's new group, Women Empowering Women.

"I'm a connector," Ryb said. "I try to connect people; and when I'm making a sale, I'm making a friend. If I can connect people through networking groups, I want to do so."

With all of this in place, Ryb was overwhelmed when her lease

came up last year. "After being in the building for 25 years, I didn't know how to pack up and move 10,000 square feet of furniture and supplies," she said.

Fortunately, she had planted the seed for her father, Harold Levine, to buy the building a few years earlier. The seed grew, and today, Ryb and her sister, Marci Baker, co-manage the Beachwood property together.

"I always felt like this was my building," Ryb said. "I've always treated it that way and handled onsite management, so it seemed like a natural progression to own the building now. My dad has a history of owning commercial space, so now, it's a family project."

"Beachwood has always been my home," Ryb added. "I've always promoted buying local and supporting local businesses, and by purchasing the building, that locks in my fate. I'm not going anywhere, ever."

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Jewish Teens Grant \$42,500 for Community Needs

orty Jewish high school juniors and seniors representing public and private high schools across Cleveland have come together to recommend grants totaling \$42,500 to 10 organizations for crucial programs in the Jewish and general community through the Jewish Federation of Cleveland's 2016-2017 Maurice Saltzman Youth Panel. Beachwood High School participants include Jakob Bolman, Zoe Grant, Margo Lackritz, Rachael Roth and Gabriel Shapera.

Saltzman Youth Panel was established in 1998 through a generous gift from the late Shirley Saltzman and her family in memory of the late Maurice Saltzman. The program perpetuates the goals of Maurice Saltzman, a past president of the Federation who cared deeply about educating the next generation of Jewish community leadership. Each year, a new Saltzman Youth Panel makes decisions to allocate up to \$50,000 to worthy organizations - 85% of which is awarded to programs that serve the Jewish community. The other 15% is awarded to non-profit programs that serve the general

community. Through this process, the participants learn about the philanthropic process and responding to community needs.

Some of the Jewish community grants included \$6,000 to Hebrew Shelter Home to provide transportation assistance to clients (including bus passes, cab vouchers, and gas cards), \$6,000 to Jewish Family Service Association (JFSA) to provide subsidized services to older adults who cannot otherwise afford them (including dental care, medical supplies, hearing aids, and eyeglasses), and \$5,259 to the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), a Federation

partner, to subsidize backpacks and basic school supplies for Ethiopian-Israeli children.

Prior to the Board of Trustees meeting, panel members and their families gathered for a reception to celebrate their accomplishments. Federation President Stephen H. Hoffman congratulated the group on their successful collaboration and philanthropic spirit. Panelists commented on how much they learned about community needs, evaluation of grant proposals and the struggle to prioritize needs when resources are limited.

Panel members, selected

through a competitive application process, met seven times throughout the school year. They created a Request for Proposals, reviewed grant applications, learned about consensus decision making and, in the end, had a tremendous impact on programs and organizations that improve the lives of others.

Arbor Day in Beachwood

On Friday, April 28, city officials, employees, Beachwood pre-school classes and community members observed Earth Day at Beachwood's annual Arbor Day celebration and witnessed this year's celebration of "Something Old and New."

"Something Old" referred to the bell from the Centenary Church, once located on the site of Beachwood City Hall, but in storage for many years. Beachwood resident Bob Young initiated having the bell refurbished, mounted and permanently

placed outside the Beachwood Community Center.

"Something New" was the new Cleveland Select Pear tree tree, planted just outside the community center. Fairmount pre-school students assisted in the planting, with each student depositing a Dixie-cup of dirt around the tree.

Following the planting, students recited poems, sang songs and displayed artwork to proudly demonstrate their awareness of Earth Day and shared their own earthy-friendly ideas.

> Next, Mayor Merle S. Gorden sounded the bell. with students ringing their hand-made paper

bells with tinsel-topped straws.

In recognition of this day, Mayor Merle S. Gorden and City Council proclaimed the day as "Arbor Day" in the city of Beachwood.

About the Centenary Church and the Historic Bell

Next to the Beachwood Village Hall was the Centenary Church, which was constructed in 1884. The stone foundation came from a small quarry on the Bleasdale Farm near the area of Harvard and Richmond Roads. When anyone in the community passed away, the church bell was tolled once for each year of his or her age. In the 1920s, the church was moved back several yards for the widening expansion of North

Woodland Road (now Fairmount Boulevard). By the 1970s, the church's aging congregation was rapidly decreasing. On August 4, 1980, church trustees voted to sell the building. It was purchased by the City of Beachwood and formerly housed the city's administrative fire department staff until the new station was built in 2001. When the new **Beachwood Municipal Complex** was constructed in 2006, the bell was placed in storage in the police garage.



Today, there's a free, simple alternative. You can take household compact fluorescent bulbs (CFLs) to any Home Depot or Lowe's store.

There is also a free, nationwide program to recycle rechargeable

batteries through an organization called Call2Recycle, with drop-off locations at Best Buy, Home Depot and Lowe's stores in Cuyahoga County. Once processed at Call2Recycle, batteries are recycled into a variety of new products.

Soviet Jewish Oral History Collection Featured at Jewish Genealogy Society Meeting

Dr. Sean Martin, associate curator for Jewish History at the Western Reserve Historical Society, will present the new Soviet Jewish Oral History Collection at the Wednesday, July 12 meeting of the Jewish Genealogy Society of Cleveland.

Cleveland's Jewish community played an active role helping Soviet Jews emigrate from the Soviet Union and resettle in the United States, and especially in the Cleveland area, from the 1960s to the 1990s. Approximately 12,000 Soviet Jews came to Cleveland during these years. The recently completed Soviet Jewish Oral History Collection documents the experiences of 81 of these immigrants. Dr. Martin will discuss how WRHS worked with the local community on this project and share what

he has learned about oral histories and the Soviet Jewish immigrants in Northeast Ohio.

Dr. Martin has been Associate Curator for Jewish History at Western Reserve Historical Society since 2005. He studied Jewish, Russian, and East European history at The Ohio State University. Among his publications are Jewish Life in Cracow, 1918-1939; A Stitch in Time: The Cleveland Garment Industry: and the forthcoming For the Good of the Nation: Institutions for Jewish Children in Interwar Poland (Academic Studies Press, 2017). He has taught at Gratz College, John Carroll University and Case Western Reserve University. Dr. Martin also serves as part of the curatorial staff for the Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage, and he served

as a research consultant to POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews in Warsaw.
