# Letter from THE EDITOR

“Between stimulus and response there is a space. In that space is our power to choose our response.”

**M**uch happens in the world around us that we cannot control. The pace is faster, the noise is louder, and the demands on our attention are constant. It is cited that we each have about 60,000–70,000 thoughts per day – most of them repetitive – and when things don’t go as planned, it’s natural to feel stressed, disappointed, overwhelmed, or emotionally drained.

What we often forget is that while we can’t control circumstances, we can choose how we respond to them. Our reactions – internal and external – play a powerful role in shaping how we ultimately experience our days.

Controlling our reactions is far easier to talk about than to practice, especially when we are tired, distracted, or emotionally charged. Still, our reactions largely determine how situations land with us and how long their impact lingers.

Every day we react to countless moments – some small, some significant. Many responses are automatic, while others require intention and reflection. Even though we can’t control other people, unexpected events, or the broader environment, we can choose our thoughts, our words, and how we engage emotionally.

When we wake up and intentionally decide to approach the day with steadiness – even if it doesn’t unfold perfectly – we give ourselves the opportunity to move from chaos to calm. Yet many of us unknowingly hand over our sense of peace by letting

circumstances, outcomes, or other people dictate how we feel.

Even in difficult situations, there is often a small opening – a pause, a reframe, a moment of perspective – that allows us to respond in a way that serves us better.

When challenges arise, as they inevitably do, emotion often takes the wheel before logic has a chance to catch up. Some people default to worst-case scenario thinking, while others instinctively look for possibility. Although both are human responses, awareness gives us options.


Reading or writing about this while in a calm frame of mind makes it all sound simple. Living it in real time, especially when emotions are heightened, is much harder. That’s when our best intentions are most likely to slip away.

Albert Einstein famously said that insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results. If you’re satisfied with how you typically respond to life’s challenges, no change is needed. If not, a few gentle practices can help:

- **Create space between stimulus and response.** Even a moment of space allows clarity to replace impulse.
- **Lead with calm.** Stress escalates situations; calm has a contagious, stabilizing effect.
- **Ask before assuming.** Better questions lead to better decisions.
- **Direct your emotional energy.** What you focus on grows – choose wisely.
- **Use a tangible cue.** A bracelet, ring, or symbol can prompt awareness and balance.

Ultimately, we each have a choice. We can respond with intention or we can allow our reactions to run the show. One path creates space, perspective, and steadiness. The other allows circumstances – and sometimes other people – to determine how we feel. In today’s world, choosing calm as a daily habit is not weakness. It’s wisdom.

# Real Estate Statistical Update by Sharon Friedman



While the housing market in the beginning of 2026 became more balanced between sellers and buyers, we are anticipating a robust selling season this spring with hopefully greater inventory across the board! Modest sales in December were followed by a slower market in January. Market time between January and the previous two months remained neutral with an average of 54 days on market and average list price to sale price ratio held steady at 97%. Home sales statistics for Beachwood are consistently better than the national average. Northeastern Ohio continues to be a desirable location, attracting new residents from out of state, while Beachwood remains very competitive due to the quality and age of the housing stock, excellent schools, community amenities, and a stable commercial tax base!

# Trailhead Biosystems Expands with \$20 Million in New Funding, Strengthening Its Presence in Beachwood

**T**railhead Biosystems, a fast-growing biotechnology company with operations in Beachwood, has secured an additional \$20 million in funding – bringing its total financing to \$40 million – to accelerate commercialization, expand manufacturing capacity, and support continued growth.

The financing was led by MAK Capital, with participation from a group of existing and new investors. The expansion will also support high-skill scientific and operational jobs in Beachwood, drawing talent in cell biology, manufacturing, quality systems, and biotechnology operations.

Founded on cutting-edge research and innovation, Trailhead Biosystems develops human cells that help scientists better understand disease and advance drug discovery. The company specializes in transforming induced pluripotent stem cells (iPSCs) into functional human cell types that closely mirror how cells behave in the human body. These advanced models enable more accurate research results while reducing reliance on traditional animal testing.

Trailhead's continued growth in Beachwood reflects both the strength of the region's life sciences ecosystem and the City of Beachwood's proactive approach to economic development. The city's Economic Development Department worked closely with the company to support its decision to locate and grow in Beachwood, helping position the community as a destination for innovative biotechnology firms.

## Accelerating Commercialization and Meeting Industry Demand

This latest funding round represents a significant milestone for Trailhead, providing resources to move more quickly from innovation to commercialization.

"This is a very meaningful raise for Trailhead," said David Llewellyn, CEO. "It gives us the resources to expand our manufacturing capacity and continue building the

quality systems and operational infrastructure required to support larger pharmaceutical and biotech customers. It is a strong validation of both our technology platform and our commercial momentum."

## Advancing Human-Relevant Research

The new funding will allow Trailhead to expand its portfolio of human cell products used in preclinical research, including drug discovery, toxicity testing, disease modeling, organoid research, and organ-on-a-chip applications. In addition to off-the-shelf products, the company also provides custom cell differentiation services for research partners seeking specialized human cell models.

## A Strong Fit for Beachwood

Founded in 2015 as a spinoff from Cleveland Clinic and Case Western Reserve University, Trailhead builds on Northeast Ohio's globally recognized strengths in biomedical research and innovation. From its Beachwood operations, the company supports pharmaceutical and biotechnology partners across the U.S. and globally.

"The decision to relocate the company's operations to Beachwood was driven by a combination of factors aimed at fostering business growth and supporting employee well-being," said Div Trivedi, COO. "The city also had a progressive approach toward the shared vision of building a biotech hub with Trailhead."



**If you are Danielle Shoykhet, you've spent most of your 44 years in Beachwood. Richmond Road was your main drag when growing up as you traveled from Solon every weekend to visit your grandparents who all lived in the city. And Beachwood Place was your main mall. As an adult, your affinity for the city has been expressed by living at four different Beachwood addresses over the past 16 years.**

But if you're Danielle Shoykhet, you never would have ever guessed that you'd be Beachwood City Council president.

Without such a plan or intention, how did this happen?

The origin story can be traced to a simple thought. Beachwood's City Council lacked millennial female representation with a corporate perspective.

"There was a void," Danielle explains. So she threw her hat into the ring.

A vacancy was created when Justin Berns won the mayoral election for a term beginning January 2022. With his seat on city council needing to be filled, 16 residents filed for consideration, including Danielle.

She was unanimously selected by city council members. But she says she seriously did not anticipate success.

"I was shocked, totally shocked."

Then she began to fully invest herself in the work.

"I think it's what you make of it."

One of her priorities has been attending a majority of the city's ribbon cuttings.

"It's important to me to welcome businesses into our community."

Additionally, she makes a habit of being present at many city events so she is a familiar face, enabling residents to feel comfortable when they want to reach out to her with an issue or concern. "I'm a very open-minded, collaborative person."

She can also be described as a warm, inviting person who takes a genuine interest in others and has a light-hearted side that is easily accessible.

When she interacts with residents, what she hears more than anything else is how happy they are with the city's services. "It's almost overwhelming to hear how people absolutely love this aspect of life in Beachwood."

Her visibility, excellent reputation and hard work were contributing factors that led to her re-election in 2023. And she was elected city council vice president in 2024.

Her 2026 election marks just the second time in Beachwood's history that a woman has served as city council president, following Alice Jacobs in 1996. With Jillian DeLong as vice president, this moment also represents the first time women have held both top council leadership positions and the majority of council seats. In addition to Danielle and Jillian, council members include: Alec Isaacson, Alexandra Jacobs, Pete Smith, Ali B. Stern, and June Taylor.

"It's incredibly meaningful to have this leadership opportunity. It represents progress and honors those who have helped pave the way. It also allows me to set an example for others, including my children, Wesley and Chandler."

When she considers her time so far on city council, she reports that the most rewarding moment was having the chance to introduce the deer sterilization component of the deer maintenance program.

“As an animal lover, it was exciting to get the administration and my colleagues to consider this item of legislation which passed.”

An affection for Beachwood is something Danielle shares with her husband, Jeff Shoykhet, a principal at Alpha Appraisal Group, LLC, a commercial real estate valuation, market research, and analytical services firm. He is a 2000 BHS graduate and serves on Beachwood’s Planning and Zoning Commission as a board member at-large. As a basketball player in his youth, he also coaches the team on which their son plays in Beachwood.

So, does the dinner conversation often relate to Beachwood city business?

No.

“We’re usually telling our kids to eat,” she says with a laugh.

Danielle’s migration pattern in Beachwood began in 2010 when she was single and rented an apartment at The Hamptons (now The Vantage). After she married Jeff, they bought a condo at Wedgewood Crossings on Richmond Road. When she became pregnant with their first child, Wesley (9 years old), they bought a house on Bernwood Road. When she became pregnant with Chandler (5 years old), they bought a house on Woodside Lane where they presently reside.

While none of Danielle’s grandparents are still living, her parents, Gail and Bill Wexler, live in Beachwood, maintaining the family-wide connection to the city.

As city council president, one of Danielle’s first objectives is to learn what council’s legislative priorities are, based on input from all council members.

“I want to know what’s on everyone’s minds, to get a full understanding. I want to know what’s important, what everyone wants to see done. Then we can figure out a timeline and workflow.”

She also emphasizes her interest in maintaining a strong relationship with the mayor and the administration.

When she was a new member on city council, she credits former city council president Alec Isaacson (the longest serving council member, among the present group, at 12 years) with helping guide

## PERSPECTIVES ON DANIELLE

### Mayor Justin Berns:

Danielle’s leadership has been evident well before her election as council president. As vice president, she clearly demonstrated the ability to bring people together, and her leadership skills have grown significantly in a short time. She is actively engaged and highly visible in the Beachwood community, respected among other council members, and remains a strong collaborator with the administration to ensure council work moves forward in ways that positively impact our residents and business community.

### Alec Isaacson, Former Council President and Present Council Member:

Danielle was council vice president during my second term as council president. From the start, I could see her leadership potential. She clearly understood that we needed to function as a cohesive group and she helped to create the atmosphere that made it possible, which made it easier for us to focus on our work as community leaders. It was my privilege to serve in a leadership role with her.

Now, as our council president, I can see how she’s taking that leadership style to the next level, engaging with all of us, listening to our concerns and priorities, and creating a cohesive path forward for council and our city. I know she’s going to do a great job in this top leadership position.

her. “He walked me through the steps he would take to handle a situation and he advised me on who to talk to in the administration.”

She added that more than any single piece of advice, what has stayed with her is the example he set over the past four years: doing things the right way. “He consistently involved me in his thought process and decision-making process, which reinforced the importance of transparency, collaboration, and preparation.”

Some priorities she believes the council will pursue, which mesh with her own agenda, include becoming a greener and more sustainable city. This suggests well-maintained parks; energy-efficient buildings, vehicles and equipment; thoughtfully designed bike lanes; and continuing programs that protect the environment, such as recycling and composting.

“I feel it’s important to be forward-thinking, but also realistic.”

As she reflects on the growth and development around Beachwood, she calls out the way the medical industry has been booming in Beachwood and the good fortune to have two new elementary schools.

In fact, she says that one of her priorities is to help retain, grow, and attract more businesses to Beachwood.

“Given my corporate experience and my past position as chair of the Economic Development Committee, I offer a unique perspective that resonates with business owners, developers, and key decision makers.”

When Danielle is not handling city business, she is devoted to her work for American Express as a senior manager, Global Merchant Network Services. For the past 12 years, she has worked for the company where she tends to a portfolio of 100+ business-to-business and business-to-consumer accounts in the Northeast Ohio and western Pennsylvania areas.

She maintains and grows relationships with merchants and helps to identify new opportunities to increase the charge volume, drive revenue growth and profitability, and improve merchant

satisfaction. The Cleveland Browns is one of her accounts, along with Cleveland Clinic.

She says she loves working at the company which has “a great culture, including six months of fully paid maternity leave. Not many companies offer that.”

She believes that her professional training has influenced how she thinks about governance, accountability, and long-term planning, and how she handles problem solving.

“I analyze complex issues at work by setting measurable goals and ensuring strong follow-through. This approach translates directly into thoughtful, data-driven and fact-based decision-making for the city, while keeping the community’s best interests at heart.”

Her previous employer was UPS, where she worked as a business development officer. Her educational background includes attending Miami University, where she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in business with a major in marketing and minors in Spanish and statistics.

She admits that balancing work, city council responsibilities, and parenting requires a few elements: “a lot of planning, organization, prioritization, and a flexible family!”

In her personal life, Danielle makes it a daily practice to exercise. She also takes tap dancing classes, along with her daughter, at Studio J in Beachwood.

Additionally, she likes to travel, particularly to various places in Florida, including Fort Lauderdale where her brother, Jonathan, lives. And she is a long-term member of The Junior League of Cleveland where she has helped to promote volunteerism and raise funds to support disadvantaged students.

Looking ahead five to 10 years, Danielle says that she hopes Beachwood continues to be recognized as a city of choice for residents, businesses, and employees. She envisions a community that remains safe and inclusive, provides an exceptional quality of life, and invests in well-maintained infrastructure.

Lastly, she hopes that the city continues “to sustain a strong school system while remaining fiscally responsible and committed to maintaining low taxes.”

With Danielle’s multi-generational family heritage in Beachwood, as well as choosing to raise her own children here, she says she feels “a deep and personal connection to this city.” These factors strongly influence her vested interest in ensuring that Beachwood remains a stand-out community.

When she reflects on her role in public service, she hopes that “young women in our community see that leadership is not about fitting a certain mold. It’s about showing up as your authentic self, doing the work, and caring deeply about your community.”

She also wants residents to know that their voices matter and that public service is a powerful way to make a difference.

Instead of waiting for someone else to step up, I felt a responsibility to be part of the solution.

### 5. How was the experience on the school board rewarding?

# State Representative Eric Synenberg Completes First “Tumultuous” Year in Office

State Representative Eric Synenberg (D-District 21) is quick to admit that his first year in office was challenging but rewarding, with “tumultuous issues” frequently arising at the state and federal levels. Despite those external pressures, he has found the legislative environment in Columbus to be professional and collegial across party lines.

“We really want to focus on the state issues, but the national stuff is ever present, so we need to deal with it,” Eric explains.

“Despite the rollercoaster, I’ve enjoyed my first year,” he adds, noting that “it’s not all negative” in Columbus. “We all get along pretty well.” Indeed, the proof can be found in the overwhelmingly high passage rate of bipartisan legislation.

He admits that one challenge facing all representatives is the fact that they only serve two-year terms, so they are already running for re-election in their second year. But in a very brief period of time, Eric succeeded in assuming a leadership role on the judiciary committee which he describes as “technically the busiest committee in terms of the number of bills that have been assigned to it.” He is the ranking House Democrat, by virtue of leading the four Democratic members of this 13-person committee. He also serves on the General Government and Natural Resources Committees.

In the House, there are 65 Republicans and 34 Democrats.

Among Eric’s notable legislative achievements is his second-place ranking among Democrats in terms of the number of bills he has co-sponsored. He also was a joint sponsor of the Ohio-Israel Trade and Innovation Partnership Bill that passed the House and awaits Senate approval and the governor’s signature. He emphasizes that

there’s great scope and diversity to the bills that are presented to the state legislature.

Constituents might be pleased to know that their voices are heard, and they have, in fact, inspired legislative action. For example, as the result of “office hours” Eric held at the South Euclid-Lyndhurst Branch of the Cuyahoga County Public Library, he is pursuing two suggested action items.

One involves pediatric cancer research funding, enabled by adding a donation option through the Bureau of Motor Vehicles license renewals, and also adding it to the list of boxes that can be checked on a tax return.

Another idea is to expand on the Blue Envelope program to include those with special needs and to have it noted on a driver’s license. Under the Blue Envelope initiative, drivers carry a page that identifies their special condition to sensitize officers to any exceptional needs or behaviors, such as autism or Tourette’s.

Eric’s efforts would promote the inclusion of a symbol on a driver’s license denoting a special condition, in case a person has an encounter with a police officer and the Blue Envelope is not available. This idea was proposed by a Beachwood resident, and Eric is promoting legislation that will enable its enactment.

One notable issue on the legislative horizon concerns the potential development of data centers in Ohio, and the topic is under intense scrutiny.

Among the issues of some lesser gravity, Eric was part of the large majority that passed legislation to require photo identification when applying for a marriage license.

“The backstory involves a probate court judge in Hamilton County, Cincinnati, who thought it didn’t make sense that this element hasn’t been required. So he raised the issue with two Cincinnati area representatives

who brought it forward in Columbus. To me, it’s common sense. You should need to show some proof of who you are.”

Eric says that one area of his work he finds particularly “educational and interesting” is visiting nonprofits throughout Greater Cleveland. These entities often reach out to state representatives for funding, and understanding their operations helps him make decisions.

In terms of travel over the past year, one stand-out experience was a trip to Israel, sponsored by the Israeli government, as part of a bipartisan outreach program with invitations extended to 250 state legislators, five from each state.

"The vast majority of those who participated were not Jewish and it was largely the attendee's first time visiting the country. It was a good bonding experience."

This overseas exposure dovetailed with several joint commercial projects between Israel and some operations already in place in Ohio. Specifically, in Beachwood, there is the Negev

Foundation which fosters agricultural partnerships with businesses in the Negev desert.

"When considering U.S. locations for an office, we want Israeli companies to not only consider New York, South Florida or California, but Ohio, too – and especially Beachwood – where there is a vibrant, growing Jewish community."

When he's not handling business for his district, which includes Euclid, Lyndhurst, South Euclid, University Heights, and parts of Cleveland, in addition to Beachwood (roughly 125,000 constituents), Eric

says he enjoys spending time with his family, which includes wife Jamie, and sons Ari, 17, Noah, 15, and Asher, 11. The balance of his professional time is dedicated to working as an associate at the law firm Nager, Romaine & Schneiberg.

Before being elected as a state representative, Eric was a Beachwood City Council member for seven years. He served as chair of the Economic Development, Finance, Safety, Legal, and Personnel Committees.

Since the filing deadline has passed, it's clear that Eric will be running unopposed in the primary

election, Tuesday, May 5. He still encourages community members to vote.

## Ohio House Jewish Caucus

Recently, they joked with each other that they are the Jewish caucus. When Eric started his term, the number of Jewish representatives swelled to six. So they all decided that they do, in fact, have an unofficial caucus.

Aside from Eric, members now include Reps. Christine Cockley (D-Columbus) and Karen Brownlee (D-Symmes Township), along with founding members Reps. Beryl Brown Piccolantonio (D-Gahanna), Dani Isaacsohn (D-Cincinnati), and Sen. Casey Weinstein (D-Hudson).

Ohio House Jewish Caucus exists to provide a collective voice within the Ohio legislature for Jewish legislators and issues important to Jewish Ohioans; to promote understanding, solidarity, and advocacy on those issues; and to serve as a platform for collaboration and policymaking around shared concerns.

Plus, a State House Seder was introduced three years ago. "It started out very small, with just 20 in attendance," said Eric. "Then, last year, it grew to about 175 people. This year, it's going to be held in the largest room in the State House – the State House Atrium – which seats 300. The event is our way of giving back."

# Darrell Sullins Inducted into Warriors Legacy Hall of Fame

The Warriors Legacy Hall of Fame has announced the induction of Grandmaster Darrell Sullins into its Class of 2026, honoring a lifetime devoted to martial arts, mentorship, and personal perseverance. A Beachwood resident who is highly respected in the martial arts community, Darrell is recognized for his competitive achievements and the values he has consistently modeled – discipline, resilience, and respect.

The Hall of Fame honors martial artists from all styles whose influence has left a lasting imprint on the community, with inductees selected through a rigorous nomination and voting process led by an esteemed board of martial arts leaders.

"We are honored to welcome Grandmaster Sullins into the Hall of Fame," said Donald P. Mathews, executive director of The Warriors Legacy Hall of Fame. "Their legacy embodies the spirit of martial arts and sets a powerful example for future generations."

Darrell's induction was especially meaningful as he was nominated by Grandmaster A. J. Perry, a martial artist with more than 55 years of experience. "To be inducted into the Warriors Legacy Hall of Fame based on his recommendation is an incredible honor," Darrell proudly told us.

## A Journey That Began With Determination

Darrell's path into martial arts began in the early 1970s, sparked by watching a karate demonstration on *Wide World of Sports*. At the time, he was a young boy struggling with low self-esteem who was frequently told he wasn't fast enough, strong enough, or smart enough to succeed. When his father declined to enroll him in

classes, convinced he would quit, Darrell took matters into his own hands – spending countless hours at the library reading everything he could about martial arts.

A pivotal turning point came in 1974 at the John F. Kennedy Recreation Center, where Darrell met Sensei Ken Ferguson, who offered free weekly karate classes. After Darrell's very first class, Ken told him, "You can be really good if you continue to practice." That simple affirmation ignited a lifelong commitment.

Despite losing his first three tournaments and feeling discouraged enough to quit, Darrell found unwavering support from his mother. Her words, "Don't quit. I'll give you the entry fee, just don't quit," kept him going. That encouragement ultimately led him to represent the United States as a member of both the U.S. Pan-American Karate Team and the U.S. World Karate Team.

## The Power of Teaching and Mentorship

While competition brought accolades, Darrell says teaching and mentoring others has been the most meaningful part of his journey. He finds the greatest joy in working with young people who are on the verge of giving up on themselves – helping them build confidence, discipline, and belief in their own potential.

## Life Beyond Martial Arts

Outside of martial arts, family has remained central to Darrell's life. As he prepares to retire next month, after 38 years in the natural gas industry, he looks forward to spending

more time with loved ones and supporting his son's personal training business at SkyHigh Fitness Training Center, located in Alliance, Ohio.

Reflecting on the photos pictured, from two defining moments, Darrell sees more than athletic achievement. "It's been a lifetime of growth, shaped by hardship, loss, family, work, and service to others. Now, I understand what it means to play a part in the lives of others."

## Looking Ahead

Although retirement may mark the close of one chapter, Darrell's journey is far from over. He is currently considering an invitation to train and represent the United States at the 2027 World Masters Games in Kansai, Japan – a fitting next step for someone whose legacy continues to evolve.

His advice for someone just starting on their journey is, "Understand your reason for training in martial arts – whether it is for self-defense, competition, or physical fitness. Knowing your motivation will make your training more enjoyable and help reduce the chances of giving up."

# Local History Made in Paris

From a young Beachwood-based club to the top of the podium

Two years ago, a young fencer named Joseph Guth earned a bronze medal in the under-14 category at the Paris Marathon Fleuret, the world's largest international foil competition, which brings together the best young fencers from around the globe. Last month, Joseph returned to Paris and won the gold in the cadets division (under 17).

This year, nearly 170 cadets from 18 countries competed over two intense days. Joseph didn't just stand on the podium – he made history. He is the first fencer from Ohio ever to win this tournament and one of only a handful of U.S. athletes to do so, most of whom come from long-established East and West Coast clubs.

Fencing Academy, which was founded by his father, Eric, just six years ago. His interest in fencing is what motivated Eric to open CFA, which has become the largest fencing facility in our region, drawing in students from across Northeast Ohio to learn a sport that is equal parts athletic challenge and mental exercise.

This Beachwood facility offers lessons in all three Olympic disciplines: foil, sabre, and épée. Classes range from youth and beginner programs to advanced and competitive training. "We are grateful for our coaching team, which includes internationally experienced instructors – the best of the best," said Eric.

"This win isn't just about winning a medal," he added. "It's about believing that world-

class excellence can be built anywhere – if you show up, do the work, and refuse to listen to limits others put on you."

When we asked Joseph about his winning experience, he said, "Honestly, I felt a calming feeling of relief especially since I had a lot of family members there in Paris watching me and supporting me throughout the week. I felt an immense surge of gratitude toward the people around me, especially to my parents. It sure would have been an extra long 10-hour flight home had things played out much differently. I am thankful everything worked out as it did."

Looking forward, Joseph added, "I would like to be on the U.S. National Cadet team in the 2026-2027 season. And after that, I would like to be on an NCAA team. My eye is on Columbia,

Duke, or Notre Dame right now, because they have three of the best student-athlete college programs in the country."

# Caregiving and Self Care

**J**on Batiste is a Grammy winning musician, singer, and composer. In 2022, he married Suleika Jaouad. In 2005, Suleika was diagnosed with leukemia, at age 22. In 2024, she was diagnosed for a third time.

In an interview with Michelle Obama, Jon shared his experience as a caregiver and the importance of intentional and prioritized self-care, boundaries, and being joyful and grateful even during (especially during) difficult times. He reminds us, "You can't just power through – your body keeps the score. I have to do something to maintain this role – to find the practice of self-care ... You don't have to martyr yourself in service to those you love. In fact, that is a disservice to those you love."

It is healthy, not selfish, for caregivers to prioritize self-care. To ask for help. To take time for yourself. To create the daily practice

and space of engaging your five senses creatively in self-care.

His wife shared that the first time she went to his apartment, he had mantras everywhere – on the ceilings and walls. One was a list above his bed that said: Pray. Drink water. Phone home. Have fun. It was a simplified, powerful roadmap to sustainable resilience.

In their documentary, *American Symphony*, Suleika reflects, "We both see survival as a creative act." Together, she and Jon are committed to creating and savoring joy, even as life carries them through an emotional rollercoaster. Jon believes joy

is always available to us – that sometimes we have to dance our way through the world we're living in.

"It is a beautiful gift to wake up another day and try again," he says.

Simply being here is the first step toward changing direction. Even in moments of heaviness, calamity, or despair, he reminds us that it's not the end. If we wake up to another day, we have another chance to move forward – not by solving everything at once, but by staying present and making the next best right choice. Sometimes that choice is profound; sometimes it's as ordinary as brushing your teeth or making

a sandwich. Either way, progress begins by being in the moment and choosing to keep going.

Their perspective is comforting, empowering, and a beautiful reminder of self-compassion as a creative and enduring act of self and relationship care.

# Voter Suppression and Resistance

**T**he voter suppression efforts continue in the Statehouse, in Congress, and from The White House. In Columbus, Republicans passed Senate Bill 293 with lightning speed and with devastating consequences.

Among the things that SB 293 would do is eliminate the grace period for mail-in ballots to be returned to Board of Elections. If the postal service delays your ballot, your vote will not count. SB 293 would also allow voter purges at any time rather than ceasing them 90 days prior to Election Day. But in mid-February, the League of Women Voters of Ohio, the ACLU of Ohio, and other groups sued the State of Ohio to prevent its implementation. We await the decision of the court.

Meanwhile in D.C., congressional Republicans passed the SAVE America Act in the U.S. House, which would put additional registration

requirements on voters. Perhaps the group with the most to lose from these new requirements would be married women. There are approximately 70 million married women in the United States who have taken their spouse's last name, but their birth certificate still contains their maiden name. The problem is the SAVE America Act requires voters to have an ID and proof of citizenship with matching names. Only in Trump's America would a woman have to provide more paperwork to be able to vote than a man would have to provide to purchase a gun. The SAVE Act is now in the hands of the Senate.

Trump himself took to Truth Social to advocate for the passage of the SAVE Act describing the legislation as a **"Can't miss for re-election in the midterms, and beyond."** But the SAVE Act is only a part of Trump's voter suppression strategy.

He has recently mused about not even needing the 2026 midterm elections because his agenda is working out so fantastically for everyone. The truth is that Trump can't cancel the upcoming general election. But he can subvert the process, which is likely his goal. He doesn't want elections to *not* happen; he wants there to be zero change

in elected representation after the votes are counted. If he, and his loyalists in the courts and Congress, can convince enough Americans that the November 2026 election is somehow tainted, then he has the justification to keep the current power structure in place, regardless of what the voters say.

Safe to say, the attacks on our democratic processes will continue, as must our resistance.

# Legislative Update

Jan. 20 - Feb. 2

The city is focusing on six key areas essential for the city's advancement, which serve not only as a roadmap, but as a guiding light for our city's progress. Each legislative update highlights these areas.

## Jan. 20 City Council Meeting:

### Infrastructure Improvement

Council members confirmed the mayor's appointment of George Carr to the City of Beachwood's Planning and Zoning Commission. Mr. Carr is an experienced real estate attorney with a local law firm and serves on the city's Community Improvement Corporation.

### Public Safety

City Council approved funding to ensure the city is fully prepared to respond to emergencies. The purchase order provides immediate access to up to \$250,000, allowing rapid action without additional Council approval during a major catastrophe or emergency.

## Feb. 2 City Council Meeting:

### Innovative Partnerships

City Council formally approved a resolution authorizing the city to enter into a Member Community Infrastructure Program (MCIP) Agreement with the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORS). Through this strategic partnership, the city will secure \$278,300 in grant funding to support the design of the Bryden Road sanitary and storm sewer improvement project.

### Infrastructure Improvement

Council members approved the renewal of the city's contract with Direct Business Technologies to continue providing critical software security services for the city's technology infrastructure. This action reinforces the city's cybersecurity position and enhances its ability to defend against ransomware attacks, hacking attempts, and other evolving cyber threats.

## Ongoing Efforts Aim to Improve Traffic Safety Citywide

In response to ongoing resident concerns about traffic safety, the Beachwood Police Department (BPD) significantly increased traffic enforcement efforts throughout 2025. These proactive measures were designed to address speeding, reckless driving, and other traffic-related issues impacting neighborhoods across the city.

As a result of these efforts, BPD officers issued 2,219 traffic citations in 2025, a 48.2% increase from 2024 (1,497 citations). Despite heightened enforcement, the department still received 385 calls to dispatch regarding traffic concerns, highlighting the need for ongoing attention and partnership with residents to further improve traffic safety.

"Resident feedback plays a critical role in shaping our traffic enforcement strategies," said Police Chief Dan Grispingo. "As enforcement efforts increase, our primary goal remains improving safety on Beachwood roadways. We will continue to adjust our approach based on resident input and statistical data, including crash and speed data, to ensure enforcement is focused where it is needed most."

Through targeted enforcement and an active response to community input, the Beachwood Police Department remains committed to improving roadway safety and reducing traffic issues throughout the city.

## City Completes First Year of Regional Deer Sterilization Program

The City of Beachwood has successfully completed the first year of its deer sterilization program, implemented in collaboration with the cities of Shaker Heights and South Euclid. This regional approach to deer management reflects a growing commitment among our neighboring communities.

During the program's first year, the company White Buffalo, working with its team of licensed veterinary surgeons, successfully sterilized 52 does across the three participating communities. Of those, 43 were located in Beachwood and Shaker Heights, with an additional 9 does sterilized in South Euclid. All sterilization efforts for the year are now complete.

This year also marked the introduction of new state-issued deer tags that include a state telephone number for identification and tracking. Each community uses a distinct tag color: yellow for Beachwood, white for Shaker Heights, and green for South Euclid.

Collaboration among the three cities has provided mutual benefits, including shared expertise, coordinated planning, and increased efficiency. Interest in similar programs continues to grow

regionally. Brooklyn initiated a deer management program this year, Highland Heights has resumed efforts after an initial pause, and Cleveland Heights is expected to join next year. University Heights has also expressed interest, and Beachwood has offered its program information to encourage participation.

As regional cooperation expands, Beachwood remains committed to working with neighboring communities to build a coordinated, long-term approach to responsible deer population management.

## Composting Results

Beachwood residents are making a meaningful environmental impact through the city's free food scrap composting program in partnership with Rust Belt Riders. In 2025, public composting bins in Beachwood collected an impressive 69,600 pounds of food scraps from 307 participating households, keeping organic waste out of landfills and turning it into nutrient-rich compost.



## BHS Fitness Facility Enhancements

With the end of the winter sports season on the horizon, Beachwood High School’s fitness facility enhancement project is now preparing to move into the next phase. Planning and design work have continued over the last several months, with construction set to begin following the end of the winter sports campaign and completion targeted for the start of the 2026-2027 school year.

The updated fitness facility will transform the current weight room and unused gym space into a modern, all-purpose training center. The upgraded space will include eight new racks with four stations at each, along with free weights, dumbbells, and a variety of cardio machines. The full basketball and volleyball courts, along with spectator bleachers, will shift, but remain intact as part of the design.

Funding for this project will be supported in part through a fundraising campaign led by the Beachwood Athletic Boosters, including their annual Night at the Races event on May 2 from 5:00-8:00 p.m. at Porsche Beachwood (3750 Orange Place).

## Two Appointed to District Audit Committee

The Beachwood Board of Education voted unanimously to appoint community members Josh Hancher and David Ostro to the district's audit committee. Hancher's term is effective through Dec. 31, 2028, while Ostro's term ends Dec. 31, 2029.

The audit committee provides oversight of financial reporting and internal controls to ensure transparency and accountability in the district's financial operations.

Hancher has extensive experience in banking, capital management, and financial oversight. He began his career at KeyBank during the financial crisis before relocating to New York in 2012, where he served as the U.S. Head of Capital Management at Deutsche Bank and later as a director at Citibank, where he oversaw remediation of the bank's capital risk appetite framework. He currently works in bank supervision at the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland. Hancher moved to Beachwood in 2024 with his wife, Jennifer, and two daughters who attend Hilltop and Bryden. He holds a degree in economics from Indiana University and is a Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) Charterholder.

Ostro is a lifelong resident of Beachwood and a 1975 graduate of Beachwood High School. He brings extensive financial and governance experience to the role, having retired as vice president/treasurer of Parker Hannifin Corporation. Previously, he served on the Beachwood Board of Education from 2000-2014, including three terms as board president, and has served as a member and chair of the district's audit committee since 2016. He and his wife, Hermine, have two sons who are graduates of Beachwood High School.

"We thank Mr. Ostro for continuing his service on the committee and we welcome Mr. Hancher," Board of Education President Megan Walsh said at the Board meeting. "We are thankful to both of them for serving in this capacity for the district."

## ◀ BHS Named to AP School Honor Roll

The College Board recently announced that Beachwood High School was named to the 2025 Advanced Placement (AP) School Honor Roll. The award recognizes schools whose AP programs are delivering results for students and broadening participation. BHS achieved Silver status.

Schools can earn the Honor Roll recognition annually based on criteria that reflect a commitment to increasing their school's college-going culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit, and maximizing their college readiness.

In 2025, a total of 243 BHS students completed 632 AP Exams, with 88% scoring a three or higher. BHS offers 29 AP Courses, as well as three in-house College Credit Plus Courses.

College Board's AP Program enables students to pursue college-level studies with the opportunity to earn college credit, advanced placement, or both while still in high school. # Special Needs Adults Tap Into The Wonder of Dance

It might take two to tango, but it took a village to successfully bring the *Yes, You Can Dance!* program to the Cleveland area.

*Yes, You Can Dance!* is a nationwide program that teaches special needs adults, ages 18 and older, how to dance. It was brought to Beachwood's La Danse studio in 2023 by Fred Discenzo, Ph.D., a retired Rockwell Automation R&D manager.

A longtime ballroom dancer himself, Fred knew first-hand the intellectual, social, and physical benefits of dance. He wanted to share those benefits with a population that rarely has the opportunity or the resources to feel the joy, confidence, and sense of freedom that Fred and his wife experience on the dance floor.

Beachwood's La Danse, where the Discenzos have been dancing for years, was the ideal place to launch the program. "When I explained what I wanted to do, the studio's founder, Esther Rehm-Cohen, agreed to hold classes there," said Fred. The *Yes, You Can Dance!* nonprofit located in Jupiter, Florida, provided a small stipend to cover studio rental, and Fred lined up a team of dance mentors to partner with each student.

The one-hour class is held on most Sundays at 2 p.m. Participants are paired on a rotating basis with dance mentors, who are either social dancers or a participant's care partner. "We rotate dance mentors, so that the students learn to interact with someone new each week, as socialization is an integral part of the program," said Fred. "We are extremely fortunate to have such a talented and caring group of care partners in class. Some care partners have been trained to serve as trained dance mentors whenever needed."

The success of the class is due to Fred's thorough preparation. Along with personally contacting an average of eight participants and dance mentors each week, Fred prepares the dance floor to orient the special-needs dancers to the space. Dance students wear a band on one of their wrists to simplify dance movement instructions. And every wall of the studio has a unique inflatable to serve as a guide post. Removable paw print markers on the floor show dancers where to place their feet.

"Many of our special-needs adults can't readily tell the difference between right and left, so we ask them to move in the direction of the palm tree, smiley blow-up, inflatable bird, or large fish using their wrist band foot so they know which way to go," said Fred. "We keep these guides higher than eye level so the dancers look up and have nice posture when they dance."

This careful and loving attention to detail has paid off. Toby Bresky, whose daughter, Jill, 50, attends the class, is overjoyed with Jill's positive reaction to her dance lessons. "Jill used to bounce and jump when she tried to dance," said Toby. "Now, I see her taking orchestrated steps as she systematically puts the dance movements together – always with a big smile on her face. The class has been transformative for her."

Katherine Papcun, who brings her sister Karen, 35, to the class, was recruited by Fred to be a dance mentor. "The class is our favorite part of the week, and is a consistent source of joy for my sister and me," said Katherine. "Although some steps might be

challenging for Karen, the class is at the right level for her. Fred always makes sure she has space to fully enjoy the music and the experience. We also look forward to connecting with our tightly-knit, supportive community."

The positive effects of dance on special needs adults sparked Angela L. Ridgel, Ph.D., Kent State Professor of Exercise Science and Exercise Physiology, to conduct an in-depth study analyzing, quantifying, and recording the impact dance has on special needs adults' well-being and quality of life. Kent State students observe the *Yes, You Can Dance!* class to gather research for the study.

To help defray the cost of the program, including paying La Danse for the rental of the studio and other

enhancements, Fred is looking for grants and foundational funding. Based on his volunteer experience teaching dance to people with Parkinson's and adults with impaired vision at the Cleveland Sight Center, Fred is "convinced more research studies should be done to understand the beneficial power of dance and movement for adults with special needs, particularly as

an outlet for stress relief and enhanced motor skills," he said. In the meantime, as they waltz around the studio with their heads held high, nothing can beat the look of pure happiness on the faces of special needs adults who have been given the rare opportunity to experience the wonder of dance. Perhaps the Hopi proverb says it best: To watch us dance is to hear our hearts speak.

### Student Talent Showcase


A showcase, highlighting students' creativity and passions, will be at the heart of the festival. Families can move at their own pace through displays and recordings that honor different

# Summer Camp Grant Program for Russian-Speaking Jewish Campers



Russian-speaking Jewish families make up an important part of our community, but are often underrepresented at Jewish overnight camp. We're hoping to connect with families and demonstrate what a great value Jewish camp can be for their child's development.

A scholarship is available for first-time and second-time campers from the Russian-speaking Jewish community attending a Jewish overnight summer camp.

Greater Cleveland-area campers with at least one Russian-speaking parent are eligible for the grant, which is \$750 per camper. (Priority will be given to first-time campers.)

At camp, in addition to arts and crafts, swimming, sports, and Hebrew, campers learn skills like leadership, teamwork, independence, and problem solving, all of which are extremely important and applicable to life year-round. They try out new things and find the best version of themselves. Furthermore, Jewish overnight camp provides the opportunity to connect with Jewish peers and role models.

This grant is available through a partnership between the Foundation for Jewish Camp, the Jewish Federation of Cleveland and the Jewish Education Center. Cleveland is one of the first communities to have been offered this partnership.

# Preserving Voices, Strengthening Bonds

In an era dominated by screens and scrolling, meaningful conversation can sometimes feel like a lost art. A new initiative from Radio on the Lake Theatre is working to change that – one story at a time.

The Timesteps Oral History Project brings the magic of radio storytelling to seniors and their families, offering a creative and heartfelt way to preserve personal histories while strengthening intergenerational connections. Dedicated to the audio arts, Radio on the Lake Theatre has long worked with elementary and secondary students. Regardless of age, one common theme continues to surface: a growing disconnect between people, often fueled by the overuse of smartphones and social media – and

sometimes a simple lack of family communication.

The Timesteps project invites families to slow down and truly listen. Over four guided sessions, families receive conversation prompts designed to spark meaningful dialogue about life experiences, challenges, triumphs, and cherished memories. Together, they craft a narrative that reflects their family's unique journey. The audio format – relying solely on voices and sound effects – stimulates the imagination in ways visual media cannot. Sound effects are

encouraged, adding creativity and fun to the storytelling process. The final session is professionally recorded, creating a treasured keepsake for generations to come.

It's a meaningful gift for a milestone birthday, anniversary, or other special occasion – and a lasting way to ensure family stories are never forgotten.

In addition, Radio on the Lake Theatre is launching The Memory Play Project, bringing classic dramas from the golden age of radio to senior living and gathering communities. Performances of beloved titles

such as *Casablanca*, *I Remember Mama*, and *War of the Worlds* feature live Foley sound effects and interactive audience prompts, followed by post-performance discussions and sound demonstrations.


