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

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
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Letter to the Community

n January 12, 2017, our family changed forever. Our oldest son, Ryan Warner, a junior at Beachwood High School, passed away suddenly from a cardiac condition. The days and months that have since gone by have been extremely difficult for our family; however, many unexpected acts of kindness from our Beachwood community have lifted our spirits and we wanted to share some of these experiences.

One evening, an illuminated lantern was placed at our front door with an attached note, "Ryan, your light, will forever shine brightly." The lantern remains there every evening in his memory.

A friend designed remembrance wristbands that we often see wherever we go.

A neighbor sang a spiritual hymn on our voicemail to provide comfort in the only way she knew.

For months, neighbors provided and delivered meals to our home, while others stayed with us to give support. We were touched by the generous, charitable donations to Bethel Church, The Make-A-Wish Foundation, and The American Heart Association.

One afternoon, a middle-school student stopped by just to say that Ryan had always been kind to him on the bus.

A high school student composed a musical piece and other high school classmates created artwork, poetry, and personal letters in Ryan's memory.

In the high school newspaper and photo albums, classmates shared special times of growing up together.

The high school swim team, coaches, and swim families were always available at a moment's notice.

Our superintendent of schools was there with his family to share our grief and coordinate all the important details that were sure to follow.

In Ryan's honor, the Athletic Boosters dedicated a swim record board that is displayed in the natatorium.

The Middle School and Bryden staff surrounded Seth, Evan, and Luke with understanding and support during their return to school. One Sunday afternoon, Bryden staff visited our home with food and played Barbie dolls with our 7-year old, Luke. And that same day, an off-duty Beachwood police officer stopped by – just to cry with us.

As we reflected on September 7, which would have been Ryan's 17th birthday and the beginning of his senior year, we thought about what could have been that day. But we also paused to recognize that we are a part of a special community that loved our son as well! And for that, our family is both humbled and grateful.

The Beachwood Branch of Cuyahoga County Public Library Transforming Our Community

uyahoga County Public Library (CCPL) has much to offer residents of all ages. I recently met with Beachwood Branch manager Aimee Lurie, who provided insight into the many programs and services that CCPL offers in Beachwood and neighboring branches throughout the county. Whether looking to digitize and share old videos, use a state-of-the-art Innovative Center or utilize resources that support your writing interests, CCPL has something for you. Read on – CCPL is transforming our community with programs that far exceed what libraries used to offer.

Q. Can you please give us an overview of the Cuyahoga County Public Library system?

CCPL is one of the nation's best and busiest public library systems. Our mission is serve as centers of community life where reading, lifelong learning and civic engagement thrive.

Q. How many libraries are in the system?

Cuyahoga County Public Library has 27 branches that serve 47 communities throughout the county.

Q. Do all branches offer all services?

All of our branches are open seven days a week and there are many services we offer consistently at every location, like free computer access and community meeting spaces. But each branch is unique and offers services that meet the specific needs of their communities. For example, at the Beachwood Branch we offer a monthly Hebrew story time in collaboration with the Jewish Education Center of Cleveland, which is unique to our particular branch.

Q. What do you offer that residents may not be aware?

A lot of people don't realize that all CCPL branches offer passport processing and photo services seven days a week, no appointment necessary. People really appreciate the convenience of being able to apply for a passport and get their photo taken on a Saturday or Sunday at their neighborhood branch. Another service that many people don't know about is Library2You, CCPL's free delivery service for people who are homebound. At the Beachwood Branch, we recently began offering story times in Chinese, which people are just beginning to catch on to.

Q. Tell us about your homework-mentoring program.

CCPL offers free after-school homework help at branches throughout the county through its Homework Centers and Homework Mentors programs. At the Beachwood Branch, students in grades K-8 can get help from a trained mentor, Monday through Thursday after-school, during the school year.

Q. What are the Innovation Centers?

CCPL's Innovation Centers are creative, collaborative and educational spaces that provide county residents with access to advanced software, emerging technologies, production studios and co-working spaces. The goal of the Innovation Centers is to help county residents turn promising ideas into successful businesses. Currently, CCPL has three Innovation Centers which are located in the Garfield, Mayfield and Parma-Snow branches. The Centers offer audio- and video-recording equipment, 3-D printers, computers with Adobe Creative Cloud software, T-shirt presses, embroidery machines, laser engravers and much more. There is no charge to use the Innovation Centers' equipment and computers, although we do charge a nominal fee for some consumable materials like 3-D printing filament. The Innovation Centers are made possible through the support of Cuyahoga County Executive Armond Budish and the Cleveland Foundation.

Q. What is the Writers' Center?

The William N. Skirball Writers' Center, located in CCPL's South Euclid-Lyndhurst Branch was created to help foster and support Northeast Ohio's writing community. It's a welcoming space with private writing rooms, laptops, a special collection of books and magazines about writing and access to our free online self-publishing resources. The Center also hosts a variety of writing workshops and events throughout the year. It's a great place for local writers to network, do their work and hone their craft.

Q. What is the Memory Lab?

The Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel Memory Lab is another innovative space located in the South Euclid-Lyndhurst Branch where county residents can learn how to access, digitize and share old videos, audio recordings, photographs and slides. The Lab is open to the public at no charge. Individuals and organizations can use the Memory Lab's resources to preserve their cultural heritage for current and future generations through digitization and storytelling.

Q. What is lynda.com?

Lynda.com is a leading online learning website that offers thousands of video courses. It's a great way to learn software applications, creative and business skills. Normally you must pay a subscription fee to use Lynda.com, but with a CCPL library card you can access it at no cost.

Q. What else would you like to share?

Cuyahoga County Public Library, Cleveland Public Library and Cuyahoga County Executive Armond Budish recently announced an exciting and unique partnership. We're teaming up to transform our libraries into community hubs where county residents can receive help from trained staff to access and sign up for benefits assistance programs and adult education opportunities like free GED® and basic literacy classes. Together we are bringing county services into the neighborhoods where people live.

Q. Anything else?

As part of our partnership with Cleveland Public Library and county government, we recently launched Aspire Greater Cleveland adult education services. Now, county residents can call the 24-hour help line at 1-833-ASPIRE2 and and get connected with any Aspire Greater Cleveland service they need, whether it's free GED® classes, English for speakers of other languages, classes or adult basic-literacy services.

Q. What's the easiest way to see what's going on at the Beachwood Branch?

You can check out our events calendar online at www.cuyahogalibrary.org, or stop in and pick up a free copy of Cuyahoga County Public Library's quarterly Program Guide. It includes listings of all of the programs and events happening at the Beachwood Branch and CCPL branches throughout the county.

Q. You mentioned your digital collection. Please tell us more about that.

CCPL has a huge collection of free eBooks, magazines, audiobooks, comic books, music and movies that our cardholders can access anytime, anywhere, 365 days a year. Just visit cuyahogalibrary.org/digital and start exploring. The staff at your local library branch are also happy to help customers navigate the digital collection, so if you're in the neighborhood stop in with your device and we can help get you started.

Q. Tell us a little bit about yourself.

Prior to accepting this position two years ago, I was the librarian at Mandel Jewish Day School. Before that, I was a public librarian. Beachwood is a fabulous community, and I felt the desire to come back and help people of all ages. My family keeps me pretty busy, so I don't have a lot of spare time to read. On average, I read two to three books each month.

Q. With such an overload of information, how do you select books to read?

Our customers and staff are very helpful. People in this community love literature and once something is published, we receive inquiries about it. Hot books are the buzz around here. It's never-ending fun.

Q. Is there anything else you would like to share?

Our Beachwood Branch ongoing book sale is fantastic and the best-kept secret in town. It's run by the Friends of the Beachwood Library, and the money raised by the sales helps fund programming and supplies. Come check it out.

Empowerment Programming Seeks to Strengthen Students' Self-Esteem

S ince children are growing up in a culture where social media may regularly test their self-esteem, where "likes" and "shares" affect them, and where bullying may be a threat, counter-programming has a role to play. As a result, the Beachwood Recreation Department offers classes that boost children's confidence and emotional well-being. In fact, this is a clearly-defined mission within the department.

"We will review and offer any program presented to us that will benefit children's growth, sustain their self-esteem and guide them to a healthy lifestyle," says Pete Conces, recreation supervisor.

Several classes featured in the fall catalog meet these criteria. "Our programs will assist kids in gaining perspective and help them to slow down so they may be more thoughtful and careful," he explains. The following class reviews demonstrate how they may contribute to students' overall growth.

Children's Dining Etiquette

Taught by Kimberlee Franz of The Etiquette Factory by Miss Kim LLC etiquetteohio.com Saturday, October 28 1 – 2 pm Ages 8-16 \$25/resident, \$30/non-Resident

"Etiquette equals confidence," says Kim Franz, Etiquette Factory instructor. But beyond that compelling reason to learn proper table manners, Kim emphasizes that this knowledge is needed now more than ever because "we are a global society, and people need to feel comfortable dining with members of any culture."

Other practical applications of these skills lie with eventual job interviews, and dining at five-star restaurants and country clubs. Her program teaches methods of non-verbal communication conveyed through the use of table utensils, which enlist pausing and positioning skills among other strategies.

"Kids may be intimidated at first, but I make the class fun and interactive and not a lecture." She notes that parents often like to stay and learn with their child as well. Her table is filled with actual dishes and silverware that students use in place-setting exercises. Kim also teaches the proper way to hold utensils and cut food, a skill practiced on pineapple slices.

Students also learn how to conduct introductions and overall dining etiquette. This involves how to properly pass food (starting with the meat dish, passed in clockwise fashion, followed by the side dishes) and how to hold platters. She covers how to handle being excused from the table, too.

She reports that her classes are typically composed of an equal number of boys and girls, and her program offers a rare opportunity to access to this variety of instruction.

Empowered & Poised

sues that many girls go through – I went through many of them myself – so my program seeks to eliminate those difficulties by offering the tools to be successful," Leah states. One of those challenges to which she is referring involves social media. "People are constantly putting out edited, best versions of themselves, which makes girls feel they must act and look a certain way. This is detrimental and unhealthy," she reports. Other overwhelming factors in girls' lives include the stress of achieving the best grades and overcoming online or in-person bullying.

Her program counteracts these issues by involving girls with "the wellness triangle," which focuses on mental, physical and social health. "I offer conversational avenues for girls to open up and discuss their challenges."

An example of an issue that she has pursued with participants relates to friendship and an occasion when a girl was shunned by another student. The counter-programming activity involved creating "sheroes" or super heroes based on the participants' own interests and strengths. "This helps them become more self-aware."

Leah follows a self-created, 30-page curriculum, which incorporates lessons such as nutrition and healthy eating, and other life skills – material that is not always taught in school. She also features guest speakers, sourced from among people that students can respect and admire, which are typically women in leadership roles.

"We pack a lot into this program," Leah concludes.

Nisha Brown takes an old-fashioned approach to empowering children. She creates programs that revolve around cooking, community, love and family. She explains that this is an oldschool concept that has great present-day application. She sees immediate results, too, such as when some of her students reported that they told their parents that they don't need to go out to eat, and they can make wonderful food at home.

"I'm interested in teaching life skills, which includes not saying 'I can't.' I teach them to figure it out. I let them know they are capable." She also says that girls need to communicate with strong role models, as opposed to those found on TV. In pursuit of these people, she takes students to local businesses where they can speak with the owners and "everything is real."

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

Her approach to teaching babysitting, one of her several program offerings, is intensive and demanding. "My students are not just the girls next door." She shows them age-appropriate arts and crafts projects, cooking activities, how to deal with difficult children and how to interview parents. She provides a binder filled with forms to record phone calls, incident reports, "all about my day" forms, medication and food schedules, and diaper activity. She also stresses telling the truth and discussing kids' behavior in an honest manner.

In her crafts activities, she says she likes to instill a sense of pride in the materials used, and that's the outcome when students make chalk. "They won't waste the products when they're involved in the process."

Ultimately, she says, one of the value propositions in her programs is how they contrast with school, where everything is dictated. She keeps students fully involved.

Healthy Kids Program

Rick Hart fully endorses the notion that sports are a great vehicle to help kids grow physically, psychologically, socially and emotionally. And while the focus of his programming relates mostly to sports activities, he also stresses treating the body right by eating and sleeping properly. However, he says that he sometimes feels parents pay more attention to what will lead their child to becoming a star athlete, at the expense of a healthy lifestyle.

"A big by-product of playing sports is building confidence," he says. His programs are co-ed and inclusive of all children. Since attention spans in young children run short, his sessions involve changing activities frequently with little down time, and when breaks are taken, they are structured. Hart also has a rule that no cell phone use is permitted.

To hold the attention of younger participants, his curriculum involves the use of puppets, books and videos to teach nutrition, hydration and overall body health. The bulk of the programming features introductions to a variety of sports, including soccer, basketball, football, handball, track and field events and lacrosse. Fitness activity favorites are the tag games "shark and minnows" and PacMan.

All participants receive and keep a fitness watch to measure steps, distance and calories burned. For the program to be most effective, Hart stresses the need for parental vigilance.

"Parents must be totally invested in what we teach their kids. When children learn that sugar isn't good, parents can't serve them ice cream for dessert every night." He notes that he's heard of cases where participants have gone home and educated their parents on certain nutritional matters.

If parents have an agenda to strengthen the positive influences in their children's lives, the Beachwood Recreation Department is on board and offering options to meet that demand. 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The Jewish Federation of Cleveland Mobilizes in Response to Hurricane Irma

The Jewish Federation of Cleveland joins federations across the country in raising funds for the victims of Hurricane Irma, as well as victims of all 2017 hurricanes.

Tragically, another natural disaster hit the U.S. and caused widespread damage and flooding. As a result, funds are still needed for food, shelter, and other emergency supplies.





What Is Your Inner Voice Telling You?

y inner voice keeps me going. It helps me to stay focused, to reset, to begin again, to try to be compassionate and patient with myself. Sometimes it's the voice of my mother, other times it's the voice of my

inner therapist, teacher, coach or guide.

You can do this. Just breathe. Keep at it. You will be okay. I am proud of you. The right words at the right time to carry me through the highs, the lows, and the normal day-to-day uncertainties. I am fortunate to have family, friends and colleagues who support, encourage and teach me; yet, time and time again, I find myself relying on my inner voice. It's the voice that got me through the loss of my mom in my twenties: You will be okay. She is always with you. She wants you to be strong, happy and healthy, and to live a full and meaningful life.

It's the voice that encouraged me to go to graduate school immediately following her death: You've got this. Go forward. Find what's meaningful.

And it's the same voice that cheered for me as I completed graduate school and got my first job doing family preservation work as a new bride, in my new home, far from my family and friends: You will be great. You can do this. I believe in you.

This voice was essential during my first years of mothering without my mother. I had so much self doubt. So much fear. Was I doing it right? Are they okay? Why are they crying and when will they stop?!?: You are doing just fine. There is no such thing as perfect. They are loved, safe and happy. You are a good mom.

My inner voice told me when

it was time to go back to work: You are ready. It is time to try something new. Just prepare, show up, and do your best.

My inner voice continues to coach and encourage me through the vulnerabilities of launching my website, www. transformativegrief.com: *There is a need for this resource. Your messages are encouraging, supportive and empowering. Be patient. Keep at it.*

And, thankfully, my inner voice was with me, comforting me, as I flew home, leaving my son at college, 1200 miles from home: *This is what you want for him. He is good. You have given him the foundation and the tools. He's got this. You do too.*

What does your inner voice tell you? Is it offering encouragement and validation, or criticism and judgement? You are in control. You get to set the tone and decide the message. If your inner voice is not encouraging, work toward replacing it with one that is. Life is hard enough. Be sure to foster an inner voice that reminds you just how brave you are for showing up, for trying, and when appropriate, for letting go.

Joining Rescue Effort Drives Resident Back to Houston Hometown

When Beachwood resident Jeff Turell saw a photo of Hurricane Harvey's flood waters reaching within two inches of the front porch of his childhood home in Houston, he knew he had to act. The situation was nervously revealed to him by his mother, Marsha Turell, who lives in the house. It never actually flooded, though her neighbors experienced that trauma, so they took shelter with her.

After witnessing news coverage of the area's widespread engulfment in water, Jeff says he felt fully motivated to embark on the 29-hour drive to Houston to help others deal with the aftermath.

"I've always considered myself a Houstonian, having lived there until age 18. When I saw how the areas where I grew up were flooded, along with rain continuing to come down, it gave me the definite sense that I needed to return," he explains. Executing this plan required missing a day of work as a psychiatrist at Beacon Health in Mentor in advance of the Labor Day weekend.

His family, including wife Marni and children Levi and Tali, fully supported him and understood why he felt compelled to help. Equally as important was the companionship of friend Scott Fisher of Solon who agreed to join him on the journey and helped initially by trading off driving shifts. The Honda Pilot Jeff drove was fully packed with donations contributed by members of his agency, in addition to items drawn from a Facebook post requesting drop-offs at his house. The range of donations included mostly cleaning supplies, bottled water, toiletries and baby food. He also towed two two-person kayaks to transport those in need.

When the duo arrived in Texas, they stayed at Jeff's brother David's house, located about 50 miles outside Houston. What they quickly learned was that reaching many areas was difficult due to some roads being inaccessible from flooding. Nonetheless, they managed to gain passage and deliver donations to the Houston Jewish Community Center and Pilgrim Lutheran Church. They also had the foresight to bring along on the trip some dog and cat food, which they donated to a Houston pet hospital.

Another aspect to their mission was to help two families with Cleveland ties whose houses were flooded. One belonged to Amy Siegle who needed assistance with the removal of insulation and dry wall, along with routing many items into the garage. Also, an elderly relative belonging to Beachwood resident Rick Tannenbaum had a flooded home and needed assistance removing possessions.

To compound the situation in Houston, Jeff reports that it was hot – the 90-degree version of heat. Plus, mold began setting in, and plenty of items were starting to stink. An additional challenge was presented when the nearby city of Katy needed to conduct a controlled release of a reservoir to prevent overflowing or the dam bursting. This led to massive flooding of surrounding neighborhoods, but it also presented an opportunity to use the kayaks. "We were able to ferry through the streets some residents who had evacuated because they lived on the first floor of apartment buildings where there was flood damage."

It helped that Jeff knows Spanish and could communicate with residents who didn't know much English. To stay in touch with each other, Jeff and Scott used walkie-talkies, obviating any anticipated dependence on potentially unreliable cell phone coverage.

The drive home was exceptionally exhausting, reports Jeff, but it was fueled by "a good old Texas barbeque send off, and a steady stream of Coke and other caffeinated drinks." The journey took them through Arkansas, Kentucky and Tennessee, before reaching Ohio.

Beachwood Department of Fire-Rescue is offering a residential lockbox program to expedite emergency access into homes during emergencies.

"Often times in emergency situations people are not able to open their door," said Mayor Merle S. Gorden. "The lockbox program will offer a faster and less costly solution than breaking down a door to help victims."

Pay a one-time \$30 fee for a small, secure metal box which hangs over the front door with a spare key inside. The box is locked by a unique key that is accessible exclusively by the Beachwood Fire Department and only used in the event of an emergency. CITY CHARTER AMENDMENT ISSUE

ON THE NOVEMBER 7, 2017 BALLOT

The current Charter provision regarding the Civil Service Commission contains most of the rules for the examination, appointment and promotion of the classified civil service. The classified civil service is made of up of all police officers below the rank of Chief and all fire fighters below the ranks of Chief and Deputy Chief.

The proposed Amendment to the Charter would eliminate those rules from the Charter and allow the Civil Service Commission to promulgate the rules with Council approval without the necessity for the electors of the City to vote upon such rule changes.

If passed, the Charter Amendment would be effective upon the certification of the election results.





Beyond Chicken Soup: Jews & Medicine in America Opens October 10 at the Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage

The Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage is proud to announce its October 10 opening of a new special exhibit. Beyond Chicken Soup: Jews & Medicine in America tells the story of how Jews were forced to create access to their own healthcare in the face of discrimination.

This timely exhibit is an education on the historic fight for equality in healthcare and a look to the future of medicine in America.

"Today Jewish physicians are ubiquitous in America. It was not always so. The story of this evolution and the contributions of Jewish doctor's to modern medicine are the focus of this exhibit," said the exhibit's chair of the Advisory Committee, Dr. Jeffrey L. Ponsky of the Cleveland Clinic Lerner College of Medicine and Case Western Reserve University.

Don't Worry... Get Screened!

David Rosenberg, MD, MPH

f you are a smoker or a former smoker, or have a loved one who fits either category, chances are you worry about lung cancer. And with good reason. Smoking is the number one cause of lung cancer, accounting for 80 percent of lung cancer deaths. Unfortunately, most lung cancer is not discovered until it is advanced, and the survival rate at that stage is less than 5 percent. In fact, lung cancer causes more deaths each year than colon, prostate and breast cancer combined.

"But there is good news about lung cancer," says David Rosenberg, MD, MPH, a lung disease specialist at University Hospitals Ahuja Medical Center. "With the many treatment options now available, when lung cancer is diagnosed early, it is very treatable."

It's All about Early

The key to early diagnosis is regular lung screenings with low-dose computed tomography (CT).

Low-dose CT is a type of high-tech scan of the chest that creates pictures that are more detailed than a chest X-ray can provide. "Low-dose CT excels at detecting abnormal areas in the lungs while they are still small and in the early stages," Dr. Rosenberg explains. "That's important because early detection and treatment for lung cancer can significantly improve your chance of survival."

UH Ahuja is one of more than 20 locations across northeast Ohio that offers low-dose CT for lung cancer screening. Testing is fast (under 10 minutes), totally noninvasive and is usually covered by insurance and Medicare. Individuals who meet the following criteria should talk to their primary care physician about screening:

- 55 77 years old
- Smoked at least one pack a day for 30 years or more than two packs a day for 15 years
- Quit smoking less than 15 years ago.

Is It or Isn't It?

Every abnormal area in the lungs, or nodule, that shows up on low-dose CT is not necessarily cancer. A noncancerous lung nodule is an abnormal growth of tissue that can be caused by infection or diseases such as rheumatoid arthritis. It does not develop into cancer.

"At least one in every 500 people will have a nodule that shows on low-dose CT, and most of them are benign, but we cannot tell just by reading the scan whether a nodule is cancer," Dr. Rosenberg notes. If the screening detects a nodule, the doctor will refer the individual to the UH Ahuja Lung Center where additional specialists will evaluate it further.

"If the nodule is small, the patient is young and does not

have a history of smoking or secondhand smoke exposure, often we simply follow the patient with regular CT scans over two years to track its size and shape," Dr. Rosenberg says. When there is a higher suspicion of cancer, or if the nodule starts to grow and change in shape, the patient will have additional testing and, if necessary, be referred to the lung cancer specialists at UH Seidman Cancer Center for treatment.

Take Action

Dr. Rosenberg has a strong take-home message for smokers and former smokers. "Put your mind at ease and get the screening," he says. "Detecting lung cancer early and getting it treated is far better and easier than the consequences of ignoring your risk and doing nothing."

A physician order is required for the screening. Call your primary care physician today to discuss if this test is right for you. Then call 1.866.899.9121 to schedule your low-dose CT lung cancer screening at UH Ahuja or another location convenient to your home or workplace. "Put your mind at ease and get the screening," he says. "Detecting lung cancer early and getting it treated is far better and easier than the consequences of ignoring your risk and doing nothing."

A Personal Testimonial– Henry Bitterman

About the International Tracing Service Digital Archive

The International Tracing Service Digital Archive, housed at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, has been an invaluable resource in learning what happened to my grandparents, uncle and father during the Holocaust. This collection contains about 200 million digital images of documentation that can help reunite separated families and trace missing family members.

I began my search in 2002 with the Red Cross and the International Tracing Service (ITS) when most documents were located in Germany and not digitized. My first contact was with an ITS researcher from the United States Holocaust Museum who shared documents and a summary of the family of my father, Mayer Bitterman, who lived in Krakow, Poland. This led to more questions about my father's amazing journey after his liberation from the displaced persons camps to American soil.

Through the ITS, I was able to acquire close to 100 documents, free of charge, that traced my father's movements from the Krakow ghetto in 1940 until his liberation from a subcamp of the Mauthausen Concentration Camp in May, 1945. I learned that he basically survived by proving his value as a skilled worker. Records show that he spent several weeks on the infamous "stairs of death" in the Mauthausen guarry and was then moved to the Herman Goering Works Factory, where he stayed through the duration of the war in Europe.

I discovered that my grandfather, Henry Bitterman (for whom I am named) perished after being transported from Krakow to Chelmno, Poland. However, I was unable to determine the fate of my grandmother, Czewa. I am deeply grateful to have photos of my grandfather, grandmother and uncle taken for ID cards in the Krakow ghetto – truly a wonderful gift as they are the only

My father never spoke privately about his ordeal but, along with 100 other Holocaust survivors, shared his story as part of a video project produced by the National Council of Jewish Women/Cleveland. In the video, he talked about working in an ammunition factory operated by Oskar Schindler, who is credited with saving as many as 1,200 Jews during the Holocaust, although my father's name was not on the list that inspired the 1993 Steven Spielberg movie.



I believe our elected officials' primary responsibility is to ensure that the city is in a financial position to provide the high level of services we enjoy. These services and low taxes are two of the many things that make Beachwood a wonderful community in which to live. However, these things are only possible if the city's finances are managed well.

We can and must do better. Council is reluctant to acknowledge and address that last year the city ran its first deficit (\$922,000) since 2010. Do you remember 2010, when we were told that if we didn't pass the 33 percent income tax increase, the city would be forced to make cuts to the quality of services residents expect and value?

The city's current spending trends have us headed down that path again. The city's finance director is projecting deficits of more than \$21.6 million for 2017 and 2018 – and that's if no new debt is added. To put this projected twoyear \$21.6 million deficit into perspective, the city only ran a \$8.6 million deficit in 2008 and 2009, then in 2010 was forced to add \$7.9 million in new debt and ask residents to choose between a tax increase or a cut to services.

Spending across all funds has increased from \$36 million in 2013 to \$45.5 million in 2016 and a projected \$52 million for 2017. General fund spending during that period increased from \$31.8 million to \$36.2 million last year.

We aren't the only city that provides a high level of city services. Solon also provides excellent senior services and recreation offerings. They have twice as many residents, three times as many houses from which to pick up garbage, and 200 miles of roads that need to be plowed in the winter (compared to Beachwood's 46 miles). However, in 2016, their general fund spending was less than Beachwood's to provide these services to more people in a larger area.

If we don't address the way we spend money, Beachwood will once again be in the same position we were in back in 2010. Many residents want the city to operate more efficiently, and the longer this issue is ignored, the tougher and more painful these decisions will be.




