- Protect rest. Sleep, stillness, and quiet moments aren't luxuries, they're essential to healing.

This past month reminded me that optimism isn't about pretending things are easy. It's about holding onto the belief that better days are ahead, even in the hardest stretches. My amazing travel memories – and photos, including the "big five," shown here – will bring me joy for years to come, my hip is healing, and my body recovering.

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
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Real Estate Statistical Update by Sharon Friedman



As we move into the fall selling season, Beachwood's strong sellers' market has continued to be stable! The number of **sold** listings in July rose by a sizable 25% in comparison to the prior month; however, this was matched by a 25% increase in inventory. The average of sold-to-list price over the past three months decreased very slightly to 97%, while the median sold price in July increased by 21% over the prior month. Northeastern Ohio continues to be a desirable location attracting new residents from out of state, while Beachwood remains very competitive due to the quality and age of the housing stock, the excellence of schools and community amenities, and a stable commercial tax base!

DR. JOSEPHINE CHAN

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

All groups that responded to the survey strongly agree that academic achievement is the highest priority within the district with the strongest support coming from parents and alumni. Among all groups, parents expressed the most pride in the district's academic accomplishments.

Academic excellence is essential to ensuring that students master the critical skills needed for success in college, careers, and life. High academic standards help close achievement gaps, providing every student with access to rigorous, high-quality instruction that empowers them to reach their full potential.

ALUMNI PERSPECTIVES

Alumni affirmed that Beachwood Schools provided them with a high-quality, well-rounded education that prepared them for college and career success. They cited challenging coursework, access to caring and dedicated teachers, and mentorship from staff members they still remember for both challenging and supporting them.

PARENT PERSPECTIVES

Parents praised the district's commitment to high academic standards, individualized instruction, and the broad range of educational opportunities available. Many expressed a desire for a more practical

and future-ready curriculum that equips students with the skills and experiences necessary for life beyond graduation. For parents, success is not defined solely by high test scores, but by developing confident, curious, and engaged learners.

STAFF PERSPECTIVES

Staff members expressed pride in the district's reputation for academic achievement and emphasized the importance of sustaining high standards through innovation, professional growth, and curriculum development. They highlighted the need to cultivate resilience, independence, and innovation in students.

STUDENT PERSPECTIVES

Many students valued the district's academic rigor and the dedication of teachers. Elementary, middle, and high school students measured their success based on good grades. High school students recognized that Beachwood's challenging curriculum prepares them well for life after graduation, but are interested in real-world learning experiences, personalized learning opportunities, and diverse course offerings that align with individual interests and career paths. Middle school students want a gradual increase in academic rigor to prepare them for high school.

The shared belief among the survey respondents is the district's academic

WHOLE CHILD DEVELOPMENT

Survey responses reveal a clear, shared priority: Whole Child Development.
This future-forward vision prepares students not only for today but for an ever-changing world, leveraging the expertise and dedication of Beachwood's outstanding staff. It calls for an environment that prioritizes academic excellence, preparedness, and mental health, supported by a community that values cultural awareness, inclusion, transparency, bilateral engagement, and focused communication. Achieving this vision requires data-driven improvement guided by an iterative evaluation process.

Students and families alike expressed that true success means more than grades or test scores—it means feeling safe, supported, and happy. As one Beachwood Middle School student noted, "Potential and success are partly about grades and sports, but for the most part it's about student happiness." This sentiment reflects the understanding that emotional well-being is foundational for learning and achievement, and that a school culture grounded in empathy, safety, and belonging helps every student succeed, while balance – such as "more play, less screens" for younger learners – remains an

important community priority.

Across all groups, there was a strong call for real-world skills and preparation for diverse paths after high school. A Beachwood High School student indicated, "There should be more classes with life skills such as cooking, what medicines to keep with you, college essentials, car maintenance. There should also be more exposure to jobs that aren't as common so that people don't feel as if there's a limited number of routes for students to go down." These priorities underscore the importance of equipping students with both practical competencies and strong academic foundations.

Character development and community values round out this vision. A Beachwood Schools staff person shared, "Beachwood should help develop students with high ethical standards, an appreciation for hard work, curious minds, a giving spirit, and school pride." By fostering safe, inclusive, and engaging environments – and by pairing academic rigor with life skills, character, and cultural awareness – Beachwood can ensure that every learner graduates as a confident, compassionate, and capable individual ready to thrive in school, in work, and in life.

WENDY LEATHERBERRY

SUPPORTIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT FOR ALL AND ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

The survey results showed a strong interest in a supportive learning environment for all students and enrichment opportunities beyond the classroom. Beachwood Schools are highly regarded for support of all learners from various circumstances. This community firmly seeks a learning environment that supports each and every student, regardless of how they arrive at our schools. Whether a student is neurotypical or neurodiverse, the Beachwood Schools should provide whatever supports are needed.

While there is high satisfaction with how the district is currently supporting students, some suggested more could be done. Staff and students expressed concern that more support is needed around mental health and well-being. Students and community members referenced the need to recognize those who are not necessarily the highest achievers. High school students expressed the need for more support relating to stress and extracurricular activities. Residents and students appreciate events celebrating various heritages and holidays. They also encouraged more of these events and wider publicity.

Middle school and Hilltop students expressed the desire for more field trips, more extracurricular activities, help for anxiety, and changes in the food at lunch. Comments highlighted pride in the diversity and inclusivity of the schools. Students of all ages suggested continuing to expand arts offerings, including extracurricular ones, and continued support for athletics. A desire to enhance student leadership opportunities was also referenced in conjunction with chances to bring community members in to share their experiences in careers, volunteerism and so forth. Similarly, community members, parents and alumni expressed a desire to contribute. Finally, parents, students and staff all said that consequences should be clear for negative behavior in order to ensure a supportive environment for all.

Overall, all groups expressed a strong commitment to diversity and belonging. Several comments highlighted the polarized time we are living in and noted the importance of embracing all students, regardless of their identity. Thoughtful suggestions were included about ways the district can enhance its intercultural awareness efforts, support mental health and anxiety concerns, and ensure that each and every student is able to achieve their personal best.

FOSTERING RELATIONSHIPS/ SUPPORTIVE NETWORKS

Survey respondents commented that fostering healthy relationships and supportive networks is of paramount importance to creating a thriving school community where every member feels connected, valued, and supported.

All stakeholder groups acknowledged the necessity of human connection as a foundation for personal growth, developing social-emotional intelligence, a sense of belonging, and overall success within the district. As one alumnus aptly put it, "Our district is reaching its potential when every student finds a community and feels engaged in learning."

While students consistently had high praise for the staff in the district and spoke of caring and encouraging interactions with their teachers, several students expressed a desire for more mentoring and peer to peer opportunities in our schools. One Hilltop student wrote, "I think it would be fun if Hilltop had more interactive days where maybe a fifth grader could mentor a third grader since they're new to this school." Our high school students, on the other hand, identified the need for building-wide initiatives that raise school spirit and create a shared purpose to unify

students across their diverse backgrounds, unique academic interests, and varied experiences. Finally, students placed a high value on developing friendships.

Staff results reveal a deep connection to our students and reflect pride in their growth and accomplishments. Staff also appreciates the strong family involvement and community support. "It's a wonderful community with supportive families that value education." They want to build relationships and create a positive work culture through collaboration and mutual respect.

Parents voiced the need for relationship building to continue and expand within the classroom and district. Parents are eager for their children to continue forging excellent relationships with their teachers and other trusted adult school staff and would like to see more opportunities to develop leadership skills. Parents also call for "more opportunities to meet the teachers and other parents." Parents want more opportunities to connect with one another.

Alumni shared the importance and impact of lifelong friendships made at Beachwood. Residents and alumni want the district to invite the public and past graduates into the buildings to meet students.

THE IMPORTANCE OF EVALUATION AND COMMUNICATION IN THE BEACHWOOD SCHOOLS

In policymaking, evaluation is an ongoing, cyclical process that includes collecting and analyzing data, reassessing interventions, and refining solutions. Equally important is sharing results with the communities most affected. Open and transparent communication builds trust, fosters accountability, and ensures that stakeholders feel both heard and valued.

The recent Board Goals Survey exemplifies this process. The review was highly engaging and data-driven, showing that Beachwood stakeholders – students, parents, staff, residents, and alumni – value openness and clear communication. Many expressed appreciation for the opportunity to provide feedback. As one parent observed, "The state test scores may be a quantitative measure, but we could use qualitative data (perhaps surveys or student contributions) to better adjudicate success."

Students want to be active participants in measuring success. One suggested


that our success will be known by understanding, "If kids are happy – do a survey." Staff members highlighted the importance of formal evaluation tools to validate the strong sense of pride in the district, with one noting, "I hear students telling others, 'I love my school, you should come here,' and staff saying, 'This is the best place to work.' It is certainly hard to get feedback of that nature, but annual surveys can help."

Moving forward, bilateral focused communication and data-driven evaluation will be essential to achieving the district's goals. By maintaining a deliberate, two-way exchange of ideas, the district can support continuous improvement, identify strengths and challenges, and act on them effectively. Transparency in both process and outcomes will encourage meaningful engagement, while fostering trust and collaboration. These practices not only enhance performance, but also strengthen retention of students and staff, ensuring Beachwood remains a community where excellence thrives.

The Beachwood Mini Wellness Challenge: Ten Minutes to More Energy, Better Balance, Less Stress



Mini-Challenge #1: The 10-Minute Energy Boost

Feeling sluggish? Skip the extra cup of coffee and try this instead. Short bursts of movement get your blood pumping, wake up your muscles, and trigger endorphins — your body's natural mood lifters.

Your Routine:

- 1. Kitchen Counter Push-Ups 10 reps (arms and chest)
- **2.** Hallway High Knees 30 seconds (cardio boost)
- Laundry Basket Squats 10–12 reps (legs and glutes)
- **4.** Living Room Lunges five each leg (strength and balance)
- **5.** Ceiling Reach Stretch 20 seconds (posture and spine mobility)

Pro tip: Put on your favorite upbeat song and see if you can finish the routine before the chorus hits.



Mini-Challenge #2: The 20-Second Balance Test

Your balance today can be a clue to your overall health tomorrow. Good balance reduces your risk of falls, improves muscle strength, and keeps you confident on your feet.

The Test:

Stand on one leg, eyes open, hands on your hips. Can you last 20 seconds without touching down?

Your Routine:

- Heel-to-Toe Walk –
 10 steps forward and back.
- Single-Leg Stand While Brushing Teeth an easy daily habit hack.
- Side Leg Lifts 10 reps each side.

Community Twist: Try the test on soft grass at a local park for a safe, scenic challenge.

When practicing balance activities, safety should come first. Stand near a sturdy surface like a wall or countertop for support, and have someone nearby if you're trying a new exercise. If an activity feels too challenging or unsafe, modify it or seek additional support.

Mini-Challenge #3: The Beachwood Breathe-In

Life can be stressful — but your breath is a built-in reset button. Deep breathing helps lower blood pressure, ease muscle tension, and calm the mind.

Your Routine:

- 1. Sit comfortably, shoulders relaxed.
- 2. Inhale through your nose for four seconds (imagine smelling flowers at Preston's H.O.P.E. park).
- 3. Hold for four seconds (picture the still water at Shaker Lakes).
- 4. Exhale slowly through your mouth for six seconds (like blowing ripples across a pond).
- 5. Repeat for five cycles.

Pro Tip: Keep a "Breathe-In Card" in your wallet, purse, or car as a reminder to pause and reset, or set an alarm on your phone as a reminder!

Movement, balance, and deep breathing work together like a three-legged stool – take one away, and stability suffers.

Regular movement keeps muscles and joints strong, balance training helps prevent falls and maintains independence, and deep breathing supports healthy circulation, lowers stress, and improves oxygen flow to the body. Together, they form the foundation for maintaining mobility, confidence, and overall wellness.

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BAKED by Abbie Tahini Honey Bundt Cake

ccording to the Pura.com blog, "cardamom, often heralded as the *queen of spices*, is celebrated for its intoxicating aroma and distinct flavor. Despite its prominence in various cuisines and cultures, many remain unaware of its rich heritage, health benefits, and the unique essence that sets it apart.

"This spice is not just a culinary delight but a sensory experience, weaving history, health, and flavor into every use. Originating from the wild forests of the Western Ghats in Southern India, cardamom has found its way across the world, becoming a cornerstone in various culinary traditions."

Recent exposure to cardamom got me thinking and wanting

to experiment with a very traditional fall treat, honey cake, which is often served for dessert during the festive Jewish New Year meal. My version swaps nutmeg for cardamom and plays on its membership in the ginger family.

This recipe is adapted from one on Miriam Pascal Cohen's website, OverTimeCook.com.

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Cake Ingredients

- 4 eggs
- ½ C sugar
- 1/3 C oil
- ½ C tahini paste
- 1 C honey
- 1 t vanilla extract
- 1 t baking powder
- 1 t baking soda
- ½-1 t cinnamon
- ¼ t ginger
- ¼ t cardamom
- ¼ t sea salt

- 2 1/4 C all-purpose flour
- 1 C milk or non-dairy milk (I used full-fat oat milk)
- 1 C chopped dates (optional)

Glaze Ingredients

- 1 C powdered sugar
- 2 T tahini paste
- 2 Thoney
- About 2 t warm water
- 1/4 t cinnamon (optional)
- 1/4 t cardamom (optional)
- Slivered almonds (optional)



Directions

- Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease a non-stick 10-cup bundt or tube pan and set aside.
- In a large bowl, with a hand mixer, whisk together eggs, sugar, oil, tahini paste, and honey until smooth.
- Add vanilla, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, ginger, cardamom and salt. Mix well to incorporate.
- Stir in half of the flour, followed by half of the milk. Mix until incorporated. Repeat with remaining flour and milk.
- Pour loose batter into prepared

- pan. Bake for 45-55 minutes, until the top feels set. Remove from oven. Cool for 10-20 minutes before inverting to cool completely on a wire rack.
- Make glaze by mixing powdered sugar, tahini paste, honey and warm water in a small bowl. Mix until smooth. Add spices, if using, and mix again. If necessary, add additional warm water (a few drops at a time) to reach desired consistency. Pour over the cake. If desired, garnish with slivered almonds.



The Maps Are Back

hat's right Ohio, the maps are back. In 2018, more than 75% of Ohio

voters approved a constitutional amendment to change how Ohio would draw its congressional districts. Normally that process would take place following the release of the 10-year federal census with new maps taking effect in the next election cycle (2002, 2012, 2022, etc.).

But contained within the 2018 amendment was a provision that said if the minority party did not support the newly drawn maps, the Ohio congressional map would be redrawn four years later. And that is where we are right now.

In the 2024 elections, there were seven statewide elections. While Republicans won every contest, their highwater mark was 55% of the vote. The closest race was a Republican victory with 50% of the vote.

So if Ohio is a 55-45 state, then the current ten Republican / five Democratic congressional map is an erroneous representation of the political makeup of the Buckeye State.

The most accurate 15-district congressional map for Ohio would be eight to seven.

The easiest way to draw the new map would be to increase the political strength of Ohio's two largest counties, Franklin and Cuyahoga.

The population of the average congressional district is 761,000. The population of Cuyahoga County is 1,240,594. The population of Franklin County is 1,356,303. So it would be easy for both counties to get a

second congressional seat within Ohio's two most populated counties. Those new additions and the other Democratic seats remaining in Toledo, Cincinnati, and Akron get Ohio to an eight to seven map.

What's preventing the adoption of an eight to seven map? Only the fact that the new congressional districts will be drawn by the Ohio Redistricting Commission, which is a five-totwo Republican-led body.


Stay tuned, watch what map they create, and see if it reflects the political balance of Ohio.



The Mayor's Message

A Strategic Approach to Advancing Public Safety

Dear Beachwood Residents,

Public safety has always been — and will always remain — my highest priority as your mayor. The safety of our residents, businesses, and visitors is the foundation on which our thriving community is built. I am proud to share the innovative ways our police and fire departments continue to expand and improve their services to meet the evolving needs of our city.

Under the leadership of Fire Chief Holtzman, our firefighters are receiving more comprehensive and advanced training than ever before. To date in 2025, 45 members of the Beachwood Fire Department have completed an impressive 4,781 hours of training. These sessions include hose evolutions, ladder training, pump training, victim rescue, and drills with our mutual aid partners. This fall, our firefighters will participate in live fire training at Willoughby's live fire training facility. These exercises, led by our specially trained department instructors, give firefighters invaluable hands-on experience in real-world fire scenarios — ensuring that when every second counts, our teams are prepared.

On the law enforcement side, Chief Grispino continues to advance the professionalism, capabilities, and community presence of the Beachwood Police Department. The department is actively working toward accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA), a distinction recognized as one of the highest benchmarks for public safety agencies nationwide. Achieving this standard will further ensure our policing practices remain effective, transparent, and accountable.

In addition, the department has embraced innovation in the tools and tactics it uses to protect Beachwood. A fully electric vehicle has been added to our traffic enforcement fleet, along with two new e-bikes for park and neighborhood patrols. These additions help expand coverage sustainably and cost-effectively. We've also installed additional license plate reading cameras (LPRs), upgraded our officer body camera

technology, and enhanced community engagement efforts to maintain trust and transparency.

Our police officers maintain close working relationships with the FBI's Joint Terrorism Task Force and

the Jewish Federation of Cleveland, allowing us to coordinate resources and intelligence that keep Beachwood—and our entire region—safe.

Recognizing the importance of uninterrupted emergency response, City Council recently took swift action to approve a temporary exception to add one extra Police Dispatcher position. Their action ensures our dispatch center will remain fully staffed while a new dispatcher is trained to replace a retiring team member this fall. Dispatchers are often the unseen heroes of public safety, and I am grateful for council's quick response in supporting this critical function.

I am proud of the dedication, professionalism, and innovation shown by both our police and fire departments. Their commitment — combined with strong community partnerships — ensures Beachwood remains a safe, welcoming, and forward-thinking city.



Modeled after a successful program from the Massachusetts State Police, the Blue Envelope combines practical organization with vital communication support during traffic stops. The specially designed holder stores a driver's license, vehicle registration, and a contact card, while the outside displays clear guidelines to help officers recognize autistic drivers and adjust their approach.

"The Blue Envelope is a simple tool that can make a big difference," said Beachwood Police Chief Dan Grispino. "By giving our officers immediate information and communication tips, we can reduce stress for autistic drivers and ensure every interaction is handled with patience, respect, and understanding."

The CALEA Public Comment Portal is now open for community input through Oct. 10, 2025. Residents are invited to share their thoughts and experiences with the Beachwood Police Department at BeachwoodOhio.com/CALEA. Comments are anonymous and help support our ongoing accreditation process.

What is accreditation?

Law enforcement accreditation is a voluntary, professional process that recognizes agencies for meeting established standards of excellence in policing. It involves a thorough review of policies, procedures, training, and operations to ensure compliance with best practices in public safety, accountability, and community engagement.

What is CALEA?

The Beachwood Police Department is currently pursuing accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). CALEA accreditation is considered the gold standard in law enforcement professionalism and helps build community trust while enhancing operational effectiveness. The CALEA Accreditation Program is a nationally recognized initiative that sets over 450 standards covering all aspects of law enforcement operations. Agencies must demonstrate adherence to these standards through policy development, documentation, and on-site assessments.

Why use the public portal?

As part of our self-assessment accreditation process, the public is asked to use the portal link listed above to submit comments regarding our agency's engagement with the community, delivery of public safety services, and overall candidacy for accredited status. These comments can be in the form of commendations or concerns. The overall intent of the accreditation process is to provide CALEA and our agency with information to support continuous improvement, as well as foster the pursuit of professional excellence.

Note: CALEA is not an investigatory body and subsequently the public portal should not be used to submit information for such purposes. Additionally, there will be no response other than acknowledgement of submissions; however, the information will be considered in context to its relevance to compliance with the standards and tenets of CALEA Accreditation.



City Moves Forward on Fairmount Temple Redevelopment



The City of Beachwood has signed a Letter of Intent (LOI) with The Orlean Company, Payne & Payne, and Heritage Development to redevelop the former Fairmount Temple site at 23737 Fairmount Blvd. The LOI begins 60 days of exclusive negotiations toward a formal Development Agreement that aligns with the city's vision for a high-quality residential neighborhood on this historic property.

Plans call for at least 80 homes — primarily single-family detached units between 1,800 and 2,300-square-feet. Designed for long-term accessibility, many will feature first-floor primary suites, laundry rooms, and minimal steps, making them ideal for aging in place. Whenever legally possible, purchasing opportunities will be prioritized for current Beachwood residents.

"This milestone represents a major step toward transforming the Fairmount Temple property into a thoughtfully designed, age-targeted residential neighborhood that meets the needs of Beachwood's current and future residents," said Mayor Justin Berns.

Ken Lurie, principal of The Orlean Company, said, "This is an exciting opportunity to bring lasting value to Beachwood. Our team has deep roots in this community, and we're honored to reimagine the former Fairmount Temple site with respect for its history and significance."

Under the agreement, the developer will create a dedicated legal entity with the financial capacity to complete the project and reimburse the city for all third-party expenses.

The city will share updates publicly as negotiations progress, and the formal development agreement is finalized.

Painting a Picture of Beachwood: The Power of Art In Our Community

rt has an incredible capacity to strengthen community and bond people together. The act of creation serves as a powerful common ground, uniting people based on shared interests, regardless of age or ability. There are a great variety of avenues for creating and enjoying art in Beachwood, including the Senior Create and Beachwood Community Theater classes, as well as the Beachwood Art Gallery and Free Little Art Gallery.



As I head into the community center for bingo night, I stop to peer inside the Free Little Art Gallery (FLAG), presented by Beachwood Arts Council (BAC), that stands outside the entrance. I'm overjoyed to find it filled with bracelets, decorated glasses, and a paper sun smiling back at me. Inside are a few books made from accordion-folded paper, covered in stickers of flowers and forest animals. I pick one up and flip through it, wondering who took the time to create it - their hands carefully folding each page to size, debating the color and theme of each work. Did they make these books specifically to drop them off here? I wonder what the artist is thinking and

whether they've mused about the person who would pick one up and take it home. Will the visitor add to it, scrawling notes on the pages, or will they let it lie as a finished work of art? I don't know who created the art here, but I appreciate the care that went into it and the generosity to leave it for others to enjoy. In some ways, that feeling is more important than the physical art in my hand.

The process of creating art is much more than the final product. When done with intention, creating art can bond together community members and be a new language through which to communicate. This season, Beachwood Community Services is offering a new art program, Seniors Create, taught by the city's own Shannon Diamond. Originally inspired by the elaborate napkins she folds for other senior activities, this series has four classes throughout the season, each focusing on a different craft. By teaching simple yet engaging craft projects, this course opens the door for older adults of all skill levels and abilities to participate in the creation of art. Not only that, but it establishes a social space to meet and

chat with new people who share an interest in the various craft projects. This class brings community members together, turning them from strangers into co-creators.

Music, dance, and theater also powerfully build community. For children interested in theater, performing can be an avenue for self-expression alongside kids with similar interests. This fall, Beachwood Community Theater. in a collaboration with director Julie Matthews, is putting on the musical *Grease*, adapted for kids 8 to 16. In addition to learning singing and dancing, theater provides crucial skills like memorization, public speaking, and voice projection. Putting on a show also helps children to gain self-confidence through both performing on stage and being proud of the finished production. In theater, a child is one actor out of many who learns to rely on fellow cast members, both on stage and off. These bonds can continue well into the next season of shows and beyond. Community members are encouraged to attend the performances, Saturday, Nov. 1, and Sunday, Nov. 2, at Beachwood Middle School, and celebrate theater

by enjoying the show. Both participating in and attending these shows bring people together, inviting us to step into another world while showcasing the immense talent found within our own city.

Even if you don't want to pick up a paintbrush or perform on stage, enjoying art can connect you to our community. One option for viewing art is to visit the gallery in our community center, a collaboration between the City of Beachwood and BAC.

The gallery presents many exhibits throughout the year, showcasing a wide variety of artists and mediums. One of these shows is the BAC Ileen Kelner Juried High School Art Show, which displays student art from over 20 high schools in the region. A distinguished space with professional lighting, the **Beachwood Art Gallery offers** an impressive opportunity for local artists and a great chance for viewers to appreciate local talent. At the beginning of each exhibition is a reception, open to all, where community members can learn more about the artists and their work. Even without knowing the artist, a piece of art in the gallery can incite rich emotion and create a tangible

bond between viewer and artist.

The ultimate example of artwork being shared anonymously is FLAG, mentioned earlier, which stands outside the community center. The gallery, painted by Lili Bosler to resemble Van Gogh's The Starry Night, encourages visitors to create and donate small pieces of art, or to take work home to enjoy permanently. Accepting artwork in all mediums, styles, and from artists of any age, the FLAG aims to increase community engagement in the arts and get handmade work into as many homes as possible. Although the artist and the viewer will likely never know each other, they are connected through the art they share and enjoy. For those with busy schedules who may not have the time for or interest in taking a class, the FLAG is an excellent way to relate to the Beachwood community through art on your own schedule.

Art serves as a powerful common ground between community members – a language that we all speak, not limited by age or ability. **Beachwood Community** Services and BAC offer many opportunities to get involved in art, including classes and workshops beyond the few highlighted here. There are countless ways to engage in art, whether socially or privately, creating or enjoying it. Whether you love musicals or paintings, making art or appreciating it from afar, Beachwood is a community connected by the arts. I don't know who created the tiny book in my hand, but I tuck it into my pocket and head into the Community Center.



The Legacy and EVOO Bring Timeless Flavors to Legacy Village

his Thanksgiving, Legacy Village will welcome The Legacy, a new restaurant from Cleveland Restaurant Management Group (CRG). More than just another opening, The Legacy is a tribute to Brad Friedlander's 50-year career in Northeast Ohio dining – a career shaped by the belief that restaurants are about more than food. They're about hospitality that lingers, and about preserving places that matter.

"The Legacy is a love letter to the diners who've shared their lives with us," Brad said. "For more than 30 years, guests have told me about engagements, birthdays, and homecomings celebrated in my restaurants. They remember the exact dish they were eating and ask if I'll ever bring it back. The Legacy was built for them – and for the next generation's milestones."

The restaurant will also feature a 1920s–1930s speakeasy, offering a classic, moody atmosphere for cocktails and private events – if you can find its secret entrance. The sleek, modern space will seat about 120 quests, with an outdoor

patio and multiple private dining rooms, located at 24337 Cedar Rd., Lyndhurst (the former Bar Louie space).

But The Legacy is just part of the story. Rewiring the Mind, One Cold Plunge at a Time

Chaim Moshe Steinmetz is transforming therapy – literally and figuratively – by tapping into the healing power of the cold.

When Chaim first stepped into a 45-degree cold plunge, he wasn't looking to change his career – he was just curious about it after hearing the many benefits that cold exposure delivers. Coincidentally, he was thinking about an issue that was on his mind at the time. What happened next was unexpected: a visceral, profound shift in his mental state. "It was like my brain switched into a new gear," he says. "I saw the issue from a completely new vantage point – and it stuck."

Beachwood Students Excel on AP Exams, Set Record for Seal of Biliteracy

Beachwood City Schools proudly announces outstanding results from the 2025 Advanced Placement (AP) testing cycle, highlighting the academic excellence and dedication of our students, educators, and staff.

This year, 243 Beachwood students took a total of 608 AP exams across a wide range of subjects. The average score across all exams was an impressive 4.0 out of 5.0, with an overall passage rate of 88.7%. 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
